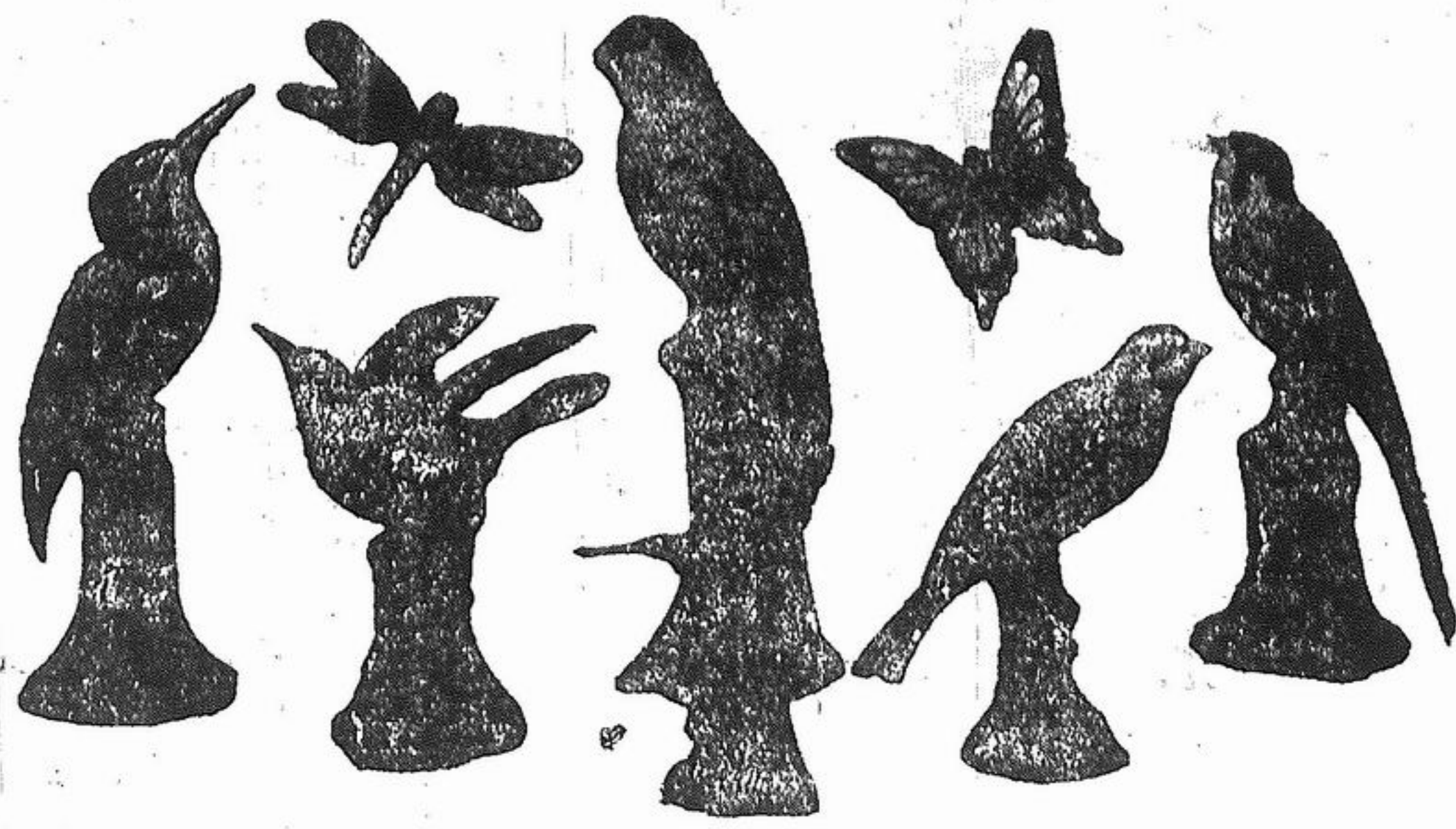

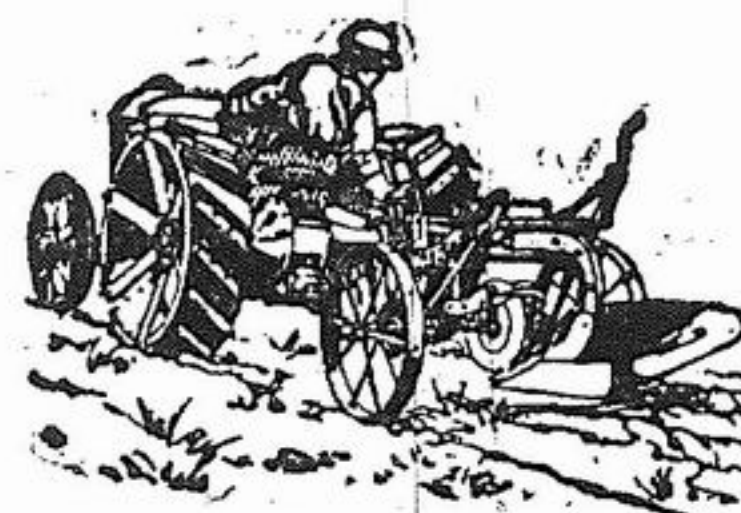

POSTAL POLICY.

