THE WEATHER AND AGRICULTURE

Judging by the recent forecasts there seems a prospect of a return soon to settled weather conditions which would now be welcomed in town and country. The prolonged drought was a trying one on all sides and the need for rain was not so severely felt for many years past. It came at last in since then the "break" has continued practically without intermission, and even so late as Tuesday evening last there was a coplous downpour for hours in Limerick and district. The continuous rains came as a great relief to the green crops and pastures. though, perhaps, rather too late to be of service to cereals, and as to these a further continuance of unsettled conditions could Co Limertok. not have otherwise than a harmful effect. However, as said, the return to the "dry" is owned by an exhibitor resident in Ireland. Now now hopeful. The monthly review of the Department of Agriculture on crop and live stock conditions is always interesting and instructive, and that for July bears testimony to the beneficial effects of the rainfall throughout the country. The burnt conditions of the pastures added to the difficulty of providing water for cattle oc- accessories, gramophones, a varied collection of concern to stockcasioned much owners. But this has now passed. to cereals the harvesting of winter wheat has begun. In Sligo it is stated to be the best of the grain crops, and in Carlow an | Limerick, this firm is showing some wonderful average yield is expected. Spring oats are described as variable. Plots of spring Dublin. wheat are described as poor and thin. but a few good crops have been obtained in the Midland counties. In some of the Southern counties the prospects of the barley crop are not too good. Potatoes as a whole looked healthy in July, and premising, and were naturally much helped by the rain. So far the crop is fortunately, free from blight, but a "second growth," recently reported, is not a desirable experience, and one ontirely due to weather conditions. A leaflet of the Department, which appears in another column, says-"Unless the potatoes are required for consumption immediately it is not considered wise to lift them until they are sufficiently matured to allow them to be stored, without risk, in the usual manner,' and, it is added, the sprouts should be removed while the potatoes are being dug, It is encouraging to observe from the monthly review that the prospect of satisfactory yields from the main crop are "fair to good," Early sown mangels have done well, and the yields may be close up to the turner, and was a skilled and capable mechanic. average, while the turnip crop has much improved by the rainfall. All the first and second crop hay was carted during July. and most of the old meadows have been cut and made up. The yields, however were generally light, the bulk being estimated at from one-third to one-half that of last year. The shortness of the crop is reflected in the prices, which are good. It is not surprising to learn that owing to the drought there was a marked shrinkage in milk supplies during the month of July. but the revival of the pastures which has come to pass since then cannot but have improved the yield considerably. So much from the agricultural point of view, which, on the whole, has benefitted materially by the recent rainfalls, though, as said, a return to dry weather would now be welcomed by the farmer. It would be welcomed, too, in another direction-the seaside resortswhere, so far as the present month has gone, the broken weather has not been quite to the liking of the holiday-maker.

IRISH PEACE MOVE.

STATEMENT BY LORD BIRKENHEAD.

In the House of Lords, Lord Birkenhead, answermy Lord Salisbury, said he was not one of those who took the view that it would have proved impossible for them to put down rebellion in Ireland. He was, on the contrary, certain that the strength of this country, if unaparingly exerted with the necessary vigour and sabrifice, could have put an end to the prevalent rebellion. But within what period of time? What military adviser would be bold enough to inform them, with the least approach to precision, what time would be required for the purpose? He was persuaded it would be said of the proposals, when they were known, that while they had gone as far as was possible in the direction of proving the genuine. ness of their desire for real and permanent reconciliation, they had inflexibly adhered to those points which the vital intereste and safety of those islands required. He believed that Parliament and the constituencies would overwhelm ingly approve of the negotiations entered into.

