# Seven years of heartache ends for Ballybrown

AFTER an absence of seven years, Ballybrown will be back in the senior ranks of Limerick club hurling in 2013.

One of just four clubs in Limerick to win a Munster senior club championship, Ballybrown were relegated from the senior ranks in

They needed a few years to reestablish themselves and then reached two of the last three intermediate finals.

Defeat to South Liberties (2009) and Effin (2011) was their lot in the previous finals, but last Saturday they made it third time lucky.

Ballybrown changed management ahead of this season and Christy Keyes assumed the manager role and brought in Clem Smith as coach and Dave Mahedy as trainer.

Indeed last Saturday, former Ahane and Limerick hurler Smith found himself in opposition to a Dromin-Athlacca club that he is now associated to.

Earlier this year, Smith lined out in goals when Dromin-Athlacca beat Ballybrown in the county Junior B league final.

And, Smith's Ballybrown were certainly deserving winners in this Nick Grene Sportsgrounds Ltd county intermediate hurling championship final in Fitzgerald Park in Kilmallock.

From the throw-in they produced one of the hardest working performances ever seen by a Ballybrown side.

It was this huge work ethic that saw them set the pace and never really allow Dromin-Athacca find their feet.

When they sides met in the round robin series, it was the men from south Limerick that emerged two points winners but on this occasion the Clarina based club dominated from the off.

They were 0-6 to no score ahead after nine when playing with the aid of the wind in the opening half.

Alan O'Connor, Shane Kenny, Kyle Griffin. Loftus and Mikey Kiely all fired over in their early blitz of scores.

With their half back line of Ian Burke, and Kenny brothers Richie and Des on top the supply of ball was always towards their attacking goal, while Stephen Foster and James Hall sector.

Even in the early exchanges it was clear that Ballybrown were not prepared to be bridesmaids again.
Indeed but for eight first half wides,

Ballybrown could have been further ahead at the break.

As it was they led 0-10 to 0-4 at the interval.

It took Dromin-Athlacca 10-minutes to score and only found two points from play from Paul Neenan and Eoin O'Leary in the half.

At the other end Alan O'Connor notched six points in the half with all bar his first, coming from frees.

On the change of ends, Dromin-Athlacca restructured their team and began with a renewed vigour. Among the changes, Brian Kelleher was now at centre back, from full back, while corner back Donal Walsh was switched to corner forward.

But it was the impact of David Reidy that was crucial - he had two points inside 90-seconds to cut the lead to a manageable four points as they found some form.

But then came the crucial moment. Stephen Foster won possession in midfield and soloed forward.

Thirty-five metres out and with no option for a pass, he attempted to score a point but his weak effort fell short.

Mark Moynihan appeared to have the effort covered but somehow managed to allow it slip through his hands and into the net.

To add to the Dromin-Athlacca woes, the resulting puckout was sent straight back over the bar by Bryan

All of a sudden the score was 1-11

A Neenan free came in reply but clearly Dromin-Athlacca were rocked and Griffin and O'Connor (free) stretched the lead with further points.

Now 1-13 to 0-7 clear Ballybrown were hard working around the middle retreated somewhat into a defensive shell.

> Ballybrown were only to score another two points in the remaining 20-odd minutes but it was sufficient.

> Especially with Dromin-Athlacca failing to find a goal.

Dromin-Athlacca went for broke and three substitutions followed as they sought some spark to ignite a fight back.

Five successive points between the 47th and 54th minutes did reduce the lead to 1-13 to 0-12 but the necessary goal never arrived.

They closest they came was in the 49th minute but David Lyons was fast off his line to divert the danger when a long ball from Eoin Benson could have fallen into the path of Donal Walsh.

Ballybrown had now gone over 15-minutes without a score and needed some reprieve from the the bench and repaid the vote with two superb points.





Both sides had scored a goal in each game of the championship and with only the one goal in this final it was always going to be the decisive


#### TALKING POINT

It returns the Clarina based club to the top ranks for the first time since they lost the 2005 relegation final to Knockainey.


But what will be the structure of the Limerick SHC for next season.

FTER waiting seven years to climb ck out of the intermediate ranks ere was little time for prolonged lebrations for Ballybrown with inster club action this Bank liday Monday.

The newly crowned Limerick impions must travel to Cork to y their premier intermediate

impions Ballinhassig. and, it will be a tough task for

Ballybrown against a side that were only relegated from the senior grade last year and have made an immediate return to the top level.

