This day, Michael Hogan, found guilty of perjury before a General Court Martial, received 250 lashes near the New-bridge; he is to receive the remainder of his punishment at Fedamore.

Resolved, That the present Market at the head of William-street, be the place for the purchase of Wheat; Bank-Place and the Market-house, for Oats and Barley, until more suitable places be found;—and all the Quays for what Grain may come by Water.

Resolved, That we will (when necessary) cooperate with the Mayor, in carrying out the above Resolutions into effect, and that they commence on Monday the 12th inst.
