

On Tuesday last a division of the homeward-bound West-India Fleet, consisting of about fifty sail, under convoy of the Brunswick and Retaliation, passed up Channel on their way to the River. On Sunday last, the remainder, consisting of about twenty sail, under convoy of the Aquilon frigate, of 32 guns, parted company with the Irish and British Channels. The whole fleet had a pleasant passage of 45 days; and it does not appear that any of them are missing.

By the interference of the French Commissary at Amsterdan, the passengers on board the Dolphin Packet were set at liberty, and allowed to proceed by land to the places of their destination.

The Prince Regent of Portugal has offered the chief command of all his troops to Count de Guiz, a Lieutenant General in the Danish service, and formerly Adjutant to Frederick the Great.
