

LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL. Scheme for University Scholarships

In County Limerick. I. -DATE OF OPERATION. For the present holders of Boholarships the regulations heretofore in force shall continue to apply. These new regulations shall come into operation in the Session (1921-22) for entrance Scholarships (to be awarded in July, 1921)
II.—NATURE AND VALUE OF THE SCHOLARSHIPS.

a .- There shall be awarded four Scholarships in each year, tenable at any constituent College of the N.U.I which has adopted the Gaello League Programme. b. -The value of a Scholarship shall be £90. The value of a Bursary or reduced Scholarship shall be at least £50. c .- The Council offers for competition the following Scholarships -- faculty specified :- One for Agriculture, one for Commerce, one for Celsic Studies, and one for Solence or Engineering. d .- The Council reserves to itself the right of increasing any Schlarships if special circumstances be considered necessary to justify such increase. Should the standard sttained or the competition for such Scholarships in Baculty be considered insufficient, the Connoll may decide to make no award, and may transfer the sum thus saved to another III.—RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS

Scholarships shall be restricted to students of Irish birth whose parents shall have resided in County Limerlok for at least 5 years previous to the student presenting himself for examination. IV .- OTHER QUALIFICATIONS. Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £30 shall be entitled to a full

Scholarchip. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £30, but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be determined with a view to the parents' ofrcumstances. Children of others than farmers or labourers may receive a full or reduced Boholarship as the Committee shall deem fit. V .- PARTICULAR CONDITIONS FOR :

ELIGIBILITY TO FIRST YEAR'S

SCHOLARSHIP.

a .- Age limit. Students shall be eligible for Scholarships up to, but not expeeding, 20 years of age on let June in each year, except in the case of Scholarships in Agriculture and to teachers engaged in primary education in which case the age limit is 25. Facilities will be afforded to those teachers to avail of the Scholarships in Celtic studies. b .- The Candidate must have matriculated in either the summer or autumn of the year of examination in which the Scholarship is awarded. o .- Candidates other than those who have enjoyed the Secondary School scholarships

must give proof that the schools they have attended during the year previous to the examination have adopted the Gaelic League Educational VI.-ENTRANCE EXAMINATION. a. - t eferences. Every candidate for a Scholarship, shall, before being admitted for competition, produce a satisfactory reference from his teacher or School Manager, also the clergyman of his parish. He shall also produce a medical certificate as to fitness, and a birth certificate giving his name and address in their correct Irish form. All these references to be sent to the decretary of the Committee on or before the 1st June. b .- There thall be a competitive examination for the Scholarship in each group. (Subjects and Syllabus herewith). o - Awards. The Examination will be conducted by the Committee's Board of Examiners. Scholarships shall be awarded strictly

HARVEST PROSPECTS. Since the long drought broke up at the two thirds of June, the weather has remained conelstently cooler and broken. The first effect of the sudden damping of the purched and overheated soil was the encouragement of sprouting and second growth in the potato orop. This materially affected both the size and quality of year the cattle trade was so optimistic that the early sorts, which are mostly all dug out by graziars unhesitatingly conceded to the demand now. Str. - His Majesty's Government have conatdered your letter of August 30th, and have to of an inch isfreadily observable by its aid. make the following observations upon it :- The principle of Government by consent of the governed is the foundation of British constitutional development; but we cannot accept as a basis of practical conference an interpretation of that principle which would commit us to any demands which you might present, even to the extent of setting up a Republic and repudiating the Crown. You must be aware that conference on such a government by consent of the governed would undermine the fabric of every Democratic State, and drive the civilied world back into tribalism. On the other hand, we have invited you to discuss our proposals on their merits, in order His Majesty's Government are loth to believe that without examining them in conference. To decline to discuss a settlement which would of ustional development within the Empire can only mean that you repudiate all allegiance to the Crown and all membership of the British Commonweath. If we were to draw this inference from your letter, then further discussion between us could serve no useful purpose, and all conferenus would be vain.

If, however, we are mistaken in this inference, as we still hope, and if your rea! objection to our proposals is that they offer Ireland less than the liberty which we have described, that objection can be explored at a conference. You will agree that this correspondence has lasted long enough. His Majasty's Government must, therefore, ask for a definite reply as to whether you are prepared to enter a conference to sacertain how the asecoia tica of Ireland with the community of nations known as the British Empire can best be reconciled with Irish national aspirations.

In the course of a paper read to the Fourth Educational) Section of the World's Poultry Congress at The Hague, the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland stated that in determining the direction in which education was to be applied to the industry, the Department, on its establishment in 1900, adopted a threefold policy-(1) Education of the producers by means of lectures and visits; (2) improvement of the existing stock of birds by the introduction of fresh blood; (3) improvement of marketing arrangements. At the present time the work was carried out through County Committees of Agriculture, and by direct administration in respect of work that could be done more effectively by a central authority. Experience had shown that the programme in tlated twenty years ago was sound. All the instructors in pinitry-keeping new at work in Ireland were trained either at the Muneter Institute, Cork, or at the Ulater Dalry School, Cookstown. In this way there had been secured, not only uniformity of standard in the matter of qualifications, but uniformity of method in carrying on the work. RELIEF MEASURES.

The Ministry of Health has cent a circular to all Boards of Guardians embodying rules and regulations which should be observed in the granting of special outdoor relief during the period of exceptional unemployment. While giving relief sufficient to relieve distress, it is pointed out that then the earnings of a man maintaining himself by labour. While not desirous of fettering the discretion of the Guardians, the Minister intlmates that he must disapprove of any departure from the Relief Regulation Order. Relief should not be given without the fallest investigation, and no money grant should be made until the case has been before the Guardians and reported upon by the relieving officer. The greater portion of special relief should by given in kind from the Guardians' relief distribution stores or through special orders to local tradesmen. In he case of rent relief care must be taken to see hat relief is properly applied.

THE HARVEST IN ENGLAND.

The Ministry of Agriculture, in a report of the agricultural conditions in England and Wales show that practically all the corn has been secured in good condition. Wheat, barley, and oats have proved heavier crops than had been anticipated when standing. All orops, except wheat, will be

HOMAGE TO R 38 VICTIMS Impressive scenes were witnessed at Devenport

yestorday, when the British Navy and the Royal Air Force paid their last tribute in this country to the American victims of the airship R 38 The bodies of fifteen of the sixteen officers and men reached the deckyard by train from Hull at one o'clook, and were placed on board the light cruiser Dauntless. The work of moving the o ffice, each of which was enclosed in a wooden case and covered with the Amerioan flag, was accomplished within an hour. When the coffins had all bren embarked, the guards of honour from the Royal Navy, Royal Air Force, with the officers present, formed up on the wharf and saluted. At two o'clock the Dauntless left the harbour for America. As she passed the warships their guard, were posted, and the Impreguable fired minute guns. 
