

ENGLAND.

PLYMOUTH, Sept. 3. Last evening a vessel arrived here from Quiberon Bay, which left that place on the 22^d ultimo, on which day the Expedition failed from thence, consisting of 8 or 10 sail of the line, under the command of Rear-Admiral Sir J. B. Warren, and Capt. Sir Edw. Pellew, with about 60 sail of transports, having on board 20,000 troops, and to revenue cutters; their destination is variously spoken of, such as Belle Isle, Corunna, and Malta: they were last seen steering to the fourthward, with the wind at N. N. W. off the Ile of Houat.

LONDON, September 4 & 5.

Yesterday, after our Paper was at press, we received the Paris Journals to the 31st ult. inclusive. Reports contained in these papers, that the Austrian Cabinet had not acceded to the propositions carried by General Droc to Vienna; that the armistice would be instantly declared at an end; that the different Commanders had received orders to proceed immediately to their posts, &c.

The Hamburg Mail due yesterday arrived this morning. All that can be gathered from the accounts received is, that nothing decisive has transpired respecting the state of the negotiations, and that both parties are strengthening themselves to be ready for hostilities should the negotiations fail.—Every thing else, both in the French and German papers, is mere conjecture.

Two French flags of truce, both of them bringing dispatches, arrived at Dover yesterday.

SEPTEMBER 5.

Yesterday advices were received from Minorca. By these we learn, that the 35th regiment, which is nineteen hundred strong, has been sent to Malta. The forces under General Abercrombie, consisting of about nine thousand men, have failed to the Eastward, supposed to be destined for Egypt; and the General had left orders that the four thousand men which were landed on the Island of Houat, but were afterwards re-embarked for the Mediterranean, should follow him. Among these are several hundred cavalry.

The same letters add, that Sir Ralph Abercrombie, not being aware that Genos had relapsed into the power of the enemy, was on the point of entering into that harbour. He was informed in good time by a schooner of the circumstance, and of the changes which had taken place in consequence of the battle of Marengo. But for this timely advice, that much respected Commander would most probably have been made a prisoner.

Captain Sir Home Popham arrived at the Admiralty last night with dispatches from Admiral Dickson, and Lord Whitworth.

Many rumours were immediately circulated, and we have not yet been able to learn the precise particulars communicated by these dispatches.

It is asserted that the Court of Denmark positively refused in the first instance to acknowledge the right of Britain to search Danish ships in time of war. In consequence force only could settle the question, and it is said that the fortresses of Chronberg were taken possession of by our fleet, after the exchange of a few shot.

The Court of Denmark, it is said, then acceded to Lord Whitworth's demands, and consented to pay the expense of our armament. In consequence the dispute has terminated for the present, and orders, it is said, were last night dispatched to release the Freya Danish frigate and her convoy.

To this conduct on the part of Denmark, if the above particulars are correct, it will be seen that the Danes have avoided the implicit admission of our right, and may at any time plead that a force was employed which they could not resist, and which of course imposed whatever terms it thought proper.

AS all Licenses to Distillers for keeping Still will expire on the 29th instant, when new Licenses will be issued, Notice is hereby given, that previous to the issuing of such Licenses, the content of every Still is to be ascertained, and that in measuring a Still, the Head, and every Appendix thereto, so high as the Steam can ascend, are to be measured as Part of the Still; that Distillers before obtaining a License, are to give Security to Work not less than 150 Days within the Year, for which time they will be subject to Duty for the use of quantity of Spirits, according to the content of the Still to be measured. Where a Distiller shall sell more Stills than one, there must be a difference two Inches in the diameter of their Necks, the half the quantity of Corn from which Spirits shall be made, may be unmaltd Corn, in consideration of which, an additional Duty per Gallon, equal to the Duty of half the quantity of Malt necessary for making a Gallon of Spirits, has been imposed, and if Distillers shall not shew, by Permits to Malt into their Distilleries, that the Malt permitted thereto from their Malt Stores amounts to the quantity necessary for distilling a Gallon of Spirit, allowing half the Corn to be unmaltd, they are to be charged with a further Sum equal to the Duty of the deficiency of the Malt, to protect themselves against which, it will be necessary that they regularly get Permits to their Distillery; and Returns of the Officers are evidence of the Charges against Distillers in the same manner as they originally were by the act of Excise of Charles II. and Distillers are not allowed to have Wafh of Molasses sweet Water, and of Corn at the same time.
