 mise incalculable results. Placed, as no doubt
 they will be, in all leading thoroughfares in cities
 and towns, the most fastidious can allay their
 thirst, as to each is given a separate cup to drink
 from. Canon Bagot stated at a meeting in Lon-
 don last week that by the introduction of these
 machines he was fulfilling a promises he made
 some years ago when he was addressing for the
 first time, a Church of Ireland temperance meet-
 ing in Dublin, that his work for the temperance
 cause would be to try and place before the masses
 of our people wholesome non alcoholic drinks,
 good and cheap, and as easily to be obtained as
 alcoholic. With regard to the utility of these
 machines for the distribution of pure milk, some
 of the largest milk sellers in England expressed
 an opinion that they would be largely used for
 that purpose by them, as by placing these ma-
 chines in the district they serve, their customers
 can obtain fresh milk any hour of the day as
 cheaply as if delivered at their houses, and that
 in this way much of the expense connected with
 a house to house delivery may be saved. Canon
 Bagot intends applying to the Corporation for
 permission to erect two or three test machines in
 Dublin.
