TELEGRAMS and messages of congratulation have been pouring in all day to Sexton Street, acknowledging yesterday's brilliant win over St. Flannan's College, in as good a Dr. Harty Cup final as was ever witnessed. A 3 goals margin at the finish can have left none of the 11,000 attendance in doubt as to the outstanding quality of the fare dished up by Limerick C.B.S., but with only ten minutes remaining the gallant boys from Ennis had cut a one-time gap of 11 pts. to 5, and their supporters must have had visions of what would have been for them win number 9 in the competition. However, with the emphasis on ground striking and first-time pulling, Limerick C.B.S. easily resisted the challenge, and a goal by Brian Cobbe-his third in the hourfairly clinched the issue. 
