

Returned for trial

Cyril Tuohy, stated to be a native of Limerick, but charged under a Dublin address, was returned for trial in custody to Limerick Circuit Court on October 15 when he pleaded guilty at the City Court to-day to a serious offence against a young girl at N.C. Rd., Limerick, and also to breaking into the Limerick Golf Club at Ballyough on two occasions and stealing goods and cash to a total value of £255-8-3, and to the larceny of 7 gallons of petrol.

Girls fined £1 each

Limerick City Court was told to-day of how a Garda chased a number of girls from Union Cross to Sarsfield Bridge to catch up with them, as they were cycling three abreast. Justice M. de Burca imposed a fine of £1 against each defendant and commented: "These people seem to have no consideration for traffic at all or for their own lives."

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN JAPANESE AND IRISH INDUSTRIES OUTLINED

LIMERICK GIRLS GO TO GERMANY FOR TRAINING

ELABORATE arrangements have been made to ensure the moral and physical welfare of the young girls who are at present in Soligen, Germany, undergoing a special training course that will fit them for positions in the new Krups engineering factory at the Roxboro' Road, Limerick.

The first batch of 18 girls left Limerick on Thursday morning and arrived at Soligen in the afternoon. They will be there until next May.

The girls, whose ages range from 18 upwards, are mostly from Co. Limerick, the city and a few from Co. Clare.

SATISFIED

A spokesman for the factory said that they were very satisfied with the standard of the girls selected, and it was hoped that a further batch of girls would be recruited in the near future.

They will stay in the Catholic girls hostels. For some months

Mr. McCutcheon, who will be in charge of the technical side of the factory at Roxboro', has been in Soligen inspecting the hostels and the factories where the girls are being trained.

MORAL WELFARE

The girls would be constantly in touch with the Catholic clergy there and everything was being done to ensure their moral and physical welfare while undergoing training. The hostels, which are for girls only, were conducted in an excellent manner.

On Thursday a further group comprising 19 boys and some more girls, will be flown out for the same period of training and under the same conditions. Later a further group of girls will go out.

Jailed for begging
