Ryan, of the Tipperary Cavalry, of the noted robber Meehan, being in the neighbourhood of Lattin, with his gang, levying contributions on the inhabitants; he immediately ordered out his Corps, which have been indefatigable in the pursuit of Meehan and his gang; and having closely pursued him last Saturday night and Sunday morning, obliged him and his party to quit the neighbourhood, and take shelter in a shrubbery near Sollihead, in consequence of which he was taken by a party of Farmers, who have associated as suffering Loyalists, and who are sanctioned to keep arms by General Sir James Duff.—Too much applause cannot be given to the Tipperary Cavalry, for their constant and spirited exertions; and it is a happy reflection to find the Peasantry of the Country come forward and exert themselves at the risk of their lives, to apprehend such daring disturbers of the public peace.
