# Local philanthropist honoured at City Hall as link added to mayoral chain

# JP set to be a part of history

PHILANTHROPIST JP Mc-Manus is due at City Hall today for a special ceremony honouring his contribution to the city.

A link is to be added to the historic mayoral chain of office at a low-key ceremony, which will be attended by former Mayor Kevin Kiely, current Mayor Jim Long and the families of Mr McManus, and Limerick football club chairman Pat O'Sullivan, who has funded the link.

The medallion was crafted by city jeweller JJ Kenneally's

Cllr Kiely is the first politician to add a link to the chain since 2007 when the then Mayor Joe Leddin added a link to honour the contribution the Keyes and Leddin families made to the city.

During his mayoralty, Mr McManus' horse 'Don't Push It', ridden by AP McCoy, rode to victory in the 2010 Grand National.

Following this, the Martinstown man was honoured with

a civic reception. Now, Cllr Kiely has invited JPMcManus to City Hall.

The new medallion will be the 77th solid gold piece on the Mayoral chain.

Speaking ahead of today's ceremony, sponsor Mr O'Sullivan said: "Countless groups and individuals have benefited in ways they could only dream about, through the generosity of the McManus family. In times like we have presently, the region is very lucky to have such an inspiring and generous family within our community."

The history of the Mayoral chain stretches back to the early 19th century.

# Twenty properties bought by City Hall this year

THE PROPERTY crash could boost Limerick City Council's property portfolio as City Hall have already bought 20 homes to date this year.

One city councillor even asserted that such has been the downturn that homes in exclusive parts of the city - such as the North Circular and South Circular Roads - are now being snapped up at bargain prices.

But Kieran Lehane, director of service at City Hall, said he was not aware of any homes being purchased in these two

Mr Lehane said the number of properties they have bought to date this year is "low", but more deals are on the way un-

der the council's €46m housing budget.

Of that figure, €35m has been earmarked for Regeneration projects, which would include relocation of individuals or families from these disadvantaged estates, but Mr Lehane said the number of people leaving regeneration areas is low at present.

It is understood that the council has a budget in the region of €200,000 to spend per house, and are cashing in on bargain properties as people are desperate to sell.

With many home-owners in

negative equity and looking to off-load their investments, there is a glut of properties on the market, with over 3,000 for sale in Limerick.

Mayor of Limerick, Fine Gael councillor Jim Long, explained that the council's policy is to buy only three to four properties in any one area and then impose a 'buying moratorium' on that area, and move on to another part of the city.

The mayor said the council are "very selective and careful" in which houses and areas they buy, and not all

areas they buy, and not all are for people being relocated under the Regeneration programme. Tenants being relocated to any part of the city also undergo strict vetting.
