LIMERICK.—MARCH 12.

This being the day appointed by Proclamation for a General Fast, the same was observed in this City with due reverence—the shops, &c. were shut up, and Divine Worship performed in all the Churches, Chapels, and Meeting-Houses.

It could not be expected that in the hasty manner we received on Saturday last the account of the shocking murder committed at Manister, it could be literally correct:—A Gentleman who was on the Inquest, has favoured us with the following particulars: It appeared that at a late hour on Friday night, a great number of villains, armed with muskets, Swords and pikes, attacked the house of Mr. John Boland, of Manister, and demanded his arms; at the same time a considerable part of the Banditti, on horseback, were placed at a distance to keep watch; Mr. Boland, with his brother, James, and his sons, Mathew and James, were in the house in bed, (as were Mrs. Boland and her two daughters)—on the first alarm, the men got up and determined to defend their house and property, with that spirit which as Yeomen and Loyalists they were most remarkable; after firing a number of shots amongst the barbarous assassins, (several of whom there is good reason to believe done execution)—unfortunately for this brave family the house was attacked, and the wretches set the same on fire, which caused them to come out; in consequence of which Mr. John Boland—his brother, James,—his two sons, James and Mat. were butchered in a manner shocking to relate: the latter lived until next morning, but died without giving any account of the murderers.—It also appeared to the Inquest, that Edmund Boland, brother to Mr. John B. who lay in a neighbouring house, was coming to the assistance of his family, and was murdered between the bridge of Manister and the house which was burned down.—To add to this more than hellish outrage, poor Mrs. Boland, who, with her daughters, narrowly escaped from the flames, has become quite deranged, and the recovery of the daughters still continue doubtful.

Sunday morning, by orders of General Sir James Duff, Barr. detachments from the Clare Militia, under the command of Captain Blood, marched hence for the following places, viz.—50 for Bruff—50 for Croom—and 50 for Emly; and on Monday a detachment from the Larcastrite Cavalry proceeded for Bruff—it is hoped that an end will now be put to the Barbarities which have lately disgraced this County, and that the Magistrates and loyal inhabitants in the neighbourhood where Military assistance has been sent, will not only exert themselves to prevent future depredations, but be active in apprehending the wretches who have committed murders that would disgrace the most brutal Savages.

Sunday night, some of those deluded wretches who persevere in disturbing the peace of this County, to need up above fourteen acres of lay ground, near Pallas-green—they also cut down

The Dublin Society has made the following resolution:—

"The Dublin Society think it incumbent upon them, on account of the high price of potatoes and grain, to recommend it to all farmers immediately to plant a large quantity of early potatoes, to supply the demands of their respective neighbourhoods; and that the entire spring work be forwarded with as much expedition as possible, thereby to get their work out of the way, which will enable the cottagers to apply themselves to their own work, and which will consequently produce an early and extensive harvest."

It is not quite thirty years since the culture of Potatoes was first introduced into Sweden by the great Linnæus. The part of this excellent plant, which, in other countries, is thrown upon the dunghill, or suffered to rot upon the ground, is, in Sweden, converted to a profitable use. The stalk or the haulm they give to their cattle, either green or when dried in the sun; and stacked like pea and bean straw, and the leaves they cure as tobacco, and use it for smoking. Among the peasantry, and in Swedish armies, the dried leaves of potatoes are almost universally used for smoking instead of tobacco.

It is recommended to the Merchants who may have spare stalls of Beef or Pork in their stores, as well as to the Humane in general, to lend in immediate assistance to the House of Industry, where at present a greater number of poor have got admittance than at any former period; and from the very great rise in Provisions, the Fund is by no means adequate to their maintenance.

Whereas on the night of the 7th of March the House of John Boland, of Manister, Co. of Limerick, was attacked by a great number of desperate assassins who let his house on fire with the most savage inhumanity, murdered his two sons and two brothers, after a gallant defence; Now we whose names are under holding in detestation such cruel barbarity, as terminated, as far as in our power, to bring to the perpetrators of them Murders, do prom to apply to the hands of Major-General Sir Duff, Major Harding, Michael Furnell, Esq; Tuthill, Esq; and William Johnson Bart who we appoint our Committee, the fumes names annexed, of which we empower them the sum of Two Hundred Pounds to the persons who shall give any of them such private information may lead to the discovery and conviction of any one of the perpetrators of their cruel and not disclose the name of the person such information; and although the person such information should have been principally concerned in them murders, we pledge ourselves not only shall receive the rewards, but the application shall be made to Government for pardon. Any of our committee are empowered the person giving any of them such information against any other six of the Murderers, so they may be apprehended and convicted within months, the sum of 50l. for each person to be paid; and in order to deter the deluded people this County from persevering in nocturnal depredations, our Committee are required to pay the sum of 50l. to such person as shall give any timely private information as any intended, full meeting, so as that the unlawful design misguided people be frustrated; and we empower our Committee to dispose of the sum by us subscribed, in such manner they conceive may best contribute to the better of the peace of our County.
