Under Amalgamation Scheme. At Friday's meeting of the Kilmallock District

Council, Mr Brian Flynn presiding. A deputation comprised of a large number of members from the Effin, Kilmallock, Kilfinane, Bulgaden, and Ballylanders Branches of the Irish Transport Union appeared before the Council in connection with the demand for the retention of

Members of the deputation spoke on the long distance which would have to be covered by patients going to the County Hospital at Croom from remote parts of East Limerick, as well as the danger, inconvenience, and hardships involved.

Mr F Farrell, Effin, said he would propose that no more rates should be pald until the hospital was brought back. Mr McGrath said that the deputation which appeared before the Council were going to meet the Governing Body on the matter, and were even prepared to go up to Dail Eireann on the question. Mr Balfour's speech on the limitation of naval armaments was the principal feature of the second session of the Armaments Conference in Washington on Tuesday.

There was a large attendance of distinguished persons in the galleries; and Mr Balfour's precentation of Great Britain's views was warmly

Having pointed to the importance of sea communication to the British Empire, he said that the auggested proportions of battleships between the various countries were acceptable, and the limitation of armaments reasonable.

He thought, however, that the submarine tonnage might be reduced, and the construction of large submarines altogether prohibited. When he promised Great Britain's full, loyal, and complete co-operation towards America's p'an the occupants of the gallery rose and ap-

SCIENCE NOTES & NEWS.

THE MAGNITUDE OF BETELGEUSE. Professor Michelson, of the Chicago Uniwersity, has perfected methods of accurate beasurement of the fixed stars by means of the interferometer. In a paper read by the Professor before the American Physical Bociety in Chicago, says a New York correpondent, he gave the result of the first application of the device to one of the stars in she constellation of Orion, Alpha Orionis, whose distance has already been determined by parallax methods. The common name of this star is Betelgeuse. It has been possible hitherto to determine the distances of some of the pearer stars, though the nearest is trillions of miles away, by measuring their parallax, and the masses of binary stars have been computed by other methods involving mathematical consideration of their observed period. But the method announced by Professor Michelson is most remarkable in being the first which has successfully determined the actual diametrical size of a star.

The result of the measurement of Alpha Orionis, or Betelgeuse, as accomplished by Professor Michelson's method, is astounding. Betelgeuse has a diameter, it was discovered, a little more than three hundred times that of the sun, and nearly as large as that of the orbit of the planet Mars. To be explicit, the dismeter of Betelgouse is 200,000,000 miles. If it were; placed as near to us as the sun its brilliant surface would fill out the whole visible beavens. Compared with the sun in volume it is 27,000,000 times as These dimensions make the bodies in our solar system seem most minute and insignificant, and present the conception of celestial bodies of magnitudes hitherto unmeasured and almost beyond comprehension. It would take trillions of globes like our little earth to equal Betelgeuse in size.

Betelgeuse is the northern star of the bril-Ciant constellation Orion, lying above the giant's shoulder. This constellation is the finest spectacle of the skies, and is conspicuous on any clear evening in winter. The distance of Betelgeuse from the earth is perhaps 150 " light years," that is, the light that strikes your eye when you look up at it started on its journey from the star at the rate of 186,000 miles a second 150 years ago

The method used by Professor Michelson was first applied with the eight-foot reflecting telescope at Mount Wilson, in southern Califoruia. The mirror of the telescope was obseured by an opaque cap with two slits adjustable in width and distance apart. When the instrument is focussed on a star, then, inbleed of an image of the star, there appears a series of interference bands arranged at Squal distances apart and parallel to the two elits. When the slite are separated a distance between them will be attained at which the fringes disappear. A simple formula then gives the angle subtonded by the star, and when this angle and the distance of the star are known the diameter of the star can be resdly determined.

A still more powerful device is obtained by using two adjustable mirrors with an "interferometer" attachment, instead of the telescope and allts. It is this latter device which has been applied with such remarkable success in measuring the diameter of Betelgeuse.

