'CHRISTIANS' FINEST HOUR All-Ireland champions at last

'Peter's' fought bravely but Cregan, Grimes and Company had the edge (BY DES HANRAHAN)

Limerick C.B.S. ... 6-7; St. Peter's, Wexford ... 4-5

A PRIEST sitting in the next row, and very obviously an out-and-out Limerick C.B.S. supporter, could scarcely hide his emotion when referee Tony Higgins of Galway signalled full time. He explained: "My brother Jack kept goal when Jim Foley, Christy O'Connor, Bill Loughane, Harry Sheehy and many more great players won the Dr. Harty Cup for Sexton Street in 1932."

While I would have liked to have asked Fr. Frost that he thought of the game, the question really could be answered by anyone of the 26,000 present. Nothing touched this hour for quality, excitement and soul-warming pleasure has been experienced by Shannonside enthusiasts since 1940, when Limerick, under the great Tommy Ryan, last won the All-Ireland title. So well fought Very Rev. Bro. J. S. White, Superior Limerick, C.B.S., remark after the game: "Our finest hour."

The sport in the county was badly in need of this life-saving injection. A glance at the Munster Championship results from Tralee, where the Kingdom swamped us at our own game—hurling—and ran away with the first round minor and junior football knock-out ties, will show how near we were to being written off for another year as a G.A.A. stronghold.

TOM CLOHESSY OFF Whether by design or accident, not all the Limerick C.B.S. players were remembered according to the programme, but there was a general air of regret when they came out minus right-corner forward Tom Clohessy, a 2-goals hero in the hard-earned but nevertheless meritorious semi-final win over St. Mary's, Galway, at Birr. Limerick hopes nose-dived further when inside 40 seconds full-forward John Furlong had the Leinster champions a goal in front. But Niall Carroll goalied from 40 yards to level two minutes later, and when the brilliant Eamonn Grimes gave C.B.S. the lead with a beautifully-taken goal after St. Peter's hero, goalkeeper Pat Berry, had made a wonder save, Sexton Street voices rose to a crescendo.

ABLE DEPUTY Then we saw young Clohessy's deputy, Michael O'Brien, for the first time, and he delighted us with his strong pulling in the face of opposition, inches taller and much the heavier. One felt immediately that he would not let the side down.

However, there were some rocky moments to follow, with St. Peter's creeping to within a point of the Munster champions, and with the wind at their backs it seemed that they might go ahead again. A point from a free by the Limerick captain, Eamonn Cregan, a player of tremendous promise, was a great boost, but Tom Royce next picked off a white flag, and the other end to have the minimum margin showing again.

There were some very anxious moments at both ends before Brian Cobbe, striking from the left, slipped over a beauty, and when Eamonn Grimes had his second goal, Limerick left for the interval "pep" talk ahead by 3-2 to 1-3. At this stage, Finbar O'Neill had retired from Peter's half-forward line, and D. Bernis took his place, but they were back in the fight like tigers, and when Tom Royce goalied from a free, they were bang in the race, with only 2 points in the difference.

Jack Kennedy, however, now took a hand for Limerick. Placed by Grimes, he goalied and then picked off two shots to have the scoreboard reading, 4-4 to 2-3.

LOVELY RUN Wexford came again and a sweet point gave them hope, but a goal by Pat Nash, following a glorious break on the left by Eamonn Cregan, should have clinched the issue for "Christians."

But once more St. Peter's showed the stuff that makes All-Ireland champions, guts and determination. They had a goal in the 14th minute and a point soon after to leave the margin 6-4 to 3-5. At this stage 'Fu' victim, Tom Clohessy took a hand for Limerick, and with Jack Kennedy helping out at midfield, the Southern heroes crowded on the field.

After goalkeeper Berry had made a daring save for St. Peter's and played swung to the Limerick side there was a minor flare-up unnoticed by the referee. With a mere 12 minutes remaining, it was touch-and-go as Wexford were certainly not going to win without a fight. Eamonn Grimes sailed on in a dazzling run and moved into a scoring position but a Wexford hurley was thrown after him and a free resulted. From this Eamonn Cregan picked his spot dead between the uprights.

Lady Clementine looks best. There will be an extra night's racing at the Markets Field this week and Wednesday's programme looks most inviting. To-night though there should be some top-class sport, with all events over the standard distance. Best bet may well be Lady Clementine. All the remaining races should be very closely contested, with Lily-roo Darkie being one that should prove profitable.
