For having assaulted a sailor by striking him with a lemonade bottle, Mary Fitzgerald, a woman of no fixed place of residence, was, at yesterday's Cork Police Office, sentenced to two months' imprisonment.

The Marquis of Lansdowne is in Ireland, and there was yesterday no regular reception of foreign diplomatists at the Foreign Office. The Turkish Ambassador, however, called at the department, and made a prolonged stay.

Mrs. Kate Ryan, of Limerick, was elected midwife for Broadford Dispensary District at £30 a year, yesterday, 45 votes were given for Mrs. Ryan, and 35 for Miss Bourke, Barbane, Broadford.

On Tuesday as some men were clearing a well in the town of Kilmallock they found the body of a child in a decomposed state. It is believed to have been there from twelve to eighteen months.

Within the past week two dogs have been killed by motor cars on the road at Templeglantine. A young man in attempting to get one of the dogs off the road narrowly escaped being run over.

Ennis Urban Council have decided, so that the Council might be prepared to meet emergencies of contractors failing to remove the refuse at any time off the streets, to advertise for a horse and car.

A motion at the Ennis Urban Council that the hour of meeting be changed from 11 to 12 o'clock, led to a considerable interchange of personalities, and was eventually withdrawn. The Chairman said the personalities were "playing the dickens" with the board ever since they started.

A Parliamentary paper issued by the Land Judges' Court shows that receivers have been appointed over 343 estates in Ireland, representing a gross rental of £141,405, and 9,305 agricultural tenants. County Cork has the largest number, 35 of such estates, and in Antrim there are only three.

The County Limerick Technical Instruction Committee has decided on establishing a permanent centre for technical instruction at Newcastle West, the teacher to be paid £120 yearly. Lord Monteagle has given notice of motion to consider the question of providing scholarships.

The Rev. Father Moran presided at yesterday's meeting of the Technical Committee, at which an account was read from Mr. Shepherd, Instructor, regarding his cycling and other expenses. The account was referred back to Mr. Shepherd for an explanation of some of the items.

At Riverstown Petty Sessions, a prosecution instituted at the suit of Mr. Brennan, the secretary of the Cork Fishery Conservators, against Mr. Frank O'Callaghan for having killed white trout without a licence, was dismissed, as the Bench were of opinion that the police evidence was insufficient.

The Ennis Town Clerk has been instructed to write to the caretaker of the Gortnagganiv water works to warn him to be more attentive to his duties, and to prevent a recurrence of a complaint made to the Council by Mr. B. Cullinan threatening proceedings with reference to a water supply for his cattle.

Stephen Graham, aged 44, died at the Meath Hospital on Saturday. With other children he was playing at home in the absence of his mother. One of the children, after lighting a cigarette, threw away the burning paper, the flame caught deceased's clothing and before assistance arrived he was fatally burned.