SEA-LEVEL FALL IN RECENT TIMES. Whilet evidences of changes in the relative level of land and sea abound everywhere, it is no easy matter to decide in individual cases whether the change has been due to a movement of land or of sea. The question has been discussed by various writers in relation to changes in the region of the Mediterranean Sea, the idea of a general change of level of this having found a good deal of support. A change of level affecting all the seas of the world alike may seem at first more difficult of acceptance, but has also met with support, on the ground that the amount of water contained in the oceans would vary considerably with the amount locked up in solid form in the polar ice caps. Professor R. A. Daly brings together some facts tends ing, in his view, to favour the idea of a recent world-wide sinking of ocean-level, in the Geological Magazine. He eites observations of old strand-lines from eastern North America, the West Indies, and South America, Samoa and other parts of Austra-Jasia, as well as from Graham Land on the borders of the Antarctic Region, all pointing, he thinks, to a general fall of sea-level of about twenty feet within recent times. Some of the cases, notably those of the Miemac torrace in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the lowest coastal-plain terrace southward of New York, where we find practical uniformity of the terrace level for distances of 300 and nearly 1,000 miles respectively, are with difficulty to be explained on the suppopition of an uplift of the land. In order that the theory may be justified, comments the Geographical Journal, it is, of course, necesmary to suppose the terraces not only accordant in level, but of contemporaneous age, and Professor Daly allows that the evidence for this is at present meagre, though the suphasis laid by all observers on the recent character of the strands tends in favour of synchronism.

A MARVELLOUS APPARATUS. One would hardly think of an electrical testing apparatus operating most advantageously in an oil bath. And yet one of the povel features of a precision resistance bridge designed and constructed by the United States Bureau of Standards functions, the Scientific American says; in oil the temperature of which is automatically maintained constant. Electrical resistance standards as tested for Uncle Sam, State Governments, public service commissions, corporations, manufac-turers, and even individuals, require accuracy from very low to extremely high values, ranging from one-ten-thousandth of an ohm to 10,000 ohms. An essential feature of the duties of the electrical resistance laboratory of the Bureau of Standards, is the maintenence of the unit of resistance, one of the fundamental units upon which measurement of electrical power is based. Hence the construction of this novel resistance bridge which is capable of making measurements with a degree of accuracy of one part in 100,000 or to one-thousandth per cent.

The apparatus can be used as a simple

wheatstone bridge for resistance of one ohm and above or as a double bridge for resistsaces below one ohm. The bridge is operated in oil, the temperature being automatically kept constant. Apparatus for testing of electriced resistance standards, in order to ensure best results, requires a mechanism of special design and constructed of the choicest material. Consequently, both the resistance bridge and galvanometer were designed and built by the Bureau of Standards for the specific work to which the units have been dedicated.







DEBT TO AMERICA:

Ten Thousand Million Dollars. Interesting figures have just been compiled by the Guaranty Trust Company of New York respeeting Europe's indebtedness to the United

States Government. Commenting on the situation, the "Guaranty Survey" points out that after two centures of foreign investment the British acquired a balance due to them in 1914 from all parts of the world of about £4,000,000, On these investments Great Britain realised, partly through transfer of ownership, about £1,000,000,000 during the war. which was used mainly in paying for American products.

Chough Great Britain required many years to band performed, and was much admired, reach her p e-war credit position through private investment abroad, the United States in the last six years has built up foreign oredits of all sorts in excess of 15,000,000,000 dollars.

Of this approximately 3,000,000,000 dollars is in the hands of private investors in the form of various classes of foreign securities, while more CORK AND LIMERICK RAILWAY DIRECT than 10,000,000,000 is owed to the Government by other Governments.

In approximate figures, at the parities of excharge, the principal inter-Government debts are estimated as follows-Germany's reparation liabilities are about 32,000,000,000 dollars France owes 2,700,000,000 dollars on principal account to Great Britain and 3,350,000,000 dollars to the United States; Italy owes to Great Britain They refuse to grant an independent station at 2,312,000,000 dollars, and to the United States Limerick, as they consider a common station the United States more than 4,000,000,000 dollars.