There were remaining on the 31st December, 1920, 345 male and 224 female patients. As compared with the corresponding figures for the previous year there was a decrease of one in the number of admissions, an increase of 32 in the number of discharges, and a John Hegarty, Kilnamona, to take her in his decrease of 28 in the deaths. The highest service. number in the Asylum at any time was 615, and | the lowest 56S, the daily average number being 598. The report proceeded to state that 47 of the cases of admission were of a very acute type, and developed the attack within three months of admission, 37 above three months of admission, 10 of more than a year's duration, and 21 unknown. Of the admissions 54'S per cent suffered from mania, 40 per cent from melancholia, two from congenital mental deficiency, and two from delusional insanity. The chief causes of insanity in the cases of those admitted were mental stress, heredity, and alcohol. In the case of 44 patients the causation of insanity was unknown owing to defective history. During the year 47 patients were admitted under 35 years of age, and 68 over that age Of that number 76 were from the county and 33 from the city, while 6 were service patients. There were 106 patients discharged during the year, of whom 24 were recovered, being in the proportion of 20 9 per cent in the admisthe year consisted of the erection of a new soullery adjoining the female dining hall. The farm was again worked successfully by the staff and patients. As many as 10,182 g lions of milk were supplied, as well the usual supply of vegetables and 16 cwt of bacon. After deducting expenses a profit of £721 13s 51 was realised. The total expenditure for the year, including repayment of loans, was £41,703 16: 6d; average gross cost per head was £71 5s 10d, and deducting repayment of loans the outlay was £40,908 16s 2J, or at the rate or £59 18s 7d per head. 





Scheme for Scholarships From Primary to Secondary Schools in County Limerick,

I-NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS. Six of the annual value of £40. The Committee shall be at liberty to reduce the value of the Scholarship where the pupils' parents or guardians are in a position to bear part of the expense o his or her education. The Committee shall, likewise, have power to make a supplementary grant not exceeding £10 per annum towards the maintenance of any scholar whose parents are unable to meet the expenses incidental to residence in a Secondary School.

II-CONDITIONS OF TENURE. (A) The Primary School from which the pupil comes must have adopted the Geallo League Edu-cation Programme as modified by Dail Eireann, viz., (a) Irish to be the official Behool Language, i.e. Irish to be used for Roll Call, orders, prayers, &c. (b) Irish to be taught for verpacular use to each child for at least one hour per day. (c) Irish History to be taught to all pupils.

(B) The Secondary School which the pupil, or his parents or guardians, choose for the holding of a Scholarship shall have adopted (a) the Gealio League Programme for Secondary Schools, viz. Irish to be taught to all pupils for vernacular use. (b) Irish history to be taught to all pupils. (c) All Examination Papers to be set in both English and Irish, each pupil examined to have permission to answer in whichever of the two languages he may think fit. In examinations in a foreign language the use of that foreign language to be permitted in setting and answering questions. The pupil to be taught at the Secondary School with r view to Matriculation at the N.U.I.

III-TENURE OF SCHOLARSHIPS. The tenure of these Scholarships shall be four years provided the pupil shows satisfactory progress as tested by (a) the periodical school examination. (b) the annual school examination at the end of the academic year, (c) the special test in Irish and Irish History applied by the Committee's Examiner at the end of each year, (d) a satisfactory report from the Examining Board of a Gaelio College, where the pupil will spend a session in the summer of each year at the expense of the Committee, until certified as able to be taught through the medium of Irish. The courses for the Special History Examinations are :-- At the and of First Year-Story of Ireland (tested Bilingually) of Beata Naom Padraig-Bilingual. At the end of Second Year-Mitchel's History of Ireland and Stair na hEireann Part I (Eogan o Neactain). At the end of Third Year-Last Conquest and Sean A'Paimais, "Eire" (Conan Macl). At the end of Fourth Year-The Irish Wars, by J J O'Connell, M.A, and Saothar ar Sean i goein. By Sean O'Ceallaig, T.D. IV.—RESIDENTIAL QULIFICATIONS.

Scholarships shall be restricted to pupils who are of Irish birth and whose parents or guardians have been resident in the County for five years. V.-OTHER QUALIFICATIONS.

Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £20 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £20 but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be determined by the Committee with a view to the parents' circumstances. Children of others than farmers or labourers may be awarded a Scholarship (full or reduced), as the Committee shall decide, according to the circumstances of the parents.

VI.-AGE LIMIT. Pupils shall be eligible for Scho'arsnips up to but not exceeding 16 years on the first of June. VII.—REFERENCES.

Every candidate for a Scholarship shall, before being admitted for examination, produce a satisfactory reference from the Teacher or School Manager of his School, together with a medical certificate as to fitness, and a recommendation from a Clergyman of his parish as to character.

VIII. - AWARDS. Scholarships shall be awarded strictly in order of merit, &c.

IX.-EXAMINATION. Candidates for Scholarships shall be subjected to a competitive examination-oral and writtento be held by Examiners appointed by the Com-

X .- GENERAL POWERS. The Committee reserve to themselves the right to exclude any candidate from competing for a Scholarship without assigning a reason. The Committee also reserve the right to revise this Scheme or any part of it at any time, subject to the sanction of the Limerick County Council, BYLLABUS.

FARMING NOTES.

Visit to Agricultural College, Glasnevin.

A circular of the Department of Agriculture says -At the invitation of the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction, represenestives of the fa ming, brewing, and milling interests, as well as others interested to the improvement of dereals, recently visited the experimental grounds of the Plant Breeding Division at the Albert Agricultural College. Glasnevin. The wleitors were shown over the cifferent experimental grounds, and were informed in detail of the results of selection, cross-fertilisation, and other interesting experiments.

In the Bee field, where a large number of the feading varieties of oats, wheat, and barley are under test, the difference between the various plats in regard to strength of straw was extremely warked. . Of the wheats Yeonan was looking best, closely followed by Iron, and Square Head Master. Victor, Marshal Foot, and Double White Stand-Up were badly "lodged." Of the oats, the outstanding plots were keourd, Supreme, Banner, Banner K Black Tartary, and Potato X Black Tartary. The two latter varieties have been raised by the Plant Breeding Division, and are characterised by good strong straw. Crown and Victory had also stood up fairly well, but Abed Neva Havre, and a selection of Bann'r X Black Tartary had gone down badly.

already produced by selection a number of most promising strains of commercial varieties of wheat, oate, and barley. The selections that have been made of old native varieties are exceedingly instructive. For example, from the old native variety of wheat, Red Stettin or Red Velveta variety extensively grown in Co. Tipperary -- as many as twelve different selections have already been isolated by the method of single-plant selection. These selections have been grown in quan- Dring. Henry Harding. titative experimental pluts alongside recognised leading commoroial varieties, and already a number of the selections have shown that they possess very valuable characteristics. All the strains from this wheat are extremely hardy, and grow very vigorously during the winter and early epring months. It has been ascertained that at least two of these strains possess grain of appareptly very high milling quality.

A number of native winter varieties of oats are also being experimented upon, with a view to securing selections of higher commercial value than the unselected commercial stocks at present on the market. Tawny oats or Tan oats, which are extensively grown in the exposed mountainous districts in the North of Ireland, particularly in Tyrone, have already yielded five selections, which appear to be very vigorous and hardy. Some of these strains, will undoubtedly prove of superior value for use as green feeding. The improvement of Wexford Tawny Oats by means of plant selection has already been begun.

As a result of cross-fertilisation, saveral promising forms of barley have been produced. One of the best known of these-namely, Spratt X Archer, 37/6-is now recognised as probably the best narrow-sared variety in cultivation at the present time.

RUSSIA'S STARVING MILLIONS.

A correspondent writes :-- Russians whom have met in London say that the worst of the Russian famine will -unless the world comes to Russia's sid -come a year or two hence. FACTS AND FANCIES.