Indeed Ballinhassig won the 2005 Munster intermediate club title, before losing the All-Ireland final to Kilkenny's Dicksboro.

They will have Cork panellist Martin Coleman in goals and also look towards; Brendan Lombard Fintan O'Leary and Danny O'Callaghan.

Ballybrown manager Christy Keyes was a member of the last two panel's from the club to play in the Munster club - albeit at senior level.

"Whatever happens from here is a bonus," he said.

"We went through to the All-Ireland final in 1990 and you never know what could happen again," said Keyes.

"We are delighted to be going to represent Limerick again," said Keyes, who was a member of the panel beaten by Ballyhale Shamrocks on St Patrick's Day 1990.

"At least the monkey is off our back," he said of the county intermediate win.

"This has been a long time coming and I am delighted for this group of players. They have been there for the last couple of years and I have seen them first hand and the way that they have trained and applied themselves is unreal."

"They were unlucky last year and we came in this year and just put a bit of belief in them."

Keyes said that it was self belief that made the difference in 2012.

"They were knocked from pillar to post and called every sort of thing," recalled Keyes of recent years when Ballybrown came so close to glory.

"We tried to put belief into them so that when the games got tough and when they were in a tough game that they could win them. All they had to do was knuckle down and believe in themselves and play for one another."

The addition of Clem Smith and Dave Mahedy to the back room team helped inspire the players.

"They trained away like no other team in the country and are brilliant guys," said Keyes.

Six points in the opening nine minutes set Ballybrown on their way

to victory.

"We got a great start and that is vital in matches like this - we were here for the semi-final when Dromin-Athlacca got a great start and it swings in roundabouts and today it was us that got the start. Our backs were brilliant and our forwards took their chances in the first half and in the second half we kept the scoreboard ticking over."

But Dromin-Athlacca did hit back and ask questions of Ballybrown.

"They got five points in a row but our lads didn't panic - we knew they would come back and get more scores."

If Ballybrown win they will play Ballyduff (Kerry) in the semi-final on November 4 at a Limerick venue.

# Molyneaux on the mark as St Kieran's claim iumior title

Revived by Donie Nolan's 48th minute goal, they clinched success with a long late strike from midfielder Anthony Molyneaux to edge home after a titanic struggle that saw the sides level on eight separate occasions and raised the passions of the big noisy crowd that turned up under the crisp autumn sunshine of Tournafulla.

While they may have been outsiders at the start of the county's most keenly contested championship, Kieran's went in as favourites to this all-West decider on the back of their earlier runaway success in the divisional decider. But Saturday turned out to be an entirely different proposition. Although a long senior football campaign gave them an advantage in conditioning, their opponents had the edge when it came to first touch and made better use of the chances that came their way.

Indeed, up to Nolan's gamechanger goal, Monagea looked the more likely to succeed. While they struggled to win the early ball around the middle, their tightness at the back forced Kieran's into wasteful attempts at scores. And any time one was conceded, the inspirational Seán BETTER known as a football club, Herlihy and the metronomic free-St Kieran's gave a reminder of their taking of John Hough were there to respond.

However, the two-man strike force wasn't able to shoulder the entire Monagea lineup was confined to just three scores over the entire hour as they were crowded out for size or for pace in too many positions. For all their finishing difficulties as they racked up a dozen wides and dropped almost as many shots again into Mark Kelly's hand, Kierans had far more frequent sight of the posts and it eventually paid off.

Jason Brouder and Hough had them level and Herlihy gave them the lead before Kieran's regained the upper hand in the middle when Treacy came on for the injured Timmy Carroll. Danny Collum equalised and Herlihy struck from play and from a free before Nolan's free shaved Monagea's advantage back to 0-6 to 0-5 at the break.

Treacy levelled matters within seconds of the restart as did James Muckell in reply to Herlihy and Nolan after exchanging frees with Hough before the Coolcappa club took the lead for the first time since the opening period. But Nolan's free provoked a Monagea response as Herlihy drove over a pair from distance and then engineered the foul for Hough to put them two ahead.

The gap might have grown had Nolan not hit back straight from the puckout, running wide off the pass to blast beyond Mark Kelly's reach.

And while Michael King levelled immediately, Kierans' tails were up when Mackessy struck twice in succession to leave Monagea searching for a response. They found it in Joe Murphy and Hough's equalising free but couldn't repeat it as Molyneaux drove long, high and straight with a minute to go to signal the celebrations over Ardagh, Coolcappa, Kilcolman and Carrigkerry.






