

ALL Ireland U-21 hurling champions for a fifth time and Limerick did so in sensational style.

From start to finish, Limick dominated this Thurley final with a most compelling style of fast, yet composed and clever, hurling, all bound together by a massive work

ue. Limeriek were simply sensational at times and blew away their opponents to win

36-points. John Kiely's Limerick hit 19 scores from play over the hour and remarkably held Wexford to just three scores from open

play. This was a Wexford team that were beaten in the final 2-months ago and were the championship favourites from the outset.

After three seasons without an U-21 win Limerick were 16/1 outsiders from the outset but justified their 2/5 final odds with a dominant display. inc successive points in

the final 10-minutes scaled the victory and such was the margin of victory thousands Limerick sunnorters streamed onto the sidelines as the final minutes ticked down before invading th semple Stadium pitch at the final whistle, which signalled a 0-26 to 1-7 victory in front of 18.544

Captain Diarmaid Byrnes lifted the Cross of Cashel tro-ply to add to previous wins in 1987, 2000, 2001 and 2002. The victory maintains Lim-

ericks proud record of never losing an All Ireland U-21 hurling final From the early minutes.

Limerick, with 11 starting players underage next season, looked very much on form, playing just as they did to heat Tipperary, Clare and Galway enroute to the final. Limerick were 0-11 to 0-4

ford went 19-minutes without a score as Limerick led 0-8 to 0-2 after 20-minutes.

No rest for Limerick U-21 hurling stars as clubs go centre stage

The next seven days win see 25 crucial club football and hurling ties take place. This Tuesday and Wednesday nights are the

final rounds of group games in the Limerick IFC and SFC. Then next Saturday and

Sunday attention turns to

Sunday attention turns to club hurling fixtures. On Saturday is the first of the Limerick SHC quar-ter finals with Adare playing Ahane in Kilmallock at 5.30 Limerick II-21 leam-mates Jody Hannon (Adare) and Tom and Paddy Moprrissey will be on opposite sides.
The second quarter final

takes place on Sunday at 1.00 in the Gaelic Grounds with champions Kilmallock playing Doon.

Doon will be backed by five II-91 stars - Pat Ryan Richie English, Darragh

Kilmallock's Robbie Hanley was part of the U-21 set-up but injury forced him to miss Saturday's final and could miss the club game.

After two postpor the final round of group games in the club football championship finally takes place over the next 48-hours All 12 clubs can still reach

the knockout stages of the Limerick SEC, albeit more

realistically eight clubs are battling for the six places.

After 24 games not one single club has 100% guaranteed their place in the next round. As the final round of fixtures have worked out there will be a game in either group to determine the even-tual group winner and the side that progresses directly to the semi finals.

In Group One, champi-ons Ballylanders play Drom-Broadford, while in Group Two, Newcastle West play Ballysteen. While the winner of each of these games will advance to the semi fi-nals on October 3, while the loser will have to await the outcome of the remaining two games in the group to confirm if they progress to

the quarter finals.

While mathematically, Rathkeale, Pallasgreen, Adare and St Kierans can reach the knockout stages, their inferior scoring difference comes against them and therefore this quartet are battling to avoid the rel-egation play-off in their final games. None of the quartet face eachother, with each facing opposition attempt ing to book a spot in the quarter finals.

The bottom side in each group will play-off to determine who drops to the in-termediate ranks in 2016. Where two teams finish level on points the result of the game between the pair will determine their league standings, while scoring difference will be used for three or more teams finishing on the same points.
