He served in Tralee, Waterford, Newcastle West, William Street, Limerick; Thurles, and Swanlinbar, Co. Cavan, before coming to Milford some six years ago.

JUDGE'S CHARGE IN ADAMS MURDER CASE

MR. JUSTICE DEVLIN, in the Old Bailey, London, began this afternoon his address to the jury in the murder charge preferred against Dr. John Adams, who is accused of causing the death of an aged woman named Morrell by the administration of drugs.

The Judge was still speaking at the time of going to press and it is likely that the verdict of the jury may not be known before to-morrow.

In the course of his charge the Judge told the jury that they were the sole judges of fact and that from their verdict there was no appeal.

"If I were to err," he said, "in matters of law against the defendant, I can be corrected, but so far as you are concerned the law reposes in your hands the last word on all questions relating to fact."

Later the Judge, referring to questions relating to the administration of drugs to Mrs. Morrell,

CAUGHT "RED-HANDED" IN CITY STORE

RETURNING much sooner than they anticipated, Miss Ann O'Donoghue, caught two youths, both 14, who had broken into her store, at Thomondgate, "red-handed." It was stated in the City Juvenile Court on Saturday, before Justice Gleeson. The boys pleaded that they only intended sleeping there.

Inspector W. Keegan, who prosecuted, said that Miss Ann O'Donoghue locked up the premises at 7.35 on the 27th February. Returning a few minutes later, because she had forgotten something, she found two boys in hiding in the store.

Guard M. O'Mahony then read out a statement by one of the boys, who said that he was 14 years of age and was going to the Technical Institute School. He and his pal intended to break into the shop and sleep there. The examined the roof and found a cement block over a hole and which they quickly removed to get in. They were only in there for a few minutes when Miss O'Donoghue caught them.

The father of the boy the stated that he never gave them any trouble before and was always home regularly.

The Justice dismissed the case on previous good character.

The second boy, who was charged with breaking and entering the school at Hassett's Cross and causing damage to the wall and the windows to the extent of £4 15s., was bound over in his mother's bond of £10 to be
