COURTMARTIAL IN LIMERICK.

Sequel to Official Reprisal

Police Barrack Attacked

A Field General Courtmartial assembled at the New Barracks, Limerick, yesterday at 11 d'olock for the trial of James McDounell, Pallasmore, who was charged with being concerned in an attack with explosives on Portros police barracks on the 27th April, and with on the 1st instant, at Pallasment of the Irish question was believed to be more, being in unlawful possession of two tevolver

The accused pleaded not guilty to both charges, and was defended by Mr R J Kinshan,

(instructed by Mr H O'R Moran, solr). The Prosecutor, opening the case, said in consequence of the attack on the barracks on the 27th April the house of William McDonnell, Pallan mere, was burned as an official reprisal, after a certain time was given for the removal valuables. The house was only burning a few minutes when, as the prosecution alleged, a man who would be identified as accused jumped from a window, and on being searched two rounds of revolver ammunition were found on him.

The first witness was a police sergeant, stated he was in the harranks at Portros at half past ten on the night of the 27th April. Whilespeak ing to another member of the force he heard a loud explosion at the back door. Witness looked over the steel shutters through the window and saw man running away across the garden. That man he believed to be the accused who was at the time about thirty or forty yards away. It was fairly bright; and witness subsequently turned back for his rifle which was lu his room at the time. The Prosecutor-Did you see the place where

the explosion took place? The witness-Yes. There were several holes blown right through the back door, The Prosecutor-How far away was that door from you? -About two yards or wo.

Can you account for not being hurt by the loves of this explosion? The witness - I could not be hurt. I was proteated by the steel-shutters.

The Prosecutor-Could you define the nature of the explosion !- It was a bomb, but not a very powerful onet In cross-examination-The holes in the door were like rifle bullets. The iron bar at the back of the door was blown away, but the woodwork was not damaged. He did not look for frag-

ments of the bomb. Witness did not go down Portroe village that evening, but other members of the force did Mr Kinahan-Between you and I, was there any attack on Portroe barrack that night ? - There

witness said that the accused lived four of five miles from Portroe. He did not see the prisoner in Nenagh some days later, nor was he with the military who carried out the official reprisal. He was not aware, or at least he did not remember, that one of the McDonnells, of Pallasmore, gave evidence against the Crown forces before the County Court Judge of Clare, for burning and looting. Probably the McDonnells were not popular with the police at Portros; Mr Kinahan-Did you send up Verey lights after this attack :- Yes.



I-NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS. Six of the unnual value of £40. The Committee shall be at liberty to reduce the value of the Scholarship where the pupils' parents or guardians are in a position to bear part of the expense of his or her education. The Committee shall, likewise, have power to make a supplementary grant not exceeding £10 per annum towards the maintenance of any scholar whose parents are unable to meet the expenses incidental to residence in a Secondary School.

II-CONDITIONS OF TENURE. (A) The Primary School from which the pupil comes must have adopted the Gealio League Education Programme as modified by Dall Eireann. viz., (a) Irish to be the official Behool Language, i.a. Irish to be used for Roll Call, orders, prayers, &c. (b) Irish to be taught for vernacular use to each child for at least one hour per day. (c) Irish History to be taught to all pupils.

(B) The Secondary School which the pupil, or his parents or guardians, choose for the holding of a Scholarship shall have adopted (a) the Gealin League Pregramme for Secondary Schools, viz. Irish to be taught to all pupils for vernacular use. (b) Irish history to be taught to all pupils. (c) All Examination Papers to be set in both English and Irish, each pupil examined to have permission to answer in whichever of the two languages he may think fit. In examinations in a foreign language the use of that foreign language to be permitted in setting and answering questions. The pupil to be taught at the Secondary School with a view to Matriculation at the N.U.I.

III—TENURE OF BUHOLARSHIPS. The tenure of these Scholarships shall be four years provided the pupil shows satisfactory progress as tested by (a) the periodical school examination. (b) the angual school examination at the end of the academic year, (c) the special test in Irish and Irish History applied by the Committee's Examiner at the end of each year, (d) a satisfactory report from the Examining Board of a Gaelio College, where the pupil will spend a session in the summer of each year at the expense of the Committee, until certified as able to be taught through the medium of Irish. The courses for the Special History Examinations are :- At the end of First Year-Story of Ireland (tested Bilingually) of Beats Naom Padraig—Bilingual.
At the end of Second Year—Mitchel's History of Ireland and Stair na hEireann Part I (Eugan o Neastain). At the end of Third Year-Last Conquest and Sean A'Daimais, "Eire" (Conan Maol). At the end of Fourth Year-The Irish Wars, by J J O'Connell, M.A, and Saothar ar Sean i goein. By Sean O'Ceallaig, T.D.

