Exports to the value of £1 million KRUPS OFFICIALLY

Employs 480 people

A FURTHER phase in Limerick's forward march in the industrial sphere was marked to-day, when Mr. Sean Flanagan, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Industry and Commerce, Dr. Hillery, officially opened Krups factory in the Roxboro' Road.

The new factory, which employs 480 people, manufactures electrical appliances and bathroom scales, and exports to many European countries to the value of £1 million per year.

The attendance at the opening included the Mayor of Limerick, Mr. Frank Leddin; the German Ambassador, Dr. Truetzschler; the World Trade Queen, Miss Kathy Dent, and Dr. Wittman, Managing Director of Krups. The Minister for Industry and Commerce, Dr. Hillery, who was to have performed the official opening, could not attend because of an emergency Cabinet meeting.

Designed along ultra-modern lines, the new factory stands on a 15 acre site just outside the city. The grounds include several houses for the executives of the company, a swimming pool, a tennis court and children's playground.

GROWN QUICKLY

Krups Engineering Ltd., is the Irish Branch of Robert Krups, Solingen, West Germany. The idea of building a factory here came up when the Directors of Robert Krups visited the country. After negotiations with the Industrial Development Authority, a site in Limerick was selected.

In 1963, 70 persons were flown to Germany to be trained in the main factories. Krups Engineering Ltd., has grown quickly, the number of employees has now gone up from 70 to 450.

Production began when the factory building was completed in June, 1964, and soon it is hoped to add hair-dryers to their range of electrical goods.

FAMILY CONCERN

The firm of Robert Krups was founded as a family concern in 1846. The management is now in the hands of two grandsons of Robert Krups, Dr. Karl Koerner, who is responsible for the commercial side, and Mr. Fritz Krups, who looks after technical matters. The firm employs 2,700 persons in five factories in Germany and Ireland.

The luncheon, which was to

Early Irish Society
