PROPOSED POSTAL INCREASES.

Like all else in the wide domain of economy, public or personal, the pending proposals of increased postage rates has led to a heated cleavage of opinion on the action of the Department. That there should be opposition is but a corollary to the feeling that exists or rather an acuter and wider extension of the feeling among the general public on the subject of Government expenditure, more especially since the termination of the war. That expenditure no doubt has been on a huge scale, for the war has left a burden on the taxpayers of these islands that does not promise to be lightened unfortunately for many a day to come. The reasons are only too obvious for anyone who gives thought to the matter, but they are not to be picked up in the highways. The war has left its legacy, and the state of things, the labour market, the rise in wages, food prices, profiteering, and all the other matters war has led to, are contributors to the present unprecedented financial position of Great Britain. The Government are charged in the Press with too lavish expenditure, but they are not the only sinners in the piling up of the big financial items which total up England's present day indebtedness to her creditors. Here and there are at least presumptive grounds for the accuracy of those charges, however wide the charges in question may be with actuality. The task the Government have to undergo continues to exhibit very little signs so far of appreciable relief to the reduction of the State debt. The difficulty and the strain of the task rest on the people in their monetary resources, and accordingly every fresh impost in the direction and in the hope of leading to reduction of taxation ultimately is felt by them, and most of all by those, the majority, as we all know, with tight purses. The proposed postal increases will especially hit these latter classes, and it but follows in this as in other respects, that they should feel the pinch more trying, and give vent to their disagreement in audible opposition. But the situation has to be faced by the Authorities, and they will have to make good the deficit which the working of the Post Office has shown on the year's proceeds at the same time providing for the administration of so great a department. That deficit is roundly estimated at three and a half millions, and it has to be provided for as stated. The increases proposed are on postage inland printed matter, letters going abroad at the foreign rate, and registered letters. For letters, newspapers, telegrams, and parcels the present inland rates are unchanged. Letters within the Empire and to the United States will, when weighing an ounce, be charged at the present rate, two pence an ounce, but the charge on each succeeding ounce will be three halfpence, not one penny as at present. It is proposed that the new rates should come into operation by the thirteenth proximo but these rates will be the subject of review by the House of Commons. This will afford opportunities for a full and impartial consideration of a proposal which has stirred public opinion, and evoked no small share of hostility.

CURRENT COMMENT.

City Printing

The Irish Industrial movement, which has been in existence for many years, is one that most, or should, commend itself to all sections of the community. That is to support, as far as possible, those industries which employ the masses, and to create opportunities for employment, and the circulation of money locally amongst all classes of business. The subject is brought to mind by the completion of the Typographical Society in this city that a great amount of printing is sent out of Limerick to be executed elsewhere. This is a material loss to local printing establishments which employ a large number of hands, and could employ still more were trade brisker, as it might well be if the motto "Support Home Industry" were better observed than it apparently is. Printing orders are handled in Limerick as artistically, as cheaply, and expeditiously as elsewhere, and it should be the interest of all concerned to place them at home and thus provide steady employment for a most deserving body of skilled hands in the printing trade, several of whom are, we regret to notice, unemployed just now. We feel assured, however, now that attention has been called to the matter, that traders and all others who are in a position to do so will generally give practical and timely response to the request of the Typographical Society for more work in the city where they live and spend their means of livelihood.

TO SUBSCRIBERS

We must ask the indulgence of numerous subscribers, who, owing to the suspension of the outgoing night mail from Limerick, as a result of the strike, cannot receive their paper on the morning following the issue of the CHRONICLE. We trust the inconvenience will be but temporary.

DEATH OF MR JAMES JOYNT.

We regret to announce the death of Mr James Joynt, which took place yesterday morning at his residence, 32 Frederick street, after a prolonged illness. The sad event was, therefore, not unexpected, but has been heard of with sincere sorrow by numerous friends in city and county. Mr Joynt was the eldest son of the late Mr Hugh Parry Joynt, of this city, and possessed of a very kindly and retiring manner he was ever held in the highest esteem and regard by all who knew him. There is sincere sympathy with his family in their bereavement. Funeral to-morrow (Friday) at 9.30 for St. Stephen's.

CHARGE OF ILLEGAL ASSEMBLY.

City Boys Charged

At a Field-General Court-martial held in the New Barracks, Limerick, to-day, Gen. Gabbett, Patrick O'Donnell, Gerald Gore, Frank Conroy, Thomas Dargan, Patrick Tuthill, Michael Healy, William Burke, and Thomas Kerins, all residents in the city, were charged under Regulation 37 of R.O.R. with assembling together at Rosbrien on the 22nd instant for the purpose of receiving military instruction from police forces at Rosbrien. The accused declined to recognise the Court, and a formal plea of not guilty was entered. The Prosecutor stated on Sunday evening last a party of police, acting on certain information, proceeded to Rosbrien. On arriving there they entered a wood and observed a party of young men sitting round a man who had a rifle and bayonet fixed to it. All the circumstances of the case pointed to the fact that they were receiving a lecture evidently in military. The President—Are you going to definitely prove that, or do you leave it to the Court to infer it? The Prosecutor—I would leave it to the Court to infer it.

