

day or two after, he assigned to him. He did believe that there were many then in the House that would credit the zeal and anxiety he at all times showed for forwarding Inland Navigation could not have proceeded from such a pecuniary consideration. His objects were, to secure to the city of Dublin provisions if they were in the kingdom, and to increase agriculture, on which the prosperity of every country depended. In his opinion the Union would not have been completed without encouragement given to Inland Navigation, and he was certain that Inland Navigation could not succeed without the Union.—As both these great objects were now nearly accomplished, he had no difficulty in declaring to the House, that he was under the fullest conviction of mind that with the further aid of the high character and brilliant talents of the Noble Lord, (which no Member of the House can doubt) that we shall be a peaceful, prosperous, rich and happy country.

The new clause and the bill were then ordered to be engrossed, and after having disposed of several other orders of the day, the House adjourned to Tuesday.

The House of Commons on Tuesday evening was wholly occupied by the Committee on the loan bill, in which Mr. L. White was heard by Counsel against the clause pronouncing his deposits a forfeiture; but as nothing materially differing from what was urged on a former day took place, we forbore entering into a detail which would be but repetition.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer moved a saving clause to enable Mr. White to relief in equity against the enactment of the bill, and the House being refused, the report was ordered to be received yesterday.

Wednesday, the House of Commons resolved into committee on the bill for continuing certain acts to prevent tumultuous risings, agreed to the provisions with several amendments submitted by Mr. Prime Serjeant.—Mr. O'Hara proposed to limit the amount of tolls on the River Shannon, and the Cuts communicating therewith, when the same shall be made navigable. The clause was rejected, and the bill read a third time and passed.—Adjourned to Thursday.

It is supposed that an adjournment of the House of Commons will take place about Friday or Saturday next, until the Bills shall have returned from England, when the session and the local Legislature of Ireland will be determined by the Royal Assent given to the Act of Union, and a speech delivered from the Throne.

The blockade of Genoa appears to have been ultimately the ruin of the Austrian affairs in Italy, for if General Ott's forces had been united to those of General Melas, though Massena and his garrison had been at liberty to march out of Genoa, the battle of Marengo would very probably have turned to the disadvantage of the French, which, without such assistance, was so long doubtful. Thus affairs in Italy would have taken a quite different turn from what they have done.

One of the most singular novelties in Government to which these times have given rise, is the establishment of a Republic, though aristocratical, composed of the Greek Islands in the Archipelago, under the protection of the Grand Seignior and the Emperor of Russia!

Our five per cent. on Tuesday on the stocks exchange fell to 87.—We had also the funds in London have suffered some depression, on a report that the Court of Vienna had determined, notwithstanding the late disastrous defeat of the Austrian armies in Italy and Sardinia to continue the war for some time at least, if not for another campaign.
