

Suspension Of Five Years On Kildimo-Pallaskenry G.A.A. Club

A PERIOD of five years' suspension was imposed by the City G.A.A. Board at a meeting last night in Limerick on Kildimo-Pallaskenry Club arising out of incidents at the recent city junior hurling final played at the Ennis Road Grounds.

The proposition was carried by a overwhelming majority.

Mr. Seamus O'Ceallaigh, Chairman, presided at the meeting, and there was a full muster of delegates present.

At the previous meeting of the Board when the question of the City Board junior final arose, the match was awarded to Ballinbrown. Last night a number of individuals came forward before the meeting to answer charges arising out of incidents in that game.

REFEREE'S REPORT.

Mr. Stephen Gleeson, referee, in his report said: —

"After ten minutes play I had to warn a Kildimo player for dangerous play and shortly afterwards I had to warn the same player again. On this second occasion he abused me. I then sent him to the sideline. At half-time this player threatened me. Ten minutes of the second half had passed when Ballinbrown scored a goal and this sparked off another incident. A Kildimo player proceeded to threaten the goal umpire for raising the flag. I took his name and warned him later. Later, the same player abused me. I took his name and ordered him to the side-line. Apparently this was the signal for the Kildimo team and supporters to launch a savage and hostile attack on my umpires, linesmen and myself. I picked out a Ballinbrown player racing down the pitch and vocally gesticulated his followers. I was struck by a Kildimo supporter as I withdrew towards the town goal. My brother, Thomas, who was acting linesman, was running up alongside me to help when he was struck on the head with a hurley by a Kildimo player. Minutes later, Thomas Gleeson was struck by a fist of a Kildimo player and fell to the ground. He was rendered unconscious by the blow and was removed to Barrington's Hospital.

At this stage the match officials and myself were in the goal nets while Paddy Clohessy, T.D., one of my umpires, tried to keep the howling mob at bay on the goal line. Then some of the Kildimo supporters tore the goal nets in shreds in an effort to get at us. Thomas McInerney, of the Army, was coming to our assistance when he was struck by a heavy blow of a hurley by a Kildimo player. Frank Kennedy, a young Irishman, then intervened and escorted me off the pitch. He deserved the highest commendation for this action. I can unquestionably say that not a single Kildimo player or official took constructive action to end this riot. While all this was taking place the Ballinbrown team stood peacefully in the middle of the field."

EVIDENCE OF INDIVIDUALS.

When the Board proceeded to hear evidence from the individuals mentioned, a delegate said that the start of the row was the putting off of a third Kildimo-Pallaskenry player, which was not mentioned in the referee's report at all.

The Chairman said they could not let teams out against players and supporters that could not be controlled. Kildimo had been warned repeatedly and it was too late for promises now.

Mr. J. Sheehy—We will do what we can to prevent abuse in the future.

The Chairman said serious damage had been done and he would like to hear from the Club if they were prepared to compensate the injured parties.

J. Sheehy—We give an absolute assurance that this will never happen again. The Club are willing to compensate these men for any loss.

The Club delegates and witnesses then withdrew and the Board considered the matter.

Two propositions were put before the meeting, and it was carried by an overwhelming majority that the Kildimo-Pallaskenry Club and all its members be suspended from all G.A.A. activity for a period of 5 years.

The Club delegates were recalled, and the decision of the Board conveyed to them.

Footnote: The suspended Club has seven days in which to lodge appeal with the Co. Board.