A police officer stated, acting on information, he took a party of police in plain clothes to a place in Rosbrien. After a time he observed a number of lads sitting round and two standing; at that moment two others joined them. There were ten all told. They were sitting round a man with a rifle and bayonet. From their formation it was evident that they were receiving a lecture in military. He identified the boys, but the man from whom they were receiving the instruction was not amongst them. Witness identified the rifle, from which the stock was missing, but it was serviceable. They stated that he went to Rosbrien in a couple of months; that was Rosbrien. I have to verify that. The President—Do you know the ages of the accused?—I asked them their ages, and one said he was sixteen in a couple of months; that was Rosbrien. I have to verify that.

In reply to the accused Gabbett, the witness said there were ten arrested by him; there was an eleven arrested, but he was arrested for having sedition literature in his possession. In his opinion they were receiving instructions from a man who had a rifle with him. To the Court—The man with the rifle was in the middle of the circle. Further answering Gabbett, the witness said the rifle was not in possession of any of the boys, but was on the ground. A police witness stated he was one of the party that was in Rosbrien wood on Sunday. He observed a number of young men sitting round a man, who appeared to him to be lecturing the accused, whom witness identified. Witness approached the man who appeared to be lecturing, and found near him the rifle and bayonet.

Replying to Gabbett, the witness said there were nine sitting round the instructor. He saw the rifle, which he picked up from the instructor's side. He was nearest to the rifle. This closed the prosecution. The accused Gabbett said in reply to the Court, he desired to make a statement on behalf of all the boys. Any statement he wished to make was in defence of the absent man—the so-called instructor. The President—I shall not take it down then. This man is not on trial now. Gue Gabbett—He will be on trial next Saturday.

Have you any statement to make in your own defence? No. The Court closed and the decision will be announced.

Patrick Tubridy, Bank Place, Limerick, was subsequently charged with having documents in his possession at Rosbrien, three receipts which purported to relate to the affairs of the Irish Volunteers an unlawful association.

The accused declined to recognise the Court. A police constable, giving evidence, stated that on the evening of the 22nd instant, while with a party of police at Rosbrien wood, he saw the accused enter the wood. Witness searched him and found three slips of paper (produced), which purported to be receipts for money received. They were signed "D.C.C." and he inferred they related to the Irish Volunteers.

The accused—The receipts do not refer to the Irish Volunteers, but to the Irish National Boy Scouts. The President—I don't know if the Irish National Boy Scouts come under this Act. A Police Officer—I don't think they were ever proclaimed.

The case was adjourned, with a view to seeing if the organisation was ever proclaimed.

DUBLIN CASTLE REPORTS.

Reports issued by Dublin Castle on Monday included the following: At 4 p.m. yesterday a party of police in plain clothes surprised a number of young men receiving rifle drill in a wood at Rosbrien, Limerick. The police captured one service rifle, a bayonet and bandolier.

At 9 p.m. on the 22nd an R.I.C. patrol came upon a party of about 40 youths at Rosbrien, Co. Wick. On the approach of the police they lay on their backs. Some refused to do so, and the police opened fire, wounding Patrick Creamer, of Limerick.

BISHOPRIC OF LIMERICK AND ARDFERT.

Election Postponed. In view of the postponement and abandonment of local train services caused by the coal strike, the Archbishop of Dublin has agreed to postpone to a date to be announced later the joint meeting of the Diocesan Synods of Limerick, Ardfert, and Aghadoe for the election of a bishop.

Sale of Work.

A Sale of Work took place yesterday in the Diocesan Hall, in aid of the Women's Union of the Church Missionary Society. The attendance at the function was large, and patrons were provided with an attractive musical programme, which added to the pleasure of a visit to the Sale. There was a large and varied assortment of fancy and plain goods to be selected from, and the purchases in this respect were highly encouraging. At the Sale and Sweets Stall the ladies were good, while there was a great demand for country produce and toys, among the latter being some rare specimens. The Gleasons' Union Stall and the Girls' Movement Stall were new attractions. At the Tea there was much social activity, and taking of the function as a whole it was very well supported. The concert was a pleasing feature of the sale, while the scene "A Chinaman's Way," proved to be a highly diverting affair and intelligently enjoyed.

