

...a second time at that place, to which the last
 ...confessions admitted him to have retreated.
 This morning arrived the Hamburgh Mail of
 the 15th, due yesterday, brought over in the
 prels packet, Capt. Dell. She left Cuxhaven
 the 17th, and reached Yarmouth yesterday.
 The intelligence from Switzerland by this mail is
 of so late a date as that brought by the
 French Journals. The head-quarters of the
 Archduke were still at Donaueschingen on the
 11th inst. On the 3d the Prince repaired to the
 Austrian army at Tengen, to hold a grand Coun-
 cil of War, after which great changes were ex-
 pected to take place in the command of the vari-
 ous corps.

The Vienna Court Gazette of the 5th, con-
 tains the intelligence from Savigliano, of the
 forming of Pignerol by the Imperialists. The
 Court Gazette contains also the official report of
 the Archduke respecting the affairs of Switzer-
 land, which states, that General Petrasch, after
 General Horze was killed early in the morning,
 retreated towards Lichtensteg, after having ar-
 ranged the necessary plans with Generals Linke
 and Jellachich, for the safety of the Grison
 country and the Vorarlberg. The Archduke
 further states, that he had hastened with the
 greater part of his army towards Switzerland,
 after leaving a sufficient corps under Prince Sch-
 warzenberg to cover Manheim.

An official letter of the Archduke Charles,
 dated Donaueschingen, October 7, states, that
 on the 26th ult. Field-marshal Linke defeated
 the enemy, and took prisoners 1300 men, with
 the whole of the Staff. The same letter states,
 also, that a circular letter had that morning
 (Oct. 7) been received from Field-Marshal Su-
 warrow, with an account of his having defeated
 the enemy near Glarus, and taken 1000 prisoners.
 The column of the Imperial Russian General Ro-
 zenberg at the same time made 1000 of the enemy
 prisoners near Matten, and took several pieces of
 cannon. These accounts agree in part with the
 French details, but do not come down so late by
 two days, Massena's official details being of the
 9th instant, and the Archduke's of the 7th.

General Don is now at Amsterdam, with a
 flag of truce, where there are, it is said, at this
 time some Prussian officers. The object of his
 mission is reported to be, to treat for the peaceable
 evacuation of Holland, by our army. It is
 also remarkable, that the King of Prussia has
 taken a particular interest in this business.

It having been lately stated in the public pa-
 pers, (and copied also into this, STAR,) that
 the crops of corn and wheat in America, have
 been very much injured, we are happy to be able
 to contradict those statements, by the following
 short extract of a letter, dated 11th of August
 last, to a very respectable mercantile house in
 the city:—

"The wheat harvest has been plentiful, and
 there never was, I believe, generally speaking,
 such appearances of abundant crops of Indian
 corn as are now; one month more will put them
 out of the reach of damage from droughts and
 gulls."

We are truly concerned to relate, that on
 Thursday night last, a barbarous murder was
 committed on the body of Mr. James Allen,
 chief Steward to the Right Hon. the Earl of
 Clare, at Mount-Shannon, in the Liberties of
 this City; it appeared on investigation before the
 Worshipful Frederick Lloyd, Esq; Mayor, as
 Coroner, and a most respectable Jury, assembled
 at said place on Friday, that the horrid deed
 was perpetrated by some villains who had got in
 through the window of the deceased's bed-room
 by means of a ladder, and after strangling him in
 bed with a cord, and beating out his brains,
 threw him from the window into the shrubbery,
 (where a quantity of blood was conspicuous) after
 which they tied him neck and heels, with a hay-
 rope, and conveyed him to the river, near a mile
 distant, where they deposited him, and where he
 was discovered on Friday morning.

Every humane man must regret, that as yet,
 the sanguinary wretches who committed the
 above foul deed, remain undiscovered:—that no
 Strangers at Mount-Shannon could have been the
 executioners must strike every dispassionate en-
 quirer; it was probably sufficient for the wretches
 to wreak their hellish vengeance on the deceased
 Mr. Allen, well knowing that he was the confi-
 dential, the faithful Steward of the most indulgent
 Landlord, namely, the Earl of Clare. That every
 exertion on the part of the City Magistrates, as
 well as the neighbouring Gentlemen, will be used
 to discover the murderers, we are convinced of;
 and if rewards are thought necessary for private
 information—the Citizens of Limerick will shew
 their abhorrence of the atrocity committed in
 its district, by a long list of the most liberal sums.

A few nights ago, a number of people assem-
 bled at Cloher, in the neighbourhood of Droim,
 in this County, went to the house of two Pro-
 ctors of the name of Cull, who obtained decrees
 at the last Quarter-Sessions for Tythes, beat them
 most unmercifully, and destroyed every paper in
 the possession of said Culls.
