N last Thursday afternoon the distinguished Limerick writer, Miss Kate O'Brien. presented a portrait of herself by the late James Sleator, R.H.A., to the Limerick Art Gallery. Stating how pleased she was to make the presentation, Miss C'Brien added: "I know James Sleator would be pleased, too. He was a very distinguished and accomplished painter; he liked this picture, and he would be glad, to know that his work is going to hang in my home town."

James Sleator was a pupil of Orpen and was formerly President of the Royal Hibernian Acamedy. The portrait, which is in oils, was completed in 1947, a few months before Sleator's death.