WEARERS OF THE BED HAT, Members of the Sacred College of Cardinals rank above all other ecclesiastics of their Church; but it was not until the thirteenth century that they were granted precedence over bishops, says the Manchester Guardian, and it was at this period also that Comptroller-Captain Henry Giaborne Holt, | the scarlet costume, hitherto reserved for Papal legates, was extended to the entire body of cardinals. Cardinal Bellarmine says that the original cardinals tiere the priests in charge of parish churches of Rome, their title being de rived from the fact that when the Pope colebrated Mass their place was at the corners of the altar, ad cardines altaris. Nowadays a bardinal rarely wears the chief symbol of his dignity, the red hat, which is of the same shape as the ecremonial hats worn by abbots, bishops, and arebbishops, differing only colour and in the number of tassels. The hatt of abbots and bishops are adorned with twelve tassels, those of archbishops with twenty, and those of eardinals with thirty.

KEEN SIGHT OF THE GULL. There is perhaps no other bird, of land or sea, so keen of sight as the common gull. To convince a sceptical friend of this, an American naturalist once made some interesting experiments. Two men were passengers on a steather where the spring obligaided them to run twenty miles an hour: A dozen gults followed them in the steamer's wakt without atipurent effort, and sireled in graceful curves over the water. COLOMBIA'S EMERALD MINES.

Most of the world's emeralds now come from the Muzo Mines in Colombia. Muzo Mines are in a mountainous district, about ninety miles from Bogota, and most difficult of access. All the miners employed there are pure-blooded Indians, who show an almost incredible degree of skill in breaking through the limestone containing the gems. Though the pointed bars with which they work weigh thirty pounds, a miner can strike exactly the same spot with the point of the bar fifty or sixty times in succession, deviating not one hair's breadth, and using just sufficient force to break the limestone without damaging the emerald or the calcite in which it is embedded. Each miner has to undertake to remain at the mines for not less than three months at a stretch, during which period, though well housed, fed, and amused he is kept a prisoner, so as to prevent any illicit sale of the emeralds. The Muzo Mines which belong to the Colombian Government yield a profit of about £100,000 a year.

THE TOMATO.

LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL. The Scheme for University Scholarships

In County Limerick. I.-DATE OF OPERATION. For the present holders of Beholaships the regulations herotofore in force shall continue to apply. These new regulations shall come into operation in the Session (1921-22) for entrance Scholarships (to be awarded in July, 1921) II .- NATURE AND VALUE OF THE

SCHOLARSHIPS. d .- There shall be awarded four Scholarships in each year, tenable at any constituent College of the N.U.I which has adopted the Gaelio League Programme. b .- The value of a Beholarship shall be £90. The value of a Bursary or fectused Scholarship shall be at least £50. c .- The Council offers for competition the following Scholarships-faculty specified :- One for Agriculture, one for Commerce, one for Celtic Studies, and one for Science or Engineering. d .- The Council reserves to itself the right of increasing any Schlarehips if special circumstances be considered necessary to justify such increase. Should the standard attained or the competition for such Scholarships in Faculty be considered insufficient, the Council may deolde to make no award, and may transfer the sum thus saved to another

III.—RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS. Scholarships shall be restricted to students of Irish birth whose parents shall have resided in County Littlerick for at least 5 years previous to the student presenting himself for examination.

IV. -OTHER QUALIFICATIONS. Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £30 shall be entitled to a fall Beholar-hip. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £30, but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the vales of which shall be determined with a view to the parents' oiroumstances. Children of others than farmers of labourers may receive a full or reduced Boholarship as the Committee shall deem fit.

V .- PARTICULAR CONDITIONS FOR ELIGIBILITY TO FIRST YEAR'S

ISCHOLARSHIP. a. - Age limit. All these references to be sent to the Scoretary of the Committee oh or before the 1st June. b .- There shall be a competitive examination for the Scholarship in each group. (Subjects and Syllabus herewith). c. - Awards. The Examination will be conducted by the Committee's Board of Examiners. Scholarships shall be awarded strictly in the order of merit, by the County Limerick Scholarships Committee ; but the Committee reserve the right to withhold a Scholarship from any student whom they consider unsuitable.