HORSES AND SLIPPERY ROADS.

A report to the Minister of Transport by Sir Henry Maybury, Director-General of Roads, states that an expert committee nominated by the President of the County Surveyors' Society has failed to satisfy themselves that there is any accepted method of road construction or treatment which does not, under certain conditions, leave the road slippery for horses. The committee express the opinion that a large measure of safety for horses on public highways could be obtained by improved shoeing. The committee consisted of Mr A Dryland, county surveyor of Sarrey (since appointed county engineer and surveyor of Middlesex); Mr C F. Gettings, county sprveyor of Worcescershire; and Mr A J Lyddon, sounty surveyor of the North Riding of Yorkshire (since appointed divisional road engineer in the Ministry of Transport).

The committee point out that road surfaces which carry any considerable motor traffic must be waterproof if they are to endure, and so must be occasionally slippery. Stretches of road with an asphaltic or bituminous surface were slippery when damp, and were costly. The shoeing attachment favoured by the committee was an improvement on the flexible bridge pad, which obtained a prize in the open competition held in 1914 by the Roads Improvement Association.



"NOAH'S ARK" LINER

Arrives in London.

With a shrill Coc-ee from one of the passengers, the White Star liner Medio, like an up to date Nosh's Ark, has reached Tilbury from Australia with the most representative collection of birds and soimale that has ever left the Antico les. Mr A S Le Souef, a director of the Sydney Zoological Society and representing the Sydney, Melbourne, and Perth Zio, officiated as the Noah of the collection, which will be transferred to the Regent's Park Zoo on Monday.

There were, roughly, eight handred specimena on board on the main deck forward, some of these being types that have rarely, if ever, been seen in this country (writes the "Evening Standard"). Many will remain in London or be placed in some of the provincial zoos, while others will be transferred to Paris, Belgium, or Holland, and others again to the Argentine. Three additional goests were two English goldfinches and a thrush which flew on board in the Bay of Biscay, and

were cared for by the sailors. Two of the most interesting new arrivals are long fishes, which are only found in a couple of Queensland rivers. When the water supply gives out, the fishes bu y themselves in the mud, and bres he the air at frequent intervals.

Another curious item is a North Australian flying squirrel, which only comes out of its hiding. place at night; while also there is a fawn flying squirrel, so called becau e of its ability to plana from tree to tre.

HINTS FOR THE HOME. BY A PRACTICAL HOUSEWIFE.

GOOD HEALTH RULES. Exercise every muscle of the body daily. Practise deep breathing, and always through the nostrils, with closed mouth. Employ yourself from six to eight hours daily in some useful occupation. Sleep as many hours as you find necessary. Take half of these hours before and half after midnight. Observe regularity in eating, drinking, and sleeping. Never get angry; never worry; seek rest in change of occupation; cultivate a spirit of cheerfulness, thankfulness, and generosity; and do all you can to help others by word, deed, and example.

TO REVIVE FROSTED PLANTS. Pot plants that have been napped by frost present a very dejected appearance. In nine cases out of ten the specimens are not really dead, says "S. L. B." Meny people simply kill their plants by giving them warm water at the roots. This tends to thaw the cell contents too quickly, with fatal results to the plant. A safe plan is to give the soil a good souking with water at the ordinary temperature. At the same time sprinkle the folinge above with water. Then put the plant in a cool place where there is no frost. In a few hours the plant will have revived most wonderfully, and be in no way the worse for its experience. Where the soil has been saturated in this way the plants should not again be exposed to keen frost.

TO CURE BLACKHEADS. As a general rule country life is very con-Bucive to a healthy skin, but blackheads will shake their appearance if opportunity is provided. They are certainly very disfiguring and anmoying, and should not be tolerated. If they do appear they must be encouraged to depart suddenly and simply. The best time to drive them out is at night. Wash the face well with warm soft water and a good soap that is known to suit the skin. White Castile soon is usually successful. Dry the face gently but thoroughly, and rub in a little good oream. This must be removed by a warm wet towel, gently rubbed over the face, after which the face should be carefully dried. The blackhoads can then be gently squeezed out by means of the two first fingers covered with a soft handkerchief. If the blackhoads are obstinate they will need frequent repetition of this treatment before they respond. But care and attention to them will have their reward.

