

TRINI ASSIZES.

Wednesday, August 27, 1830.

Thomas and John Carton were tried for the wilful murder of Charles Cassidy, of Kilmahinham-wood, in this county, (Meath) on the 11th of June last.

It appeared in evidence, that the two prisoners (brothers) went after the parade of yeomanry, to which Thomas belonged, into a public-house at Kilmahinham-wood; that it being the fair-day, the house was much frequented, and (as too commonly happens in such houses) several quarrels had taken place amongst the different guests, which the Landlord swore the Cartons, and particularly Thomas, had exerted themselves to make up; that towards the close of the day, a number of persons named Cassidy came into the room in which the prisoners sat, and continued to drink (though not in their company) for some time.

Thus far the evidence for the prosecution and the prisoners agreed entirely.

The witnesses for the prosecution, who were part of the Cassidy's company, swore, that as they were about to leave the room, Thomas Carton, suddenly started from his seat, struck the deceased on the head, and drawing his bayonet, stabbed him in the breast, and afterwards as he was falling, wounded him in the head, and this without any previous quarrel or conversation whatever; and that the other prisoner snatched a bayonet from a yeoman (Hugh McKibben) who was present, and desired his brother to stab them all, for that "they were the boys that could work."

On the other hand, Hugh McKibben swore that the Cassidy's from the time they came in, endeavoured to insult the Cartons, and that at length the deceased challenged either of them to a wrestle, which they assented, knowing that three yeomen, one of them unarmed, would have no chance in a contest with fire or fire Cassidy and their friends the whole mob of the fair—but at length the deceased struck Thomas Carton, who in his own defence drew his bayonet and wounded him.

It was urged on the part of the prisoners that they had been very active yeomen, and had as such incurred the displeasure of the Cassidy's; whose nephew, one Philip Gearty, a notorious rebel, they had seized and sent to Carrig, where he was hanged for high treason.

The jury took a long time to consider the case, and returned a verdict of Guilty against Thomas Carton, acquitting the other prisoner.

The Judge (Kelly) then pronounced sentence of death on Thomas Carton, directing that the execution should take place on Friday morning at 8 o'clock.

At five o'clock on Friday morning, a brother of the prisoner came to the prison to see the unhappy convict, and informed the gaoler that Mr. Wainwright the clergyman would attend in a short time to pray with and administer the Sacrament to his brother. The learned Judge had very humbly directed that his relations should have access to the prisoner, so that the brother was permitted to go into the condemned cell to him—in some time after the gaoler came to acquaint the brothers that the time was very short, that his orders for the hour of execution were peremptory, and that if the clergyman was expected they had better send for him, it being nearly 6 o'clock—the brother offered to go for him, and accordingly did so. Shortly after Mr. Wainwright came, and being shown into the cell, continued a long time in prayer with the prisoner.

Eight o'clock was approaching, when the gaoler came in, accompanied by the prisoner's uncle. The clergyman then told the prisoner that he had no time to lose, that his uncle was come to

Extract from the last Game Act.—Any person keeping any grey-hound, hound, pointer, setting-dog, spaniel or other dog, or any gun, net, or other engine, for taking or destruction of any hare, pheasant, partridge, heath-fowl, commonly called black game, or grouse, commonly called red game, or any other game whatsoever, without having obtained a licence according to law, is subject to a fine of 20s.—Also a fine of 50s. on persons using dogs, guns, &c. who do not produce their licence, or tell their names and places of residence on being required by a person producing a licence.
