## From \$1,000 start to £23.6 billion turnover

OVER 3,000 people rang Dell's jobs hotline phone number last month.

And 700 people took time off from festive shopping to enquire about work in Dell dur-ing Christmas week, while 44 dragged themselves away from the turkey on Christmas Day to make a call.

An intensive recruitment campaign has been underway by the compa-

ny in recent months.

Dell recruits via its web-site, referral schemes by existing staff, stands at high profile events and pumps a

huge amount of revenue into television, radio, newspaper and billboard advertising.

The company says that almost 100 percent of staff in Raheen are now permanent employees.

In 15 years, the company's sales have grown from \$6 million to \$23.6 billion for the past four quarters.

The latest global innovation to come from Dell is its leadership on the Internet and is acknowledged as the largest online commercial seller of computer systems with an average of \$35 million per day in online sales.

## More jobs on offer at Dell's great milestone

COMPUTER Michael Dell and Taoiseach, Bertie officially Ahern opened Dell's first purpose built facility in Raheen on Friday, declaring even more jobs would be on offer at the plant.

Limerick can expect a further 600 jobs when the new European Man-ufacturing Facility EMF3 - reaches full capacity.

It currently employs 1,100 of the 4,500 Dell employees based in Raheen.

In typically high-tech fashion, the new facility was "electronically" opened by the Taoiseach and Michael Dell, the world's youngest billionaire on a stage in front of

hundreds of employees.

"This facility is another great milestone for the company." Mr. Dell told the crowd.

"When we started in Raheen 10 years ago, we had only 120 employees. In 1998, we pledged 3,000 jobs when we announced the largest single job creation plan in the history of Ireland over a three year period to bring our total job numbers to 4,400. A mere two years into that target, we have already exceeded that goal by over 1,000 people

and continue to grow. The new Raheen facility specialises in manufacturing desktop com-

Raw materials are delivered through one side of the building, manufactured in cells by teams and the finished goods are then dis-patched on the other side of the building, destined for direct delivery to customers' offices and homes throughout Europe.

Taoiseach, Bertie Ahern, who made a whistle stop visit to the Raheen plant in the midst of discussions regarding the Peace Process, praised Dell's progressive policy on employee training and upskilling.

He commented: "By creating a first class environment for e-commerce, by investing in R&D, and by building on partnerships with companies like Dell, we are turning Ireland into a powerhouse of the digital age."

Mr Ahern said the company is "truly one of the giants of the global technology industry" and "one of Ireland's leading employers".

"Dell's decision to locate in Limerick is testament to the economic policies of the last decade and we've built on the country's greatest resource, our people," he
