LIMERICK TECHNICAL SCHOOLS.

Officers' Pension Claim

Decision of Court of Appeal. In the Court of Appeal yesterday, before Lord Justice Ronan, Lord Justice O'Connor, and Mr. Justice Dodd, the arguments concluded in the appeal brought by the Local Government Board for Ireland from an order of the King's Bench Division (the Lord Chief Justice and Mr Justice Pim), Mr Justice Samuels dissenting, made in the case of the Corporation of Limerick against James Comerton and others, and the Local Government Board for Ireland, making absolute a conditional order for a writ of certiorari, quashing sealed orders declaring James Comerton and Mary Halpin entitled to pensions, and Patrick White entitled to a gratuity allowance, as retiged officers employed in the Technical Bohool, Limerick. Mr Comerton was principal of the school and Secretary of the Local Committee in centrol of it Mrs Halpin was the charwoman of the insti-

tution. The main grounds on which it was sought to have the sealed orders quashed was that they were made without jurisdiction, the persons mentioned having ceased to hold their respective offices before their resignation had been sanctioned by the Department of Agriculture and Technical

It was contended in support of the application for the writ of certiorari, which was granted by the King's Bench Division, that these officers had been legally dismissed before their resignation had been received, and that a bons-fide judicial discretion was not exercised by the Local Govern-

The jurisdiction vested in the Local Government Board was simply a declaratory one; and they had nothing to do with the funds or source out of which the payments were to be made in respect of the orders. 



COUNTY SURVEYORS' REPORT. The following reports were submitted :-

EASTERN DIVISION. resumed the normal, our roads are generally in a sound condition with a few marked exceptions.

The advantage taken by the Council of the exceptionally dry weather when they instructed that all labour possible should be withdrawn from the roads and put to quarrying, has had the benefioial effect of husbanding resources, and giving larger supplies of material than would otherwise have been available.

Steam-Rolling .- Steam-rolling has been done between the City and Cahernarry, between Ballinscarra and Mungret, between Ki.lonan and Ballysimon, between Kilmallock and Uregare, and lastly, between Gooig and Annaeotty.

As this work has been chargeable to the ordinary maintenance account, and not executed by loan, there are no repayments under this head. The expenditure is well within the sums allowed in the districts, but there is an outstanding account with the Road Board for a large balance due for rolling done under Grant of 1913, on the Dublin and Cork roads, which should be paid over by it to your account.

Stone Breaking-Machine-breaking has been carried out in Limerick No. 1 Rural District-At Knoosatana, Cahernarry, Carrigogunnell, Maddyboy, Knockbrack, and Roxborough. Kilmallock Kural District-At Castlefarm, Knockderk, and Clogher. Tipperary No. 2 Rural District-At Newpallas, Oala, Ballybeg, and Lingfield; whilst in Mitchelstown No. 2 Rural District-handbreaking has been availed of throughout, and machine-breaking rendered unnecessary. Your engines with stone-breaking machinery, rollers, traction engine and waggons, bave, since the breaking of supplies began, been kept practically under full load.

It is to be regretted, however, that in a few places in this Division, unnecessary delay and expense have occurred by a totally mistaken ides. that any or all who present themselves with horses and carts are to be given employment, on conditions that are self-imposed and often unreasonable, as many men are in a position to be otherwise employed who seck wo.k as oarters on the roads to the detriment of the legitimate outer, or the man, who, so to speak, depends for his livelihood on bis horse and cart.

The authority of the County Surveyor is to be questioned, not, however, by the Council, but by those acting from without, and presumably on behalf of a section of labour. It is, therefore, I hold, the duty of the Council to esfeguard the real interests of labour by defining the 'labourer,' "surfaceman," "carter," and so forth, in order to avoid these collisions that are becoming of tco frequent occurrence.

There is another matter, which I consider of great importance and shou'd like to bring before the Council. That is the question of the outting of brshes, and the compulsory obtaining of road materials from quar ies and gravel pits. The outting of the bushes adjoining roads is of primary importance. It is absolutely impossible to keep reduce the numbers of their workmen, dwing roads, especially narrow toads, in good order if they are sheltered by high bushes or tree branches across the water. on the fences adjoining. WASHING-DAY HINTS.

Cheap soap and hard water are an extravagarice in these days of thrift, writes Mary Gwynne Howell. Hard water has no cleansing properties, consequently before the soap can operate on dirt it has to supply sufficient alkali to soften the water. A free alkali is just as effective and less wasteful. If every housewife kept a bottle of water-softening bolution and added half a cupful or more, results would be obtained at less cost. The washing soda. Let the soda dissolve thoroughly, then bottle for use.

Modern soaps are in most cases more effective than carlier makes, and it is wise to try new preparations, following the directions closely. If the directions say use warm water, do not use boiling! There is a chemical reason for the given water temperature, and good results will be dependent on the faithful following of instructions. Soap flakes and soap powders are merely lifferent forms of scap preparations, generally with the addition of borax or secret trade ingredients which give added cleansing powers. Being quickly soluble, they are very useful for many washing operations.

TO WASH SILK UNDERWEAR.

One may be the possessor of the daintiest underwear and yet know so little about washing it that it will lose its beauty in a very short time and quickly wear out. Silk underwear of good quality is expensive at the start, but as it will last for years with proper care a little borax in a pail of warm water and prepare a good suds with white soap, making Finest Tuwnsy Port 5/-Fairy Speed, Mr Hartigan. G Hartigan 4 8 0 "I was reading in the paper the other day," it lukewarm; hot water would make the silk suds as lightly as possible, and do not wring them, but squeeze the moisture out carefully. Then rinse in two waters of the same temperature and hang to dry without wringing.

WHEN THREADING SHORT CURTAINS. Use elastic instead of tage. This should be cut to half the length of the window, and have a loop at either end to place over the nails or hooks. It keeps the curtains tight, and prevents them from sagging in the middle.

A BROOCH HINT.

An experienced jeweller makes the assertion that few women know how to adjust their brooches. It is the general habit, he says, to grasp the brooch by the setting, con sequently it soon needs repairing. The proper method is to take the body of the pin, not the top or selling, between the thumb and fingers and press it through the cleth, holding the setting only when classing the pin. All jewellery must be very carefully handled, for the settings are easily bent, and very slight displacement is sufficient to

USE CLOTHES BRUSH MORE Use your clothes brush thoroughly. HINTS ON MENDING CUTLERY. Knives, forks, loose handles, &c., are often put aside simply because they have come apart, or loose, and are a source of risk to use. The following hints show how they can

1. Fill the hole in the handle with a mixture of powdered resin and fine silver sand. Then heat the knife or fork tang and press it firmly into the handle. Afterwards cool in water and clean off the surplus mixture that may have oozed out when pressing the tang home. 2. Use powdered alum and silver sand in Equal proportions. Melt this mixture on the fire or over a gas flame in an old iron spoon. pour it into the hole in the handle, and quickly put the tang into the handle. Cutlery mended by this method should be allowed to cool gradually. 3. Make a mixture of four parts of resin. one part of beeswax, and one part of plaster of Paris. Put the mixture in the hole in the



TO BOIL RICE FOR CURRIES. Patna rice should be chosen for curries. Before boiling wash it well in several waters. Have ready on a fire a large saucepan three parts full of freshly boiling water; add salt of care in youth. Sprinkle finely-chopped water cress on top; also a few breadcrumbs and little bits of margarine. Bake until the eggs are set.

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
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