PASTE THAT WILL KEEP. The following is a simple recipe for making a paste for sticking paper. It is absolutely clean. Dissolve in a pint of boiling water half an ounce of alum. Then mix one ounce of flour in a little cold water, squeeze out all lumps, and add. Pour in a few drops of oil of cloves, and bring to boil in a sancepan. The oil of cloves is necessary to preserve tha paste, which would otherwise be worthless. When made put into wide-mouthed bottles.

KEEPING ANTIDOTES HANDY. Sometimes accidental cases of poisoning occur when no doctor is at hand. In such cases the invaluable person is the one who can supply off-hand the quick if homely remedy that may save the patient's life. course, in all such occurrences the first step is to send for skilled advice. While waiting it is a good thing to tickle the back of the throat with a feather, in order to induce vomiting. Copious draughts of mustard and water, or sweet oil, or white of ogg diluted with water, or, if the nature of the poison known, one of the antidotes which is suited to the case. It should be remembered that alkalies form the antidotes in cases of poisoning by acids, and vice versa. The symptoms of poisoning are many and varied, and in the case of irretant poisons the results are at once apparent. They consist of sudden violent pain and cramp in the stomach. nauses, and convulsions. On the other hand, a narcotle poison produces stupor, numbness, drowsiness, coldness and stiffness of the hands and feet, and weakened eyesight. In eases such as these the patient must be kept awake, and, of course, antidotes given as well. The best plan is to walk the patient things such as weed-killer, ammonia, and other injurious liquids are in use to beep them out of the way of children,

WHEN COOKING CABBAGES. Cabbages often cause an unpleasant smell while they are being cooked. The way to avoid this is to see that the cabbages are quite fresh. If they are boiled in a large saucepan containing plenty of water, and if the lid is kept off while they are boiling as briskly as possible, there will be no smell noticeable. Many people use only a little water with the idea of keeping the cabbage a bright green colour, but the same good appearance can be obtained even whon much water is used, provided that a small piece of washing soda is added to the water.

THE SECRET OF GOOD FRYING. The secret of successful frying is to use plenty of fat of the right temperature, and this is more economical than using a little, for the fat wastes less, and can be used time after time if strained at once and re-clarified occasionally. If the fat is at the proper head it will not retain or communicate any undesirable flavour. Thus the same fat can be used for fish, meat rissoles, &c., or even for sweet fritters. When it is hot enough the fat should be quite still, with thin blue smoke rising from the surface. To test it throw in a piece of crumb of bread. If it turns orisp and golden brown at once the fat is just ready,

MAYONNAISE EGGS. Boil some new-laid eggs till quite hard, and when cold remove the shells, cut the eggs in halves lengthways, remove the yolks care. fully, and mix these in a basin with sufficient mayonnaise to make them into a smooth firm paste, seasoning them with salt and paprika. Mould them with a spoon to the original shape, place this in one-half of the white, covering it neatly with the other.

RHUBARB BATTER PUDDING. Wipe about one pound of rhubarb, out into short lengths, and put into a greased pie-dish in layers, with sugar and a little grated iemon peel in between each layer. Make a batter with one ounce of flour, one teaspoon ful of baking powder, half a pint of milk, and a prepared dried egg. Pour on to the shubarb and bake for half an hour. Apples san be used instead of rhubarb when liked, or a mixture of half and half is quite nto.

SAGO MOULD. Soak a teacupful of fine eage overnight in four teacupfuls of water. Next day mix with it the finely-grated rinds and juice of two lemons and five or six small tablespoorfule of golden syrup. Simmer gently until the sage is fully cooked (about fifteen minutes). turn into a wet mould. A mice sweet is made by using a border mould or basin with bottom flat enough to allow a jam-jar or tumbler to be placed in the centre. This is easily removed fater by filling it for a moment with hot water. When turned out, the cavity should be filled with cold rice or semolina cooked in milk Custard made of powder might be poured round.

