



DISEASE IN STORED POTATOES.

Irish Research Work.

The Department issues the following :-There has recently been published an interesting secount by Mr P. A. Murphy of the Plants and Seeds Division of the Department of Agriculture, of some researches into the connection batween blight in potatoes and subsequent rotting of the tubers during storage. Mr Murphy has elucidated several points in connection with storage rot-a disease, which, if not as severe in Ireland as in other potato growing countries, is, nevertheless, a source of serious loss.

It is generally agreed that a long period of spore discharge (that is a moderate and long continued attack of blight) and severe tuber rot are associated, and the prevalent view is that the latter is a direct consequence of the former. It has been assumed, moreover, that more spores find their way to the soil when the blight does not develop sufficient intensity to kill the plants within a short period than happens when the blight attack is much more severe but less protracted; or alternatively, that under the former conditions the spores reach the tubers in greater numbers or under more favourable conditions for infection. These are hypotheses which should have been susceptible of experimental proof, but until Mr Murphy's investigations, this was not forthcoming.

In 1920 a field experiment—on the lines of some carried out previously by Mr Murphy in Canada -wes conducted at the Agricultural College, Glasnevin. The crop-of Up to Date potatoesin the field which was selected for investigation. had suffered severely from blight throughout the latter part of July and the month of August. By the beginning of September the plants in more than half of the field were practically dead, and those in the remainder were severely blighted, but still living vigorously. The experiment was oarried out on this portion of the field.

The blight made little or no headway during the comparatively dry and warm period which set in about September 1st. It had progressed no further at the time of the first digging on Septem ber 15th and 16th, and it was not until ja t after the second digging on September 27th and 28th that as the result of some showery weather, it began to spread again. Thereafter, the disease continued to develop, although somewhat slowly, so that there was still a certain amount of living toliage left when the work was completed on October 18th.

Before being stored, the potatoes were most carefully sorted, and all diseased and small tubers excluded, and the remainder were stored in small pits made in the usual way in the open. The potatoes in one pit (No. 10) were, however, pitted with 50 marked blighted tubers; those in two other pits (Nos. 8 and 9) were covered in the pit with blighted stalks, and in another pit (No. 11) were, before being pitted, spread on ground from which blighted stalks had just been removed. Where old stalks were purposely used for covering they were replaced with straw after a few days. All the pits were finally covered with earth. They were opened and the potatoes again examined on February 15th and 16th, 1921. As a result of the examination three points were made clear :-- (1) That the disease which was then found had not spread from a few initially infected tubers-the pit in which the blighted potatots were placed showed hardly more blight than did a plot which contained similarly treated potatoes without the addition of any blighted specimens; (2) that the most dangerous source of infection is direct contact with brighted foliage-No. 8 pit, which was so covered, developed 13.16 per cent. of disease as compared with 3.86 per cent. in similarly treated but differently covered potatoes in pits ; (3) that

AUTUMN LEAF DECORATION.

The brightly coloured leaves of the late autumn can, "Corquest" states, be used with charming effect in the decoration of boxes, trays, tops of small tables and similar objects. The leaves should be in perfect condition, and those of the gayest and most varied colour should be chosen. They should be pressed between blotting paper for a jew days until they are dry; the naturel tinging is not then likely to change to ani extent. When this has been done the surface to be decorated is coated with varhish. The best parts of the leaves should then be cut out and arranged on the valuish beforgit is dry. The shapes out need not be requier, the whole idea being to make a crazy pattern of the gayest colours. Take care that the edges of all the pieces stick down well, so that a fairly level surface is presented. Allow the varnish to ! dry and then give a further coat all over the upper surface of the leaves. An additional box of varnish may be applied if a very fine effect is des red. The varnish intensifies the colour of the leaves, and a wonderfully rich effect is secured.



M. Briand has informed the French Cabinet hat Germany has accepted the conditions laid down in an agreement between the Allies regarding the raising of the sanctions and the establishment of inter-Allied control on the Rhine frontler. Herr Mayer, the German Ambassador in Paris, has been informed that the sanctions will be

raised to-morrow. The sanctions were a form of economic pressure brought to bear upon Germany when she declined to agree to the reparations terms agreed upon by the Allies in March. The efforts to reconcile the Allies' opposing points of view have now had a successful issue.

WINDFALL OF £70 000.

The Department of Agriculture and Technic Instruction report that during the month of August broken weather delayed the start of the threshing operations in the earlier countles, and gave cause for some complaints of grain sprouting while in the stook. On the other hand, the frequent raiss were of much help to the root crops, and also served to improve the pastures. Grass lands which were very bare previously made a marked recovery, and at the end of the month carried a more than usually luxuriant covering. The plentiful supply of grass enabled dairy cows to maintain the milk yield, which, as the month advancel, was in some counties inclived to increase rather than decrease. Stock of all kinds put on condition satisfactorily swing to the improvement in pastures and the ample supply of water. Fields of aftergrass showed marked response to the mild showery weather. Not much change was to be noted in the sattle trade. Business continued dull and slack, but towards the close of the mouth demand both for fat eattle and stores improved somewhat with a hardening tendency in prices. Fairs as a rule were small and few fat cattle were bought by abiopers. There was a sluggish trade in sheer. The chief business done was in breeding ewes and choice lambs. There was no indication of any revival of the wool trade. Pork prices were variable, but were somewhat higher than in the previous month. Threshing of winter wheat had begun, and from some places it was reported that both yield and quality of grain were satisfactory. Eigh sen barrels per Irish sore were obtained on farms in Louth. In other counties the sample of grain was described as uniform and plump. In south-east Cork the yield was expected to average 7 barrels per statute acre. In Co. Dublin the opening price was about 35s per barrel. Over most of the country cutting of the out crop was completed by the end of August, but in the later districts of the Northern counties a considerable proportion remained standing on 1st September. In the Midland and Southern area threshing was well advanced. Yields were variable, ranging from very poor to fairly good. A yield of 25 barrels per Irisb sore was reached in Co Louth ; in Southeast Cork yields were around 10 barrels per statute sore. In North-east Cork the price for black oats was 7s 21 per owt, and for white oats 8s per owt. The small quantities threshed in the Northern counties indicated that both yield and quality would be alike to r; current price for any

lots marketed was from 1s 3d to 1s 6d per stone. Straw was extremely short and will be scarce for fodder during the winter. Barley was stated to be threshing out well, the quality of the grain being good ; in North Tipperary it was described as the best of the grain crops. Main crop potatoes I oked healthy, and though blight had appeared in some countles, the attack was not serious. There had been some budding and second growth, but this tendency, which affected early and midearly varieties more than the maincrop, appeared to be stopped. In County Waterford an average yield of tubers was expected, "Arran Chief" and "Irish Queen," showing most promise and "Champion" least. In County Clare all varieties except "Champions" promised to yield well. "Champions" were also stated to be poor in
