Consecration in Christ Church Cathedral.

The new Bishop of Limerick, Ardfert, and Aghados, Right Rev. Harry Vere White, M.A. was conscorated in Dublin on Tuesday. The ceremony took place in Christ Church Cathedral, where the new Bishop ministered so faithfully and successfully as Dean for the past four years. It was both simple and impressive. 





GAS FROM SEAWEED.

Electricity as a Rival The coal strike was the culminating point of the adversity by which the gas industry has been beset in recent years, according to Mr Thomas Goulden, President of the Institution of Gas Engineers, speaking at the Central Hall, Westminister, London. It is difficult to refer in moderate language to this national calamity, he said. The total extraordinary expenditure forced on the industry by the dispute was likely to reach £4,000,000. It was a very difficult tack to maintain the supply of gas during the dispute: Foreign cost supplied was very poor and all sorts of fuel were pressed into use to manufacture gae. Even seaweed was used. Mr Goulden spoke in warm terms of the success of schemes for co-operation between smployers and employes in the gas industry. It was regrettable, he said, that the principle was not more widely adopted in other industries. Continuing, Mr Goulden said that, apart from the slear duty of the gas industry to the community to supply gas at the lowest possible price per unit, the members of the fuduetry should not forget that they had a most powerful rival in electricity. The cheapening of the supply of electricity manufactured in high super stations to be built, was one of the panaceas put forward as a remedy for existing unemployment. The gas industry would have to struggle hard to maintain jis esent position. Yet there was ample room for both gas and electricity, with their respective

SEVEN AND A HALF MILES HIGH

An American airman has just flown to a height of 40,800ft over 73 miles into the air. This performance was made whilst testing a new air serew, and was not at first intended to be an effort to break the altitude record. The machine L. flight was a Lepere biplane fitted win a 400 hip Liberty engine. The pilit, Lieut' MaoCready, was protected against the extreme cold by an electrically heated suit and was povided with a good supply of oxygen for use in the rarefied air. Up to about 30,000 feet he felt no ill effects, but after this height his senses began to act slowly and every movement made more oxygen necessary. When he had almost reached 40,000 feet his breath fre ze in the oxygen tube, and he had to use an emergency flack, whilst the intense ould froze his eyelashes to his gigg'es and almost blinded him.



A MUD PIE CENSUS. Dr. Russell, who tells us that in a special of good arable land there are more living organisms than there are people in the United Kingdom, has probably not wasted his time making an accurate count, but there is no doubt he is well within the mark, observes the Daily Chronicle. Scheme for Scholarships From Primary to Secondary Schools in County Limerick.

I-NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

Six of the annual value of £40. The Committee shall be at liberty to reduce the value of the Scholarship where the pupils' parents or guardians are in a position to bear part of the expense o his or her education. The Committee shall, likewise, have power to make a supplementary grant not exceeding £10 per annum towards the maintenance of any scholar whose parents are unable to meet the expenses incidental to residence in a Secondary School.

II-CONDITIONS OF TENURE. (A) The Primary School from which the papil comes must have adopted the Gealie League Edueation Programme as medified by Dail Eireann, viz , (a) Irish to be the official School Language, i.a. 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
