| IMERICK'S Royal George Hotel has been withdrawn from the property for sale market and from Monday next it will revert to providing full hotel facilities. A new general manaer has been appointed, he is Mr. John Likely, ex-manager of the Savoy in Bedford

The Savoy has been sold for an undisclosed sum.

The Royal George was put up for sale several months ago because of a general decline in the hotel business.

The directors—Messrs. Bob and Martin Kennedy—have had second thoughts, however, and they are now to spend a considerable sum of money into making the Royal George one of the foremost hotels in the cauntry, a position it enjoyed in the not too distant pagt

Said Mr. John Likely, "Re-novation work will commence as soon as possible but we wish to inform the public that all regular facilities will be avail-able as and from next Mon-day." day

Major setback

Love is Life, sa Bishops' third Pastoral friendship, much marriage, with

POSITIVE and creative approach to sensuality and marriage forms the central theme 'Love Is For Life', the third part of Human Life Is Sacred, the four-part pastoral letter of the Irish Catholic bishops published this week-end.

The views about sexuality in modern society have changed radically, say the bishops, welcoming the openness and frequent honesty nowadays when compared with the often puritanical and even hypocritical attitudes of the last century.

But they regret that too few still see sexual intercourse as "something good and holy in marriage, blessed by the sacrament and sanctifying the partners." The views about sexuality

The third part of the pastoral, to be issued on Sunday, May 18, ranges over the subjects of marriage, human sexuality, celibacy and consecrated virginity, responsible love and education in human relationships.

Life-long

Christian marriage, it says, is a life-long commitment of two people to one another and the sexual union "is the physical expression of the deepest emotional and personal relationships between man and tionships woman.

Emphasising the positive quality of Christian sexual morality, the bishops say that one could avoid a whole list of action outside or inside marriage and yet be very immoral and unChristian in one's relationships

immoral and unChristian in one's relationships.

"Whenever sexual morality has become isolated from the context of the total Christian vision, it has been damaged in the process," says a pastoral in a passage on Christian 'sexual morality as part of a positive creative process of love and healthily maturing personal relationships.

"Marriage," they say, "was sometimes discussed by mor-alists mainly in terms of 'marriage rights'.

Generous

"This would be a very limited view of the matter; for between husband and wife

of losing the great power for healing and enrichment and uplifting which a properly human and Christian attitude to sexuality can bring. "The much vaunted sexual liberation of our time turns into new forms of en-slavement of the person."

Preparation for Marriage

Pointing to the need for pre-paration and education for marriage, the pastoral says that while this will obviously include what is commonly called "sex education" it could not end there. "Mere instruction in the

physiology of sex, isolated from its emotional and per-sonal values, and especially from its spiritual and moral aspects, would not in fact, be education for marriage at all," they say.

"Marriage is a union of two lives and two whole persons, not just of two bodies."

What was needed above all, say the bishops, was prepare, ation of young people for mature personal relationships and there was reason to believe that this aspect of mature personal relationships and there was reason to believe that this aspect of education was more neglected in boys' schools at present than in girls' schools.
