# A Great Irishman And A Great Social Worker

THE late Very Rev. John M. Canon Hayes, Founder of Muintir na Tire, was a great Irishman and a great social worker. This was said by Rev. J. Bergin, C.C., Thurles, of the National Executive of the Organisation, when he lectured at the opening of the Leadership Course held at Hospital, Co. Limerick, under Muintir na Tire auspices.

Eighty students representing 11 Guilds attended the course, which was the fourth of its kind held in County Limerick.

The delegates and officials were welcomed by Very Rev. R. Canon Power, P.P., V.F., Hospital, President of the local Guild.

### OPENING LECTURE

Father Bergin delivered the opening lecture, the subject being "The Ideals of Canon Hayes." He said the late Canon Hayes was a man who would go down in history as one of the greatest Irishmen, and as a great social worker who shirked no task and who dreaded no foe in his zeal for his cause.

An outstanding characteristic of the late Canon Hayes was his sincerity. He spared no pains and did not spare himself in forwarding the ideals in which he believed and which he himself regarded as a God-given message.

In all his activities, Canon Hayes put the spiritual before the temporal, the educational before the social and the social before the economical, which he believed was the proper order of affairs. Canon Hayes was a pioneer of the Summer Schools in Agriculture for young men and the Domestic Economy Schools for young girls, features which were not an accepted part of rural education, said Fr. Bergin.

### HIS WORK COMMENDED BY THE LATE POPE.

Canon Hayes had the privilege of meeting the then Cardinal Pacelli in Buenos Aires in 1934 during the Eucharistic Congress there and later, in 1951, had the privilege of having a private audience with the late Holy Father in Rome.

In 1954, Canon Hayes's work won the commendation of the Holy Father when he received an Apostolic Letter, believed to be the first such letter sent to a rural organisation of the type of Muintir na Tire.

### ATTENDANCE AT OPENING CEREMONY.

Rev. J. Brown, C.C., Bruff, Chairman of the County Limerick Executive, presided at the opening session of the course.

The general attendance included Very Rev. W. Hogan, P.P., Kilbenny; Rev. T. English, C.C., Knocklong, and Messrs. F. Lyddy, National Secretary; D. Doyle, Co. Executive, and S. O'Brien, Headmaster, Hospital Vocational School.

Following Father Bergin, Rev. M. Sadlier, D.C.L., Granagh, spoke on the Christian Social Order. He said that true social principles were to be found in the Natural Law and Social Encyclicals. The Natural Law is summed up in the Ten Commandments. The lecturer then went on to deal with the true nature of man and his dignity and with the two great social virtues of Justice and Charity.

### OTHER LECTURES.

Mr. T. O'Donnell, Dromin, spoke on "Adult Education." He said that Muintir na Tire formed an ideal foundation for an adult education system in rural Ireland and that

every parish guild should hold weekly lectures throughout winter months. He pointed out that there were people in every parish who had qualifications to give lectures and he saw no reason why the people would not be willing to use their knowledge for the benefit of the local community.

The second lecture that night was given by Mr. Padraig Ward, B.A., Kilmallock, who spoke on "Play Production." This lecture was of special interest to most of the delegates present as amateur drama is one of the most popular activities in Muintir na Tire Guilds. Mr. Ward, who is an expert on this subject, dealt with the various problems connected with the production of plays. He gave much useful advice on selection, casting and producing of play and also dealt with costume, make-up, lighting and effects.

### "I BELIEVE IN IRELAND."

Lectures under the general title, "I Believe In Ireland," were delivered by Mr. Toomey, M.Sc., Sugar Company, Mallow; Mr. M. Miller, Bord na Mona, and Mr. Dan Doyle, Limerick.

Mr. Toomey traced the development of the Sugar Beet Industry in Ireland and said that its success was due to the courage, vision and energy of Irish people who had faith in their country. He said that no other country, with the exception of the U.S., produced beet of such a high standard content as Ireland and that Irish sugar at 7½d. per lb. was the cheapest in the world. Following Mr. Toomey, Mr. Miller of Bord na Mona, dealt with the development of Irish bogland and said that progress here compared more than favourably with any country in the world. He suggested that small bogs might be developed by local enterprise.

### THREE SUCCESSFUL ENTERPRISES.

In order to show that industrial progress and efficiency were not confined to State or semi-State enterprises, Mr. Dan Doyle, Limerick County Librarian, described three private industrial enterprises which he had recently visited: a fruit juice industry, a chemical industry and a plastics industry. These three enterprises were highly successful and were started by young men who decided to devote their skill, their training and their energy to the development of their own country rather than emigrate.

### PUBLIC SPEAKING.

A very interesting and important lecture on "Public Speaking" was given by Rev. J. Browne, C.C., Bruff, Chairman Limerick County Federation, Muintir na Tire. The lecturer dealt with the various difficulties confronting those who have to speak in public. He said that members of the various organisations should avail of every opportunity the practice speaking in public.

### THE CLOSING NIGHT.

On the closing night of the course, Mr. P. J. Meghen, B.E., Limerick County Manager, spoke on Social Survey. He referred to

## Celebrated Golden Jubilee Of Ordination In U.S.A.

The front page of an American State newspaper, "Mexico Evening Ledger," was devoted exclusively to the ceremonies commemorating the Golden Sacerdotal Jubilee of Right Reverend Monsignor P. D. Gavan, a native of Sologhead, Co. Tipperary.

Monsignor Gavan, born on St. Patrick's Day 75 years ago, marked the great occasion in his life by souvenir cards carrying a gilt-framed likeness of the National Apostle, with the message: "1908-1958, Souvenir of the Golden Sacerdotal Jubilee of the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Patrick D. Gavan, pastor, St. Brendan Church, Mexico, Missouri."

Embodied in the ceremonies was a Mass of Thanksgiving, after which many local and outside dignitaries, well-wishers and parishioners assembled at a dinner in his honour in Mexico, Mo.

Among the many tributes were those from the Executive Office State of Missouri, Jefferson City; Supreme Court of Missouri, Knights of Columbus.

Monsignor Gavan, accompanied by his nephews, Dean McGrath and Very Rev. Michael Hanley, were home on vacation during the summer. They were greeted at Shannon by a number of relatives and friends who wished them a hearty cead mile failte.

## Must Now Serve Suspended Sentences

Because he failed to pay £8 1s. 8d. compensation within the 3 months allowed him on 13th July at Rathkeale Court, Daniel Madigan, Castletown, will have to serve the suspended sentence of 6 months imposed on him on the occasion for breaking and entering the licensed premises of Ed. Keane, Castletown, and stealing goods, including three bottles of whiskey.

Justice J. P. Feran issued the warrant of execution against Madigan at Askeaton Court.

Benjamin Doherty, Downes, Balingarry, was at a special Court at Adare in May last given a suspended sentence of 6 months when convicted of housebreaking and larceny. The sentence at the time was suspended for two years, on condition that defendant kept the peace for that period.

At Askeaton Court on Monday, Supt. T. Griffin, Adare, told Justice Feran that on 5th September last Doherty had been convicted of a further housebreaking and larceny charge for which he was at present serving a prison sentence.
