

Kenneally is lucky 13th for The Balbec

IT was lucky 13th for Kilmallock when sub Kieran Kenneally pointed their insurance score in injurytime in Sunday's final.

With the final score of the game, Kenneally became their 13th player to score in their six games in the championship.

Free-taker Eoin Ryan ends the year as their top scorer with 0-31 (10 from play).

He just held off Graeme

Mulcahy, who failed to score for the first time in Sunday's final.

Jake Mulcahy, Paudie O'Brien and Kevin O'Donnell scored from play in all six games.

Kilmallock's combined scoring for the championship was 11-116, while they conceded 9-63.

In total Kilmallock used 24 players enroute to the title out of their panel of 27.

Kilmallock to host Munster club game

M Kilmallock will have home advantage for their Munster club championship quarter-final on October 28. Club secretary John O'Donnell confirmed that it will be their intention to play the game in Fitzgerald Park, just as they did in 2010 when they lost narrowly to Thurles Sarsfields.

And, Thurles it could be again as they play Drom & Inch

in the Tipperary final next Sunday.

If Kilmallock were to progress to the semi-final they would have to travel to Cork to play Sarsfields in the provincial semi-final on November 11.

In the other side of the draw, the Clare champions (Inagh-Kilnamona, Newmarket-on Fergus, Clonlara or Cratloe will have home advantage against either Dungarvan or De La Salle (Waterford).

FROM the outset of the Limerick's Live 95FM sponsored county senior hurling championship Kilmallock were a short price to claim their 10th title.

As the season progressed their odds only got shorter.

An - impressive semi-final victory over defending champions Na Piarsaigh made Tony Considine's side the hottest of favourites in last Sunday's final against Adare.

But at half time all was not going according to plan for The Balbec.

But they came to life in the second half and a 46th minute goal from Jake Mulcahy proved the crucial score as they regained the title they won back in 2010.

Throughout 2012 the men in green displayed a fierce hunger to return to the top of the pile in Limerick club hurling.

They were simply awesome in wins over Knockainey, Murroe-Boher, Croom and Na Piarsaigh.

The only blip was against Ahane in their final group game, but Kilmallock were already pretty much assured their quarter-final place.

Last Sunday, the opening half was a worry for Kilmallock because they display was akin to that Ahane game and their usual intensity and drive was absent.

Indeed it was underdogs Adare that set the temp, belying any worries about the five county final debutantes in their team.

Kilmallock won the toss and opted to play against the wind in the hope of containing Adare and then pushing towards victory in the second

But Kilmallock appeared unsure of themselves in the early minutes.

Perhaps it was the tactical moves of Ger O'Loughlin that unsettled Kilmallock as Adare had clearly worked on switches to nullify the influence of Gavin O'Mahony, Paudie O'Brien and Graeme Mulcahy with the positioning of Declan Hannon, Wayne McNamara and Stephen Lavin.

In front of 4,800 Hannon set the ball rolling with a huge free from his own half.

Eoin Ryan (feee) replied but then Hannon snapped up possession and effortlessly pointed. Paudie O'Dwyer was making early inroads at the other end of the field and replied to level the

game for the second of four times in the half. Frees from Hannon and Willie Griffin opened the first meaningful lead.

This brought Kilmallock to life and O'Dwyer, O'Brien, Shane O'Donnell and Robbie Egan were to point inside the next nine minutes.

That actually had Kilmallock 0-6 to 0-5 ahead with just over five minutes to half time, but aside from O'Dwyer and the excellent fielding of Egan, they weren't winning too many individual

battles. It was Adare that were to finish the half on top with three succession scores.

MAIN MAN - DECLAN HANNON (ADARE) Kilmallock had heroes in Robbie Egan, Gavin O'Mahony, Liam Hurley, Bryan O'Sullivan, Paudie O'Dwyer, Eoin Ryan and Paudie O'Brien, but none dominated for the entire hour. The standout performer was Declan Hannon.

Himself, Wayne McNamara and Stephen Lavin put down a marker in the opening half winning key duals but it was Hannon that again stepped forward with two fine points after Kilmallock had goaled.

TURNING POINT

About 10-minutes into the second half when Adare were 0-11 to 0-8 ahead, Tony Considine made a crucial switch.

Graeme Mulcahy had hardly hurled a ball off Stephen Lavin in the opening 40-minutes but his withdrawal into midfield offered a new lease of life and the supply lines to the attack were re-opened.

Eoin Ryan was switched to full forward in the positional realignment and he revelled inside, scoring and assisting others in the final 20-minutes.

TALKING POINT

There was always going to be a fascinating tactical battle between Tony Considine and Ger O'Loughlin.

O'Loughlin appears to come out on top in the opening half when switching Wayne McNamara to midfield to nullify Paudie O'Brien and targetting Declan Hannon against Gavin O'Mahony and Stephen Lavin on Graeme Mulcahy.

Although winning on the possession stakes Adare never managed to shake off Kilmallock and the teams were level on four occasions in the first half until the Ger O'Loughlin managed side hit the final three points of the half.

While playing second fiddle to Adare in the opening half, Kilmallock still managed to produce six different scorers and the last of those was Robbie Egan, who was their star performer in the first half in midfield.

