Mr. Jim McCarthy, chairman of the Caherdavin Branch of Fine Gael and the Desmond Fitzgerald District Executive, this Wednesday stated: "Is there any limit to the extent that Fianna Fail will go to pull strokes? AN advertising balloon measuring 15 by 22 metres is at present flying 150 feet over Jurys Hotel, Ennis Road, to coincide with the opening of phase one of their new facilities, which has provided 15 new jobs.

The helium filled balloon—the first of its kind in Limerick—will fly over the hotel for one week in daylight hours.

The words "visit new Jurys" are written in red on the white background of the balloon.
Mr. Brendan Gallagher, manager at the hotel, described the balloon as a 'unique' form of advertising, and added that there had been a tremendous response.

### Former FF man joins Kemmy party

ONE-TIME prospective Fianna Fail city council candidate, Tim O'Driscoll, from Moyross, who resigned from the party following the expulsion of Deputy Desmond O'Malley, has applied for membership of Alderman Jim Kemmy's Democratic Socialist Party and hopes to get the party nomination to stand in Ward 1.

Mr. O'Driscoll, who is a bus driver with CIE, has been active in community work in the Moyross area for the past few years and was one of five local people who led the campaign to close Longpavement Dump.

ment Dump.

"This decision has been taken after careful consideration and I am fully satisfied that it is in the best interests of the people of Moyross and Ballynanty that I should take this step," he stated this week. Referring to his resignation from Fianna Fail earlier this year, following the expulsion of Deputy O'Malley, Mr. O'Driscoll added: "It also became clear to me that Fianna Fail is an ultra-conservative party and has refused to face reality, especially in its social policies."

The DSP have not yet selected a candidate to run in Ward 1 in the local elections.

The two women Democratic Socialist Party candidates in the city council elections want the "politicial imbalance" on Limerick City Council which currently has only two female members, corrected.

In a statement issued on behalf of Eleanor Goodison and Jan O'Sullivan, the party states that for "all too long Irish and Limerick politics have been male dominated."

"There can be no doubt that women have been very badly treated and under represented in the Dail and on Limerick City Council.

"And of the 50 people who have been accorded the highest honour that Limerick can bestow — the Freedom of the City — only three of them have been women and only one Limerick-born. Shamefully, Kate O'Brien, one of the country's finest novelists, was denied this honour despite repeated attempts to urge successive City Councils to take this decision during her lifetime," the statement adds.

Pointing to the fact that the outgoing Limerick City Council has only two women members and that only one of these, Win Harrington, is seeking re-election, they state: "It is time this politicial imbalance was corrected."
