

LIMERICK BIDS FOR ORE SMELTE

THE Parliamentary Scc-thing to hit the Western Conretaries for East and West Limerick, Dail Deputies from those constituencies as well as those from Clare, North Tipperary and Kerry, and representatives of Limerick Harbour Commissioners are to go on a deputation to the Minister for Industry and Commerce in an effort to have the proposed £15 million ore smelting plant situated in the Limerick region.

This follows publication in certain newspapers that the plant is likely to be situated near Dunkettle, about three miles from Cork City.

Sites in various part of the Shannon Estuary and in the Western Counties have been inspected as probable sites by the Directors of Smelter Corporation of Ireland Ltd., a subsidiary of Northgate Explorations Ltd. The proposed smelter is expected to employ in the region of 700 men when fully operative. The matter was raised by the Mayor of Limerick, Ald. Steve Coughlan, T.D., who said that be was dismayed and disheartened to read that the smelter which he had advocated was reported to be going to an area which is already over-employed.