Kilmallock were only two points down and had to wind to their backs in the second half but it was performance levels that was a worry for Tony Considine and his management team in the dressing room beneath the City End Terrace.

But on the resumption the inter-county men of Kilmallock came to the fore with captain Paudie O'Brien, Gavin O'Mahony and Graeme Mulcahy all inspiring their team.

The switch worked and Ryan scored from play and created one for Paudie O'Dwyer, who in turn set up Kevin O'Donnell.

came the way of Kilmallock. It wasn't a thing of beauty but in a crowded

goalmouth, Ryan did well to flick the sliothar back across the goal into the path of Jake Mulcahy and he had time to steady himself but coolly finishing to the net along the ground for his first goal of the championship.

The scoring sequence was started by Ryan and when he pointed again a minute later there were 13-minutes to play and the favourites were now 1-12 to 0-11 clear.

Most would have expected them to push-on and copper-fasten the win but credit to Adare they dug into their resolve.

And, it was no surprise that it was Hannon that led the fight back.

Inter-county man Hannon was to end with 11-points (four from play) and despite finishing on the losing side; picked up the man of the match from championship sponsors, Limerick's Live 95FM.

They were almost 15-minutes without a score when he pointed in reply to the Kilmallock scoring spree. Moments later he collected direct from a

Captain Paudie O'Brien steadied the Kilmallock ship with a point but Adare weren't lying down and Hannon pointed from a '65 to again leave two between them.

The closest they came was an injury time free from Hannon but Hennessy diverted over. The centre forward stood over the free about 35-metres out and while a goal appeared unlikely he had no other choice with the game in injury-time. He blasted goalwards and despite a plethora of bodies the shot appeared destined for the roof of the net until Hennessy got a hurley to divert over.

Up the field went Kilmallock and with his first touch, sub Kieran Kenneally sealed their 10th county title.

O'Brien dedicates latest title to the memory of U-14 hurler James Long

KILMALLOCK captain Paudie O'Brien dedicated their Limerick SHC to the memory of James Long.

The 13-year-old died of a suspected asthma attack in June just hours after scoring the winning goal in Kilmallock's U-14 win over Patrickswell.

"For me to have the opportunity to dedicate it to James Long was a huge honour and I have no doubt he looked down on us today and gave us a little push when we needed it," said O'Brien after collecting the Daly Cup.

"It was emotional for the whole town around that time - it wasn't easy back then and still isn't easy," explained O'Brien.

He said that Kilmallock's 10th county win might, someway, lift the spirits in the town.

"It's not good economically and there are a lot of blues around the town. If you drove through the town the past week and see all the colour it was a big lift to everyone. Even look around here today its great for families to come in together," said the captain.

O'Brien revealed that some harsh words were

needed at half time to kick-start their victory. "We weren't up to scratch in the first half - me

more so than anyone. We all had to have a look at ourselves at half time and there were a few harsh words said," he explained. Adare were 0-8 to 0-6 clear at the break.

"When we won the toss we always play against the wind because if you come in at half time and are a point or two down, I always feel we can pull through," he outlined.

"There wasn't much need to panic apart from the fact that some of our bigger players hadn't got going, me included but at the end of the day we are very very happy."

He agrees that the goal was vital.

"I felt when we got the goal that they wouldn't be able to eat into the three points," he said. He paid tribute to their defence to hold out

the Adare attack.

"When the ground comes softer you know that if you are giving away goals it will cost you and Adare conceded a goal and it won it for us. We have come great lads in our full back line, even though we lost Philip O'Loughlin five minutes before the throw-in. But we had lads to come in and that's what you train for all year."

'Sweet' victory buries the ghosts of 2011 for O'Dwyer

KILMALLOCK centre forward Paudie O'Dwyer believes that last Sunday's Limerick SHC success was "sweeter" than their 2010 win.

Two years ago The Balbec ended a 16-year wait to return the Daly Cup to the south Limerick

They were instantly the hot favorites to retain the title in 2011.

But all came a cropper at the quarter-final

So all returned this year with much to prove. "This year is much sweeter than 2010. We were put down last year with people saying that we had won the county without beating the top teams - this year they were put up against us and we answered any critics," he said as the celebrations kicked off in the Gaelic Grounds.

"Last year we were diappointed when Patrickswell beat us. We weren't happy with that, that was us the players not management that lost that," he explained.

This year Kilmallock swept aside champions Na Piarsaigh with a superb semi-final display.

The arrival of Tony Considine in Kilmallock ahead of the 2010 season brought Kilmallock along the final steps to glory after tasting defeat in the 2005 final.

For O'Dwyer it also brouht about a switch from defence to attack.

"Two years ago we had got new management in and the rejig put confidence in us and we all train and all fight for 1-15. I am enjoying the hurling. They moved me up forwards for the last three years and it's all about training hard and making the team. We have a serious panel and in my book anyone could start," he explained.

Next up will be the Tipperary champions on October 28.

"Hopefully we can go on and represent Limerick well in the Munster championship," said O'Dwyer, who could be departing for Australia in the weeks after the Munster quarter-final.

He hopes that home advantage can play a part against the Tipperary winners.

"At least we can relax now and then regroup and I can't see why we can't give it a go. In 2010 we had a great turnout for the Thurles Sarsfields game with great support and hopefully it can be like that again in three week."
