## DEATH OF DR. HUMPHREYS.

The very sad intelligence was received in Limerick yesterday of the death of an eminent Limerick physician, Dr. David Humphreys, M.D., which took place that morning in London, whither he had returned from Cairo. About two years and a half ago Dr. Humphreys contracted a very bad cold, the result, it is said, of a chill after a bicycle ride while staying at Kilkee. It unfortunately developed into lung disease, and for a long time past the Doctor had been abroad seeking a milder atmosphere in the hope of recruiting his health. Some time ago he resigned his position as Visiting Medical Officer of Limerick Union, and temporarily retired from the large private practice which he enjoyed in this city and district. His many friends hoped soon to see him again amongst us fully convalescent. Providence, however, has willed otherwise, and the news of his premature demise has been received with feelings of the deepest sorrow by all who had the pleasure of the acquaintance of a most generous and courteous gentleman, and one who occupied a prominent position in his profession. Apart from his medical and surgical skill he was a specialist in the treatment of ophthalmia, and treated many successful cases at the Union Workhouse and in private practice. Though comparatively a young man he had attained rapid progress in his profession, and had undoubtedly a very bright future till his health gave way. The utmost sympathy is expressed with his wife and relatives in their keen bereavement which his premature demise has occasioned. The funeral will leave Boher station at 1.30 to-morrow, Friday, for Abington.
