

burgh, viz. thole of the zillt and 25th. They are extremely barren, the weather being having been hitherto unfavourable for military operations. There are, however, been some skirmishes in Italy, but without producing any decisive advantages to either party.

The Russians are again reported to be marching back to the Rhine. Our readers, however, will not credit the fact, till they have more evidence of its truth than mere rumour.

It is also reported, that the Russians mean to oppose the return of the French army from Egypt, but with what truth we know not.

General Don, and the Russian General Essen, have been exchanged for the three French Generals taken at the battle of Novi—Generals Perignon, Grouchy, and another. General Don and his Lady are daily expected in town.

General Knox is detained at Calais in consequence of some informality in his passport.

By private letters from the Squadron cruising off Malta, dated the 28th February, we learn that the French are cooped up in the fort of Valetta, and have not another foot of territory on the Island; and it is known that they are in want of every necessary, except bread, which they have in abundance. It is thought that being disappointed of the supplies which the Genereux and her convoy were bringing them, the Commander will surrender the place.

Lord Keith is gone with the major part of his fleet to Genoa, upon which we understand an attack is to be made both by sea and land; and it is supposed, that before now it is in the hands of the allies.

It is confidently asserted, that the British Fleet has failed; a good account we hope will be given of them by our brave tars.

The Duc de Choiseul, who was wrecked off Calais with some other Emigrant Nobiles, and who were long confined in prison in France, arrived in town last week from Hamburg.

Friday morning last, Major Ingram, of the Fencibles, fell, in a state of intoxication, from a two pair of stairs window, in the King's Bench, and immediately expired. The Major was arrested on the 5th ult. for a debt of 50l. and has since had another detainer lodged against him for 40l. both of which claims were loon to have been adjusted by a suit residing at Bath. From this fatal circumstance, Mr. Jones, the Marshal, has been induced to commit to the New Gaol three keepers of drinking-shops, who will take their trial for the offence, as it is strictly prohibited by an Act of Parliament.—The Coroner's Jury have returned a verdict of Accidental Death.

This morning three Freshmen were brought to town from Dover, under the care of one of his Majesty's Messengers, and escorted by a party of the 15th Light Dragoons: they are charged with being Epies, but the circumstances of their accusation have not yet inspired.

The three men, James Kirk or Quirk, John Ready, and ——— M'Kittick, all natives of Ireland, who topped the post by carrying the mail on horseback from Warrington to Wigan on the 5th of February last, between Ashton and Park Lane, were capitally convicted on Saturday last at the Lancaster Assizes.

We this day received Paris Journals of the 17th Germinal (28th ult.) brought to Diver by a neutral vessel, which cleared out at Calais for Hamburg with merchandize. The following are the only articles they contain which are at all worthy of notice:

The Minister of General Police to the Prefect. "Citizens Prefect—Malevolent persons spread a report, which the credulous repeat, that the Emigrants return to the French territories, and establish themselves without interruption. To judge of the fate of the Emigrants only by what people affect to believe, we might say, that they have nothing to do but to come and repose in the bosom of the Republic, and carry on their attempts against it. An amnesty has been granted to the insurgents of the West, who have laid

possession of the Ex-Venetian Islands. This intelligence however, we will not venture to confirm.

BERLIN, March 11.

A singular report is in circulation here: Austria is to yield the country of Sandomir, with Cracow, to Prussia, provided Prussia will take upon itself the burden of all the debts of ancient Poland, that is to say, however, that Prussia shall only be compelled to pay the debts which are charged upon Austria.

An article has been published here, which will appear in one of our Journals a few days hence: "This is the plan that Sieyes would have adopted, if Buonaparte had not come home in time: it was, to spare a Spanish Prince on the Throne of France as a Constitutional King. Mr. Wolmar the Editor of the Journal, pretends that he received the Journal from France."

House of Commons—Wednesday, April 2.

Mr. PITT presented a Message from his Majesty, which was read by the Speaker. It expressed the high satisfaction his Majesty felt in being able to inform the House that he had received an Address from the Houses of Lords and Commons of the Irish Parliament, with Resolutions annexed, declaring their entire consent to an incorporating Union between Great Britain and Ireland.—The Message concluded with congratulating the House on the approaching accomplishment of this important and desirable object.—Mr. Pitt brought up the Resolutions which were offered to lie on the table.

Mr. Pitt moved, that the House do on to-morrow fortnight resolve itself into a Committee of the whole, to take the Message into consideration.—Agreed to.

County Limerick Royal Yeoman Cavalry

The 62d Regiment is to march hence on Friday next, to replace the 16th, at Fermoy.

The trials of Stokes, Slattery, and Sheehy, (as mentioned in our former publication), before the General Court Martial, terminated on Saturday evening last,—after which the Court adjourned to this day. Their sentences are not yet known.

Monday, James Flannery and Mathew Gleeson, were brought in by a party of the Leuth Regiment from Nenagh, and lodged in our Co. Gaol;—they were transmitted from New Geneva, by an order from General Sir James Duff.

On Monday last, James and John Noonan, and Michael Vaughan, the murderers of the late Mr. James Allen, were taken by Mr. Sheriff Lloyd, and a detachment of the Lancashire Dragoons, to the house of the former convict, on the high road near Mount Shannon, where a Gallows was erected, on which the three Culprits made their exit; after which their bodies were brought to the Co. Limerick Infirmary, to be anatomized, agreeable to their sentence:—The three wretched Men fully and unequivocally acknowledged the barbarous deed, yet we regret that we could not discover that they felt it to be that crime of all others, which must occupy the Soul of the Perpetrator with deep horror, and that repentance which never need to be repeated of!

The Assizes for this City ended on Monday evening, when James Linton, convicted of having conspired the death of the late Mr. James Allen, was sentenced to be executed on Saturday the 26th inst.—Many of these Genary, both male and female, who have for several Assizes past in this City, escaped the hands of Justice, through the benign interpretation of our invaluable Laws, were sentenced to the House of Correction, or to find bail for better behaviour.

Yesterday morning the Assizes for this County ended, which proved *Maiden*;—most of those persons who were taken for the barbarous acts lately committed therein, being to be tried by a General Court-Martial.

Yesterday the Judges of Assize, proceeded on their Circuit to Tralee.