IV. - RESIDENTIAL QULIFICATIONS. Scholarships shall be restricted to pupils who are of Irish birth and whose parents or guardians have been resident in the County for five years. V.-OTHER QUALIFICATIONS.

Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £20 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £20 but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be determined by the Committee with a view to the parents' circumstances. In mediaval England egg feasts in some form or other were general during the days immediately preceding Lent. The reputed origin of the moss rose is so pretty a tale that it will have a romantic inferest for all who love that old-world and delightful member of the great rose family. -It appears that in the long ago the angel whose task it was to tend the flowers, wearied with his labours, fell asleep beneath a rose bush, and on waking, refreshed with its perfume and the shade it had afforded him, bade it ask for any boon it wished. DENTISTRY AMONG THE ANCIENTS. Dentistry is often supposed to be among the poculiar triumphs of our own civilisation, but the dentistry of antiquity was not one whit inferior to that of to-day. The oldest example of all, according to the Philadelphia Record, is a Phoenician specimen of bridgework found in a tomb near Sidon, in which the teeth are united by gold wire, two of the teeth having been transplanted. In the museum of Corneto are a number of fine specimens of dental work of the sixth and seventh centuries B.C. They consist of bridgework made by riveted bands of metal. One of them supported three artificial teeth, two of them being made from a single ox tooth grooved to imitate human teeth.

THE AGE OF TREES. Inquiries as to the general age of trees have shown that the pine tree sometimes attains 700 years as a maximum length of life; 426 years is placed as the allotted span of the silver fir; the larch lives, as a rule, about 275 years, the red beech 245, the aspen 210, the birch 200, the ash 170, the elder 145, the elm 130. The heart of the oak begins to rot at about the age of 300 years. Of the holly, it is said that there is a specimen over 400 years old near Aschaffenburg, Germany. A count of the annular rings in a gigantic Californian redwood tree felled shows that it began to grow in 550 A.D. It had reached a height of 350ft., and a circumference of 90ft. at the base.

LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL

Scheme for University Scholarships In County Limerick.

I .- DATE OF OPERATION. For the present holders of Scholarships th regulations heretofore in force shall continue to apply. These new regulations shall come into operation in the Session (1921-22) for entrance Scholarships (to be awarded in July, 1921). II.-NATURE AND VALUE OF THE SCHOLARSHIPS.

a .- There shall be awarded four Scholarships i each year, tenable at any constituent College of the N.U.I which has adopted the Gaelie League Programme, b.-The value of a Scholarship shall be £90. The value of a Bursary or reduced Scholarship thall be at least £50. c .- The Council offers for competition the following Scholarships -- faculty specified :- One for Agriculture, one for Commerce, one for Celtio Studies, and one for Science or Engineering. d .- The Council reserves to itself the right of increasing any Schlarships if special circumstances be considered necessary to justify such increase. Should the standard sttained or the competition for such Scholarships in Faculty be considered insufficient, the Conneil may decide to make no award, and may transfer the sum thus saved to snother faculty.

III .- RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS. Scholarships shall be restricted to students of Irish birth whose parents shall have resided in County Limerick for at least 5 years previous to the student presenting himself for examination.

IV .- OTHER QUALIFICATIONS. Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £30 shall be entitled to a full Scholar hip. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £30, but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be deter-Children of others than farmers or labourers may receive a full or reduced Scholarship as the Committee shall deem fit.

V .- PARTICULAR CONDITIONS FOR ELIGIBILITY TO FIRST YEAR'S

SCHOLARHHIP. a .- Age limit. Students shall be eligible fo Scholarships up to, but not exceeding, 20 years of age on let June in each year, except in the ease of Schelarships in Agriculture and to teachers engaged in primary education in which case the age limit is 25. Facilities will be afforded to those teachers to avail of the Scholarships in Celtic studies. b .- The Candidate must have matriculated in either the summer or autumn of the year awarded, o .- Candidates other than those who printed copy -a minimi m speed of 40 words per have enjoyed the becondary Behool scholarships must give proof that the schools they have attended during the year previous to the examination have adopted the Gaelie League Educational Programme.

VI.-ENTRANCE EXAMINATION. a .- beferences. Every andidate for a Scholar ship, shall, before being admitted for competition, produce a satisfactory reference from his teacher or School Manager, also the clergyman of his parish. He shall also produce a medical certificate as to fitness, and a birth certificate giving his name and address in their correct Irish form. All these references to be sent to the Secretary of the Committee on or before the 1st June. b .- There thall be a competitive examination for the Scholarship in each group. (Subjects and Syllabus herewith). c .- Awarde. The Examination will be conducted by the Committee's Board of Kxaminers. Scholarships shall be awarded strictly in the order of merit. by the County Limerick Scholarships Committee ; but the Committee reserve the right to withhold a Scholarship from any student whom they consider unsuitable. 
