

of deliberate wilful, and great impiety for the common good of the empire, and therefore be implicitly submitted to by every

He concluded by moving a resolution for the Churches of Great Britain and Ireland in one common discipline, and to fit in the Convocation.

Right Hon. Mr. OGLE said he should vote that this as against every other measure in the Bill of Union, which he should oppose in every way.

It proposed an advantageous privilege or exemption to the Church of Ireland that it did not already enjoy, nor any other alteration favorable of subjecting its Clergy to be summoned to the English Synods.

From the whole tenor of the Right Hon. Genl's argument, it would seem that some measure was to be adopted by the Imperial Parliament subversive of the Protestant Ascendancy and; say, he had heard, that the British Emperor had at one time declared he had doubts whether the Catholic or the Protestant religion should be the predominant one in Ireland, and he would that circumstance be denied? If he thought any British Minister, in his reveries, should dream of such a principle, the Protestant Gentlemen of Ireland would exert their duty by the Constitution, if they reported a measure that could enable a British Emperor to subvert the Protestant Ascendancy in Ireland. For his part, he should oppose this, and every other making part of the Bill of Union.

The question being put, it passed in the affirmative without a division.

Mr. SOL GEN. proceeded to move the resolution that all the laws, civil and ecclesiastic, in this country, be annihilated, and be replaced by a new constitution on the Irish Constitution of the Irish Bar.— This motion passed without a division, when the Chairman left the Chair, reported progress, and ordered to sit again on Friday.— House adjourned.

That when the price of wheat exceeded 40 pounds sterling the barrel, the Lord Mayor should be empowered to affix bread

By the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland, A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas we have received information upon Oath, that on the night of Wednesday the 18th day of February last, the House of the Rev. Richard Cox, Rector of the Parish of Cahircroiliff, in the County of Limerick, was attacked by a large number of men armed with pikes, guns, and swords, and having broke into the same, several of them came up stairs into the room in which John Hanceen, his steward, and James Evans, his servant man lay, and did violently seize the said James Evans, and dragged him down stairs, and did whip, cut, and abuse him in a barbarous manner and threatened him with instant death if he did not discover where his Master's Tythe Books and Notes were, and upon his promising to do so, he escaped from them.

Now we the Lord Lieutenant and Council, having a just abhorrence of such atrocious crimes, being determined as far as in us lies, to bring the persons concerned in the said outrage to speedy and condign punishment, do hereby offer a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS,

to any person or persons who shall, within six calendar months from the date hereof, discover or apprehend all or any, of the first three persons concerned in the said outrage, so as that they be prosecuted and convicted of the same.

And if any of the persons concerned in the said outrage, do, or shall, within the time aforesaid, discover his, her, or their accomplice or accomplices, so as that he, she, or they shall be apprehended, prosecuted, and convicted as aforesaid, such person shall not only be entitled to the said reward, but shall also receive his Majesty's most gracious Pardon for the said offence.

And we do hereby charge and command all Loving, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, and all other his Majesty's loyal subjects, to be aiding and assisting in apprehending all and every of the person or persons who was, or were concerned in committing the said outrage.— Given at the Council Chamber in Dublin, the 18th day of March 1800.
