

There are conflicting statements as to how the occurrence originated, but would appear that at about twenty minutes to ten a bomb was thrown in John street some fity or sixty yards from the police station. As a result of the explosion, an old man of the tramp class named Francis Maken, who was stopping at the registered lodging house of Mrs Forde, was killed outright, and a dam't boy named Michael Gleeson, 13 years of age, of 31 John street, was wounded in the left forearm, which was fractured, and both fast to ured. #### THE LIMERICK MURDERS.

Questions in Parliament

In the House of Commons on Thursday, he had received from Mrs Maire Clancy, widow of the Mayor of Limerick, a letter with reference to the murder of her husband by Crown forces, in which she contradicted the statements made by the Prime Minister, and asked him to make re paration for the injury that he had done by thes statements, whether he had personally inves gated the facts set out by Mrs Claney, and e probably the declaration by Mrs O'Callaghan widow of Councillor O'Callaghan, who was murdired in his own house on the same evening and whether, if he still doubted the guilt of the Crown forces, he would set up the independent inquiry demanded by both Mrs Clancy, and Mrs

Mr Lloyd George-Yes, sir; I have received the letter referred to. A public inquiry into this matter has been held, and the relatives of Jeces ed, including Mrs O'Callaghan, were in vited to atlend and assist in discovering the murderers, but they refused to do so. If Mrs O'Uallaghan is, as she states, in possession of inportant evidence, it is open to her, notwithstand ing her previous refusal to assist in discovering the murderers of her husband, to forward it to my right hon friend, the Chief Secretary, who, I can assure her, is no less eager than she to discover the persons guitty of this wicked orime, or, if she profers, that the avidence should be investigated in public, I will request the Commander-in-Chief in Ireland to re-assemble the Court. In view of I the fact, however, which I think is well known to every member of this House, that no jury in the South of Ireland can be trusted in present circumstances to bring in an impartial verdict, I am not prepared to asser's to Mrs O'Callaghan's request an i withdraw the Order made prohibiting coroners' inquests in the City of Limerick.

Mr MacVeagh-Does the Prime Minister think that an inquiry by forces of the Crown into charges of murder brought against forces of the Crown is an impartial method of investigation? Mr Lloyd George-I have no doubt at all that there has been an imp retal it vestigation. These

#### LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL. Scheme for University Scholarships In County Limerick.

I,-DATE OF OPERATION. For the present holders of Scholarships the regulations heretofore in force shall continue to apply. These new regulations shall come into operation in the Session (1921-22) for entrance Scholarships (to be awarded in July, 1921) II.—NATURE AND VALUE OF THE

SCHOLARSHIPS.

a .- There shall be awarded four Scholarships in each year, tenable at any constituent College of Programme, b .- The value of a Scholarchip shall be £90. The value of a Burgary or reduced Scholarship shall be at least £50. c.-The Council offers for competition the following Boholarships -- faculty specified :- Oue for Agrioulture, one for Commerce, one for Celtio Studies, and one for Solence or Engineering. d .- The Council reserves to itself the right of increasing relating thereto. 2. Methods of scouring pay any Schlarehipe if special circumstances be considered necessary to justify such increase. Should the standard sttained or the competition for such Scholarships in Faculty be considered insufficient, the Council may decide to make no sward, and may transfer the sum thus saved to another exchange.

III,-RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS. Scholarships shall be restricted to students Irish birth whose parents shall have resided the student presenting himself for examination.

IV. -OTHER QUALIFICATIONS. Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £30 shall be entitled to a full Beholarchip. Children of farmers whose valuation excueds £30, but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Boholarship, the value of which shall be determined with a view to the parents' ofcumstances. Children of others than ta mers or labourers may receive a full or reduced Scholarship as the Com-

mittee shall deem fit. V .- PARTICULAR CONDITIONS FOR ELIGIBILITY TO FIRST YEAR'S

SOHOLARSHIP. a .- Age limit. Students shall be eligible for Beholarships up to, but not exceeding, 20 years of sge on let June in each year, except in the case of Scholarships in Agriculture and to teachers engaged in primary edwastion in which case the age limit is 20. Festities will be afforded those teachers to aval of the Scholar-hips in Coltic studies. b. - The Candidate must have matriculated in either the fummer or autumn of the year of examination in which the Scholarship is awarded, o .- Canlidates other than those who have enjoyed the becondary School scholarships must give proof that the schools they have attended during the year previous to the examination have adopted the Gaelic League Educational

VI.-ENTRANCE EXAMINATION. a. -- beferences. Every candidate for a Scholarship, shall, before being admitted for competition, produce a satisfactory reference from his teacher or School Manager, also the plergyman of his parish. He shall also produce a medical certificate as to fitness, and a birth certificate giving his name and address in their correct Irish form. All these references to be sent to the Secretary of the Committee on or before the lat June. b .- There thall be a competitive examination for the Scholarship in each group. (Subjects and Syllabus herewith). c - Awards. The Examination will be conducted by the Committee's Board of Examiners. Scholarships shall be awarded strictly in the order of merit. by the County Limerick Scholarships Committee; but the Committee reserve the right to withhold a Scholarship from any student whom they consider unsuitable. VII.-EUBJECTS FOR ENTRANCE

EXAMINATION. 

> The following resolution was proposed and seconded vusnimously :- "That we, the County Limerick Farmers' Association, are very much disappointed at the recent action of the Bankers' Union in refusing to accede to our request to open the Banks in Limerick for a short time to facilitate business on the occasion of the Munater Fair on the 25th March (Good Friday). We are also more than surprised at the action of the Bankers in refusing to give a copy of the refusal to our

organiser when requested."

It was pointed out that the Bank Holiday (Good Briday) did not fall on the 25th March for a period of 15 years previously, and would not coour for a longer period in the future. This very important fair had been proplaimed for the past three months to the disadvantage of the pity and the very considerable loss to the farmers of the county, and the action of the Bankers' Union had the effect of prolonging the agony. It was stated that in this matter there was certainly a want of co-operation between the creators of wealth, the farmers, and the distributors, viz, the bankers. One member mentioned that he knew several farmers who would not send their pattle to the the Council for their vote of condolence on the fair because the banks were closed. It was stated that in the reconstruction that must take place in Iceland all organisations should co-operate in their Industrial developments, and that the banks being the distributors of Ireland's created wealth, their national daty was obvious. The request drafted by the Standing Committee and conveyed to the bankers by the organiser was a very modest one, which they thought would be complied with at once owing to the special oirounistances that prevailed in the city and county during the past three months. It was an unwise policy for one organisation to incommode another where their interests were o mmon.


