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

The rainfall during the first five months of this year has been very far short of the normal supply. And June has, so far, brought no relief from this rather exceptional experience. This long-continued drought is now occasioning some disquistude. The crops are urgently in need of rain. In many places live stock are suffering from the lack of water. Pastures are being scorched, and there is the prospect that food for cattle may become short at a time when an embargo is put upon those ready for market. The growing crops, both cereals and roots, are badly in need of a copious downpour. Some rain has fallen during the past few days but far more is needed.

"The Times" prints the following report of the murder !- The Very Rev John, Finlay, who was Dean of Leighlin from 1895 to 1912; was about dead on Saturday night at his home, Brookley House, Bawnby, Co Cavan. Mr Finlay, who was nearly 79 years old, was taken from his house which was afterwards set on fire, and destroyed Dean Finlay, who was a Graduate of Dublin University, was ordained in 1867, and officiated at Clonenagh from 1867 to 1873. Between the latter year and 1890 he was Rural Dean of Carlow and Rector of Lorum. In 1890 he became Rector of Carlow, and in 1895 Dean of Leighlin. He



I-NUMBER OF SCHOLARSPIPS. Six of the annual value of £40. The Committee shall be at liberty to reduce the value of the Scholarship where the pupils' parents or guardians are in a position to bear part of the expense of his or her education. The Committee shall, likewise, have power to make a supplementary grant not exceeding £10 per annum towards the maintenance of any scholar whose parents are unable to meet the expenses incidental to residence in a Secondary School.

II-CONDITIONS OF TENURE. (A) The Primary School from which the pubil comes must have adopted the Gealio League Eduoation Programme as modified by Dail Eireans, viz, (a) Irish to be the official Bohool Language, i.e. Irish to be used for Roll Call, orders, prayers, &c. (b) Irish to be taught for veroscular use to each child for at least one hour ner day. (c) Irish History to be taught to all pupils.

(B) The Secondary School which the pupil, or

his parents or guardians, choose for the holding of a Scholarship shall have adopted (a) the Gealio League Programme for Secondary Schools, vix. Irish to be taught to all pupils for vernacular use. (b) Irish history to be taught to all pupils. (c) All Examination Papers to be set in both English and Irish, each pupil examined to have permission to answer in whichever of the two languages he may think fit. In examinations in a foreign language the use of that foreign language to be permitted in setting and answering questions. The pupil to he taught at the Secondary School with a view to Matriculation at the N.U.I.

III-TENURE OF SCHOLARSHIPS. The tenure of these Scholarships shall be four years provided the pupil shows satisfactory progress as tested by (a) the periodical school examination. (b) the annual school examination at the end of the academic year, (c) the special test in Irish and Irish History applied by the Committee's Examiner at the end of each year, (d) a satisfactory report from the Examining Board of a Gaelio College, where the pupil will spend a session in the summer of each year at the expense of the Committee, until certified as able to be taught through the medium of Irish. TRIPLE TRAGEDY IN BELFAST.

Many Riot Casualties.

A Press Association telegram of Sunday says :--& M'Bride, a publican, M Halpenny, a postman, and William Kerr, halrdresser, were taken from their homes in Belfast this morning while Curfew was in operation by parties of men and shot dead some distance away.

Another P. A. message says :- Belfast on Saturday night experienced a night of terror Disturbances occurred between rival crowds, as a result of which 22 persons were admitted to acapital. The total essualty list is much bigger, as many persons were treated in surgeries and at thair homes. The most serious rioting occurred in York street area, about ten mirutes walk from the outer of the city. Here, about half an hour before oursew large crowds holding different goldtical views came into conflict, and stone throwing and 'revolver firing ensued. The few policemen on duty in the vicinfty were powerless, and reinforcements hurried to the scene in Crossley tenders. By peaceful persuasion they induced the bulk of the growd to proceed heme, but others refused to budge and continued to fire revolvers. This went on for some time and eventually the police had to fire. Some of the rioters must have had a bomb, the explosion of which wounded five men standing at Dook fane. All five were removed to hospital, one with his right hand blown of and two riddled with bomb splinters. The police carried no bomba.

A number of porsons, including three women were treated at hospital for bullet wounds. There were also outbreaks in North Queen street and Cupar street areas. Here stones and rovolvers were freely used, but the authorities got the upper hand and no casualties were reported. It was during the carly hours of this morning that the three men before researted, were taken from their homes and shot. Feeling is running high, and crowds congregated to-night outside the .Morgae.


