GENTLEMAN'S DEATH CORK IN LONDON.

Found Dying in a Railway Train

A man named George Tilson was found with his throat out in a lavatory of the Fishguard express at Old Oak Common Station, near Acton, on the Great Western Railway, shortly after 11 o'clock on Saturday morning. On him was found a piece of paper bearing the words: "Shadowed ir m Ir eland." He was taken to St Mary's Hospital, Paddington, where he died at 220 on Raturday

The body has been identified as that of George Tilson, aged 36, of Blackrook, Co Cork. The discovery was made by an electrician on the Great Western Railway. First aid was rendered, and meanwhile the train was taken back to Paddington Station, from where Mr Tilson was removed in an ambulance to St Mary's Hospital, Paddington. He was admitted to that institution about half-past eleven, but, despite every attentior, died at 3.20

IRISH BUTTER TRADE

Views of Producers and Shippers. The first annual general meeting of the Irish Dairy (Producers and Shippers) Association was held on the 18th last. Mr Cunningham, of the Condensed Milk Co of Ireland, who precided, said that when the English farmer got a free market they in Ireland also demanded a free market in Great Britain, and suppeeded in obtaining it. Unfortunately, however, another form of control was imposed by the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland, acting under pressure from the Labour Party, last August. This control was administered in such a manner as to cause not only a heavy loss in revenue to the whole industry, but to bring many of the manufacturers to the verge of bankruptcy. AMBUSHED NEAR DONERAILE

Military Officer and Three Men Wounded.

A Press Association message says :- A military ficial report states that at eleven on Sunday night two mounted and unarmed non-commissioned officers (Machine Gun Corpe) were fired upon near Doneraile, County Cork. One herse was killed and the other wounded.

A military pairol sent to investigate was ambushed near Kilbrack by about seventy men, armed with bombs, rifles, and shot guns.

One officer and three other ranks were wounded. The attackers' casualties are unknown.

WEEK-END IRISH TRAGEDIKS.

WOOD FIRES.

In the first place, writes an old Colonial, let me say that it is not economical to burn both coal and wood together. The rate of combustion of the two are entirely at variance, so that we are apt to lose what we hoped to gain. But, of course, a fire may be started with a little coal and afterwards kept going on wood-the reverse of our usual

One of the greatest mistakes made by the inexperienced wood burner is that of standing his logs upright in the fire. They should invariably be laid flat, so that the grain of the wood is in a horizontal position. Always put a fresh log on before the previous one is half-burnt. The former will then get heated through, and will readily ignite by the time the one underneath is getting burnt out. If several logs are being used at once they should be so disposed that there will be air space between them. To stir up a wood fire with a poker is fatal, detrimental to eteady combustion, and wasteful of those most preolous elements the embers. No wood fire can be successful on a bare gridiron grate. There must always be a bed of ash, and the morning fire should be laid on some of the previous day's embers. Even in those flat, or panshaped, fireplaces which are modern adaptations of the old wood fuel grates a little ash is advisable as a base in starting the fire.

Where a choice of wood is available, a wise selection would make a vast amount of differ ence to the success of one's fire. Dry oak usually the chespest, is durable and engenders a good heat; but the timber of coniferous trees, such as pines, though it burns freely, is dangerous for open grates on account of its sparking propensities. Both ash and sycamore are excellent fuel when green and sappy. They are highly inflammable, last a long while, and give out a greater heat than dried timber. The same may be said of holly and birch freshly felled.

DRY OLEANING A SILK BLOUSE. Take an ordinary cardboard hat-box, line with white paper, and place a thick layer of thereon; quadratic equations in a single nuknow. fuller's earth at the bottom. Place the blouse on this, and cover with another layer of fuller's earth. Cover with white paper, and tie the lid tightly on the box. Leave for four or five days. Remove blouse from the box, and the blouse will be found to be perfectly clean. Collars, scarves, &c., can be treated in the same way.

MINCEMEAT.

One pound of currents, one pound of raisins, stoned and chopped, one pound of chopped suet, one pound of Demerara sugar, eight ounces of mixed peel, chopped, two pounds of apples peeled and chopped, grated rind of one lemon, juice of half, one nutmeg grated, two ounces chopped almonds, if liked. Mix all together and put into jars. Keep at least a fortnight before using.

A FEW CAKE HINTS. Often, when the cake is cooked, a large slice has to be cut off the top, to make it flat and ready for icing. This is vexing, and often leads to waste. A way to prevent this from being necessary, a correspondent writes, is, when putting the mixture in the cake-tin to keep it up high, all round the sides, allowing the middle to be much lower-in fact, quite a hole. When placed in a hot oven, the middle of the cake always rises first, and so by the time the cake is cooked it presents a nice flat surface, quite ready for decorating. If the cake should stick a little to the tin remember to place it over a basin or saucepan containing boiling water for a few minutes. The heat loosens the cake, which can be removed without breaking. Before icing, it is well to dust a little dry flour over the top of the cake, as the icing is not so likely to "run" if this is done. To prevent small cakes from sticking to the tins, mix a teaspoonful of flour and one of cream of tartar or flour and one of castor sugar together. After greasing the tine, put a pinch of the mixture into each tin, and gently roll it round until the bottom and sides are smeared white.

VENUS AT ITS BEST.

The planet Venus is now a glorious object in he western skies from sancet to the time it dis appears below the horizon some four hours later. Last Thursday week it was at its maximum angular distance from the sun, and is now moving towards inferior conjunction with the contra tuminary, which will happen at the end of April when it and the earth, which are rapidly aprosching each other, will be at their minimum distance, when barely 26,000 000 miles will separate as compared with rather more than 80 000,000 miles this week. At present as bright as a hundred stars of the first magnitude, the planet will nightly increase in brilliance until March 17, when it will equal in brigh ness 130 first-magnitude stars, and be 20,000,000 miles nearer the earth. From now antil the end of next month it will be interesting to watch the changing phases of this lovely planet, though for this purpose some small optical help is bird can be captured for commercial pur ned seary. This week it resembles the moon in its brat quarter, but as it approaches the earth we shall see less of its illuminated he misphere, and the phase will slowly decrea e to that of a prescent, its relescopic appearance when most brilliant in the istter half of March being similar to that of the moon when shout four days old.



"A MOONLESS MONTH."