POSTAGE RATES AND UNEMPLOY-MENT.

The return to halfpenny postage would mean £25,000,000 a year in looreased wages. This startling fact was revealed by Mr W H Burchell, governing director of the Caxton Pross, Ltd; and hon scoretary of the Master Printers' Association. "The Post Office is killing trade by its high postal rates," said Mr Burchell. "The raising of the rate for an ounce of printed matter from a halfpenny to a penny in June last dealt a heavy blow at the printing trade. Industrial firms create an enormous amount of business by the issue of oatalogues, price lists, booklets, and leaflets. The imposition of this extra postage rate on printed matter is a tax on advertising, which in business is the very breath of life. The firm which can issue only 50,000 circulars instead of 100,000 as formerly, is bound to suffer a corresponding loss of business. Printing is being driven abroad. An cunce of printed matter may be posted in France and some other European countries to any address in the United Kingdom for a halfpenny. Many firms send their oirculars abread in bulk for postage there. Others are having them printed abroad. The whole of the postage fees in both cases go to the country in which they are posted. Mr Kellaway delivers them all for nothing. There must be no waiting till the end of the Post Office year," said Mr Burchell, in conclusion. "The public demand is for immediate action. Mr Kellaway must not be allowed to stand between the country and trade

TO CLEAN GAITERS. The best thing for cleaning light-coloured or drab gaiters is potatoes. Peel the potatoes, grate in a basin, and sponge the cloth well all over-make it quite wet. Hang them up to dry, then well brush it all off; it will make the cloth look like new. This will do for up and down. It is most necessary when top coats, &c.: Boil in a pint of water one ounce of soft soap and one ounce of soap powder. Add to the liquid when boiled half an ounce of liquid ammonia. Sponge the articles. For articles not much soiled, and delicate tints, one tablespoonful of the composition in half a pint of water.

FOR RHENMATIC PAINS.

There is no better remedy for the relief of rheumatic pains in the joints or other portions of the body than hot applications Flannel cloths dipped in very hot water and wrung as dry as possible should be applied to the parts, and the whole enveloped in a thick; dry flannel coth to retain the heat. The application should be renewed every five of ten minutes. The application of ground must tard, in the proportion of a tablespoonful to a quart of water, increases the effect of the heat. A teaspoonful of turpentine sprinkled upon the fomentation just before it is applied, or a cloth saturated with a solution of one part turpentine to two or three of alcohol; applied over the affected part and covered by the fomentation, is also a means of intensify. ing the effect of the fomentation.

MENDING OLD BUCKETS. Don't throw old buckets away. No matter how bad or "holy" they may be, they can be repaired, writes a correspondent. If there are only a few holes in the bottom, mix a little cement with water and allow it to set in the bottom of the bucket. Five years ago I repaired a bucket in this manner, and it is still in use, as good as ever. A good plan would be to lay pieces of wire across the bottom, if it is very bad, and pour in the coment. To prevent it leaking away, set the bucket in a little bed of sand, ashes, earth

PACKING CHINA. Those who face the task of "moving" may be glad of a few, helps as to the packing of china and glassware. Barrels are better than boxes for such articles; it is easier to move them without jarring their contents. A good plan is to place a pillow in each end of the barrel, and it is also well to line the sides with small cushions or blankets. Paper should be crumpled and wedged into every space, so that there can be no possibility of the pieces of china touching one another, no matter how much the barrel is shifted about. Vory delicate china should be packed in sawdust or bran, shaken down so thoroughly that no holes are left. Heavy, corrugated eardboard boxes make ideal packing boxes for such things. Tie them carefully with plenty of stout cord or rope, and attach wooden handles by which to carry them.

A SOAP-BAG WASHCLOTH. Take a piece of old Turkish towel six inches by eight. Fold in two the eight-inch length., Turn over and stitch the top down half an inch, leaving the ends open. Stitch up the bottom, and sides. Run a tape through the top. Put all your small pieces of soap in this bag, and use it as a wachelotin.