The stall-holders were—Mrs Abbott and Mrs E.F. Conyers (tea); Mrs T. Browning and Mrs Ormsby Ryan (Cakes and Sweets); Mrs Lucius O'Brien and Mrs E.O'Brien (Country Produce); Mrs T. de C. Studdert (Toys); and Mrs D.O'Brien (Fancy and Plain Goods).

An entertainment in connection with the Sale will take place on Saturday.

COMMANDEERED LABOUR IN COUNTY LIMERICK.

A large number of men, upwards of a hundred, who were employed by the Co-operative Creamery yesterday morning with milk were rounded up by military and police. They were marched to Annesbury to repair the bridge over the Mulcaire River, which had been partly blown up early on Saturday morning.

MILITARY COURT OF SUMMARY JURISDICTION IN LIMERICK

On Tuesday evening two young men named Ryan and Jones, from the Meelick district, were arrested by Crown forces at their homes. They were taken to Rosbrien, where they were charged with their refusal to comply with a regulation compelling them to take timber to the military authorities, and which had been found used as an obstruction on the road at Crotton. Yesterday a Field-General Court-martial, presided over by the Major-General, was held in the New Barracks, Limerick, where the two men were charged with not complying with the regulation. In reply the defendants stated that the order was not conforming to because it was not signed by the competent military authority. They were each sentenced to fourteen days' imprisonment.

A proposal to make arbitration in industrial disputes compulsory was rejected by 46 Conservative and Socialist to 40 Radical votes in the Norwegian Odelsting.

DUBLIN SENSATION.

CUSTOM HOUSE SET ABLAZE.

A Fierce Fight.

Numerous Casualties.

111 Arrests Made.

There were two notable sensations in Dublin yesterday. Between 12 o'clock and 2 o'clock a fire broke out in the Custom House, and a fierce engagement followed. About the same time it was discovered that the Custom House was on fire.

OFFICIAL STATEMENT.

The following official statement was issued in Dublin at 3 p.m. yesterday: The Custom House, Dublin, was set on fire by a fire in the public buildings in the United Kingdom, was set on fire by a large party of Sinn Féin men with petrol at 1.40 p.m. to-day. The Dublin Fire Brigade was prevented from going to the scene, and the Crown forces who sought to reach the building were fired upon. An action followed, and the details will be issued later.

"Subsequently the Fire Brigade, working under the armed protection of Crown forces, proceeded to the place, and attacked the flames, which by this time had obtained a firm hold. It is doubtful if they could have been extinguished. The following official communiqué was issued by the General Headquarters, Dublin, last evening.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET.

THIS DAY.

(BY TELEGRAPH.) Numbers.—Beasts, 1,614; sheep and lambs, 6,391. There was a further reduction in cattle of from 2 to 5s per cwt, and a decline in sheep and lambs of from 3s to 4s per head. Quotaions.—Cattle, 78s to 82s per cwt; mutton, 15s 3d to 16s 6d per lb; lambs, 60s to 80s each, according to size.

THE SENTENCED LIMERICK PRISONERS. No reply was received up to to-day with reference to the memorials forwarded on behalf of the three prisoners, Thomas Kenne, Edward Pouch, and Timothy Murphy, sentenced by a military tribunal at the New Barracks on charges of levelling a gun and being in illegal possession of firearms. The memorials, as already stated, have been influential and numerous signed on behalf of the appeal made for clemency in the case of the prisoners.

WOUNDED LIMERICK MAN. The condition of the young Limerick man, Patrick Cremer, an ex-Canadian soldier, and who remains a patient in Barrington's Hospital, is still very critical. So far he has not improved. In the occasion which took place on Sunday evening, near Pallas, he received a bullet wound in the right side. The patient is receiving every care at the hospital.

LATE COUNTY COUNCIL CHAIRMAN. The meeting of the County of Limerick Committee of Agriculture and Technical Instruction which was to have been held yesterday was adjourned in compliment to the memory of the late Chairman of the Limerick County Council, Mr John Wall, brother, whose recent death a wide circle of friends in Limerick City and County deplore.

EVEREST CLIMB. The Mount Everest expedition under Colonel Howard Bury, has started from Darjeeling, states a Reuter cable.

(Colonel Bury's expedition is in the nature of a reconnaissance to ascertain the most favourable route to be taken by the actual climbers of the mountain. The advance party of the expedition left Darjeeling ten days ago.)

By 103 votes to 83 the Opposition amendment to the Canadian Budget, condemning the protective tariff and declaring for a reduction of expenditure, was defeated in the Dominion House of Commons.

By 61 votes to 25, the Dutch second Chamber has passed the Bill to grant for a period of five years the annual subsidy of 1,000,000 florins (approximately £25,000) to the Dutch South African Shipping Line.
