His mother, the Dowager Countess, died eight years ago at the age of 99. Lord Castlestewart's ancestors held the Scottish baronies of Avondale and Ochiltree, but they sold those dignities for cash, and received an Irish peerage from James I by way of compensation. The Earl's house contains a valuable collection of pictures. A first cousin is heir-presumptive to the Earldom and other Irish titles, as Lord Castlestewart has no sons. His two daughters are married to soldiers.
