Scheme for Scholarships From Primary to Secondary Schools in County Limerick.

IX.—NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

Six of the annual value of £40. The Committee shall be at liberty to reduce the value of the Scholarship where the pupils' parents or guardians are in a position to bear part of the expenditure on his or her education. The Committee shall, however, be empowered to make a supplementary grant not exceeding £10 per annum towards the maintenance of any scholar whose parents are unable to meet the expenses incidental to residence in a Secondary School.

II.—CONDITIONS OF TENURE.

(A) The Scholar from whom the pupil committee has adopted the Gaelic League Education Programme as modified by Dail Eireann, viz. (a) Irish to be the official School Language, i.e. Irish to be used for Roll Call, orders, prayers, &c. (b) Irish to be taught for a compulsory use for each child for at least one hour per day. (c) Irish History to be taught to all pupils.

(B) The Secondary School which the pupil, or his parents or guardians, choose for the holding of a Scholarship programme have adopted (a) the Gaelic League Programme for Secondary Education, viz. Irish to be taught for a compulsory use, &c. (b) Irish to be taught for a compulsory use for each child for at least one hour per day. (c) All Examination Papers to be set in both English and Irish, each pupil examined to have permission to answer in whichever of the two languages he or she thinks fit. In examinations in Irish which the use of that foreign language is permitted to be setting and answering questions. The pupil to be taught at the Secondary School with a view to Matriculation at the N.U.I.

III.—TENURE OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

The tenure of these Scholarships shall be four years provided the pupil shows satisfactory progress as shown by the periodical school examination, (b) the annual school examination at the end of the academic year, (c) the special test in Irish and Irish History applied by the Committee's Examiner at the end of each year, (d) a satisfactory report from the Examining Board of a Gaelic College. The Committee will spend a session in the summer of each year at the expense of the Committee, until certified as able to be taught through the medium of Irish. The courses for the Special History Examinations are:—(a) Irish history of Ireland from the earliest times to the end of First Year—Story of Ireland—Bilingual. (b) Irish history of Ireland from the end of First Year to the end of Second Year—The History of Ireland and State in a Bilingual Part I (Eogan o Neatoin). At the end of Third Year—Last Conquest and Sean A'Palmis, "Eire" (The Irish Mac). At the end of Fourth Year—Sean A'Palmis, "Eire" (The Irish Mac). At the end of Fourth Year—Sean A'Palmis, "Eire" (The Irish Mac).

IV.—RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS.

Scholarships shall be restricted to pupils who are of Irish birth and whose parents or guardians have been resident in the County for five years.

V.—OTHER QUALIFICATIONS.

Children of labouring farmers whose valuation does not exceed £20 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £20 but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be determined by the value of the land with a view to the parents' circumstances. Children of others than farmers or labourers may be awarded a Scholarship (full or reduced), as the Committee shall decide, according to the circumstances of the parents.

VI.—AGE LIMIT.

Pupils shall be eligible for Scholarships up to but not exceeding 16 years on the first of June.

VII.—REFERENCES.

Every candidate for a Scholarship shall, before being admitted for examination, produce a satisfactory reference from the Teacher or School Manager of his School, together with a medical certificate from a General Practitioner and a recommendation from a Clergyman of his parish as to character.

VIII.—AWARDS.

Scholarships shall be awarded strictly in order of merit, i.e.

IX.—EXAMINATION.

Candidates for Scholarships shall be subjected to a competitive examination—oral and written—to be held by Examiners appointed by the Committee.

X.—GENERAL POWERS.

The Committee reserve to themselves the right to exclude any candidate from competing for a Scholarship on any ground assigning a reason. The Committee also reserve the right to revise this Scheme or any part of it at any time, subject to the sanction of the Limerick County Council.

In County Limerick.

I.—DATE OF OPERATION.

For the present holders of Scholarships the regulations heretofore in force shall continue to operate until the end of the present session of the operation in the Session (1921-22) for entrance Scholarships (to be awarded in July, 1921).

II.—NATURE AND VALUE OF THE SCHOLARSHIPS.

a.—There shall be awarded four Scholarships in each year, tenable for three years, in the College of the N.U.I. which has adopted the Gaelic League Programme. **b.**—The value of a Scholarship shall be £90. The value of a Bursary or reduced Scholarship shall be at least £50. **c.**—The Council offers for competition the following Scholarships:—**1.**—The *James Joyce* for Agriculture, one for Commerce, one for Celtic Studies and one for Science or Engineering. **d.**—The

any Scholarship if special circumstances be considered necessary to justify such increase. Should the standard attained or the competition for such Scholarships in Faculty be considered insufficient the Council may decide to make no award, and transfer the sum thus saved to another faculty.

III.—RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS.
Scholarships shall be restricted to students of Irish birth whose parents shall have resided in County Limerick for at least five years previous to the student presenting himself for examination.

IV.—VALUATION.
Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £30 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £30, but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be determined by the Committee on the special circumstances of each case.

Children of others than farmers or labourers may receive a full or reduced Scholarship as the Committee shall deem fit.

V.—PARTICULAR CONDITIONS FOR ELIGIBILITY TO FIRST YEARS

Scholarships up to, but not exceeding, 20 years of age on 1st June in each year, except in the case of Scholarships in Agriculture and to teachers.

Students may be eligible for Scholarships up to, but not exceeding 30 years of age on 1st June in each year, except in the case of Scholarships in Agriculture and to teachers engaged in primary education in which case the age limit is 26. Facilities will be afforded to teachers in the case of Scholarships in primary education.
