

Maurice O'Loghien and Michael Ryan, from the Thuries district, were pharged at a General Courtmartial in the New Barracks, Limerick, yesterday, with "levying war" at Kilina: wood, County Tipperary, on the 20th January is.t, by attacking, with others unknown, members of the Crown forces. U'Loghlen was alternatively charged with being improperly in possession of a

Evidence for the Crown was taken by the Court on the 3rd inst, and on resuming yesterday witnesses for the defence, the two accused, were called by Mr J Connolly, who, instructed by Mr F J O'Connor, solr, Thurles, appeared for O'Loghien and Ryan.

As authorised precis of the avidence on behalf of the Crown set out that a constable and sergeant were returning from Thurles to Castlefogarty in p'ain elothes on bioyeles. It was moonlight, and when at Killinane, six or seven men, six armed, attacked the policemen. O'Logh. len, as alleged. saught one of the police by the arms. Ryan was there, but took no part. No violence was offered, but a stronger party returned to the seens of the occurrence. They found a trench out near Killinane wood, and the accused were got by the police at Killinace towards midnight. The first police party were carrying despatches, and these were not taken. Yesterday, Maurice O'L ghlen stated he lived with his mother, brother, and two sisters at Killinane, which was over a mile from the woo He arrived at Thurles at 6,30 on the evening of the 20th January, and got haved. He subsequently went to a hotel, and accounted for his movements until he went to bad at 10 o'clock Ireland are, however, strongly opposed to that night. When the police visited the house the agguerd was in bed, and subsequently he and Ryan were bandouffed and taken to Thurles. He had no revolver, and did not attack any of the

Scheme for Scholarships From Primary to Secondary, Schools in County Limerick.

I-NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS. Bix of the annual value of £40. The Committee shall be at liberty to reduce the value of the Scholarship where the pupils' parents or guardians are in a position to bear part of the expense of his or her education. The Committee shalf. likewise, have power to make a supplementary grant not expeeding £10 per annum towards the maintenance of any scholar whose parents are unable to meet the expenses incidental to residence in a Secondary School.

II-CONDITIONS OF TENURE. (A) The Primary School from which the pupil comes must have adopted the Gealio League Education Programme as modified by Dail Eireann, viz , (a) Itish to be the official Bohool Language, i.e. Irish to be used for Roll Call, orders, prayers, &c. (b) Irish to be taught for vernagular use to each child for at least one hour per day. (c) Irish History to be taught to all pupils.

(B) The Secondary School which the pupil, or his parents or guardians, choose for the holding of a Scholarship shall have adopted (a) the Cleanic League Programme for Secondary Schools, viz Irieh to be taught to all pupils for vernacular use-(b) Irish history to be taught to all pupils. (c) All Examination Papers to be set in both English and Irish, each pupil examined to have permission to answer in whichever of the two languages he may think fit. In examinations in a foreign language the use of that foreign language to be permitted in setting and answering questions. The pupil to be taught at the Secondary Bohool with a view to Matriculation at the N.U.I.

III-TENURE OF SCHOLARSHIPS The tenure of these Scholarships shall be four years provided the pupil shows satisfactory progress as tested by (a) the periodical school examination. (b) the annual school examination at the end of the academic year, (c) the special test in Irish and Irish History applied by the Committee's Examiner at the end of each year, (d) a satisfactory report from the Examining Board of a Gaelio College, where the pupil will spend a session in the summer of each year at the expense of the Committee, until certified as able to be taught through the medium of Irieh. Sean I goein. By Sean O'Ceallaig, T.D. IV .- RESIDENTIAL QULIFICATIONS. Scholarships shall be restricted to pupils who are of Irish birth and whose parents or guardians have been resident in the County for five years. V.-OTHER QUALIFICATIONS.

Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £20 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £20 but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be determined by the Committee with a view to the parents' of cumstances. Children of others than farmers or labourers may be awarded a Scholarship (full or reduced), as the Committee shall decide, according to the circumstances, of

the parents. VI.—AGE LIMIT. Popils shall be eligible for Scho'arships up to but not exceeding 16 years on the first of June, VII.—REFERENCES.

BLOOD-DRENCHED WARSAW.

Few cities have been the cause of so much bloodshed as Warsaw. For centuries before its capture by Russia in 1813 the Polish capital was contended for by Swedes, Russians, Germans, and Austrians, against whom, individually or collectively, the Poles had to fight almost continually for possession of their beautiful city. Both Germany and Austria, it may be noted, have held possession of Warsaw. The city was awarded to Prussia at the third partition of Poland, and held until Napo'eon entered it in 1806. LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL. Scheme for University Scholarships In County Limerick.

I.-DATE OF OPERATION.

For the present holders of Scholarships the regulations heretofore in force shall continue to apply. These new regulations, shall come into operation in the Session (1921-22) for entrance Scholarships (to be awarded in July, 1921).

II.—NATURE AND VALUE OF THE SCHOLARSHIPS.

a .- There shall be awarded four Scholarships in each year, tenable at any constituent College of the N.U.I which has adopted the Gaelio League Programme, b .- The value of a Scholarship shall be £90. The value of a Bursary or reduced Scholarship shall be at least £50. c. - The Council offers for competition the following Scholarships-faculty specified :- One for Agri culture, one for Commerce, one for Celtia Studies, and one for Science or Engineering. d .- The Council reserves to itself the right of increasing any Schlarships if special circumstances be coneidered necessary to justify such increase. Should the standard attained or the competition for such Scholarships in Faculty be considered insufficient, the Conneil may decide to make no award, and faculty.

III.-RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS. Boholarships shall be restricted to students of liish birth whose parents shall have resided in County Limerick for at least 5 years previous to the student presenting himself for examination.

IV. -OTHER QUALIFICATIONS.

Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £30 shall be entitled to a full Scholarthip. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £30, but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be determined with a view to the parents' of comstances. Children of others than farmers or labourers may receive a full or reduced Boholarship as the Com mittee shall deem fit.

V .- PARTICULAR CONDITIONS FOR ELIGIBILITY TO FIRST YEAR'S

SCHOLARSHIP. a .- Age limit, Sudents shall be eligible for Scholarships up to, but not exceeding, 20 years of age on lat June in each year, except in the case of Scholarships in Agriculture and to teachers age limit is 25.