Mr Kellaway, the Postmaster-General, was boasting the other day that he saw a postal surplus in sight for next year, writes the London Evening Standard. On the other hand, he refuses obstinately to rest on the Sunday delivery and collection, because it would cost a million a year, and he declares that the postal, telephone, and telegraph rates cannot possibly be reduced.

Mr Kellaway seems to be badly bitten with the war-time notion that it is the duty of a Minister to treat the nation as a monopolist; tradesmen treat his customers—make them pay as much as they can or will, and make as large a profit as possible. But even monopolist tradesmen have, as a rule, a saving sense which prevents them going quite as far as the monopolist official. They are at least careful not to impose such charges as will diminish trade or stop its expansion. A few examples, gathered from the Press, show how little the saving—not in itself to be despised—of a million a year is to be compared with the resultant loss in trade and handicaps on national efficiency. One business man declares that his postal bill, always heavy, is now "trifling!" But that is not all. Much of the return from postage expenditure is now eaten up by the fact that in consequence of the absence of Sunday facilities, his staff is kept waiting for work for hours on the Monday. Further trade is lost by the mere absence of the Sunday post, so that the business man suffers both ways—he has to pay much more and he gains less.

It is the same with the telephone. At the very time when trade, suffering from the most acute depression, needs every possible alleviation and encouragement, the new system of telephone charges acts as a new and harsh tax. A London company, with three branches, states that under the old system it paid for unlimited service £54 a year; on the new system, paying for actual calls passed through, which are practically the same in number, the cost is just over £170. This, we believe, is a very typical case. Too much has been made of the high average price per call of some small telephone-users. What they pay for their services proves, as Sir Andrew Gifford argues, no more than the fact that some men who made little use of their clubs grumble that each visit costs two or three guineas. But when we find that large users, with every possible motive to economy in calls, pay more than three times what they did, the fact is sufficiently serious even for such an optimist as Mr Kellaway. How can he expect in such circumstances to achieve that extension in the use of the telephone to which, if at all, he must look ultimately for a cheapening of service?

If the service is not cheapened, then the country's property and business efficiency as a whole must suffer. But it is not necessary to be pessimistic unless there is a big accession of subscribers, and no big accession of subscribers can be expected while the charges are so stuporously high. The abolition of the flat rate for large users was, we believe, a great mistake. The excessive charge for rentals in, we believe, another. It is absurd to suggest that the Post Office should be allowed to install and rent an instrument for less than £8 10s a year, which represents a capital value of £200. We believe the future of the Department would be best assured by fixing charges so as to promote an expansion of the system. At present it is doing all in its power to discourage such expansion.

IRELAND'S POPULATION.

According to the estimate of the Registrar-General, Ireland's population has within the last two years increased by 94,731, and in the middle of last year it returned at 4,487,000. The estimate is, of course, not perfect, but is regarded as wholly reliable, no census having, owing to the conditions in the country, been taken this year. The Irish census in 1891 returned 4,704,750, and that of 1901 4,472,103. During 1920 both the marriage and birth rates increased. The death rate was the lowest ever recorded in Ireland. The deaths totalled but 68,598, equal to an annual rate of 14.8 per thousand of the population. The deaths from violence during the year numbered 1,867. During the year 15,531 persons emigrated, of whom 6,044 were males, and 9,487 females. Emigration was highest in Ulster (5,800) and lowest in Limerick (1,708). The numbers who left Munster and Connaught were, respectively, 4,724 and 3,801.

IRISH PEACE TERMS. FULL TEXT OF AGREEMENT.

Northern Parliament's Position.

British Government's Special Facilities Required.

The full text of the Irish agreement was issued shortly before seven o'clock on Tuesday evening. It follows very much the lines indicated by the Lord Chancellor in his speech at the Birmingham earlier in the day. The document is as follows:—

AGREEMENT.

TREATY BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND. ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT.

1.—Ireland shall have the same constitutional status in the community of nations known as the British Empire as the Dominion of Canada, the Commonwealth of Australia, the Dominion of New Zealand, and the Union of South Africa, with a Parliament having power to make laws for the peace, order, and good government of the land, and an Executive responsible to that Parliament, and shall be styled and known as "The Irish Free State."

2.—Subject to the provisions hereinafter set out, the position of the Irish Free State in relation to the Imperial Parliament and by the Irish Free State (Canada, and the law, practice, and constitutional usage governing the relationship of the Crown or the representative of the Crown and of the Imperial Parliament to the Dominion of Canada, shall govern their relationship to the Irish Free State.

3.—The representative of the Crown in Ireland shall be appointed in like manner as the Governor-General of Canada, and in accordance with the practice observed in the making of such appointments. The oath to be taken by the members of the Imperial Parliament of the Dominion of Canada, shall govern their relationship to the Irish Free State.

4.—I, do solemnly swear true faith and allegiance to the Constitution of the Irish Free State as by law established, and that I will be faithful to H.M. King George V., his heirs and successors by law, in virtue of the common citizenship of Ireland with Great Britain, and my membership of the group of nations forming the British Commonwealth of Nations.

5.—The Irish Free State shall assume liability for the service of the Public Debt of the United Kingdom as existing at the date hereof, and towards the payment of war pensions as existing at that date, in proportion as may be fair and equitable, having regard to any just claims of the part of Ireland by way of set-off or counterclaim, the amount of such sums being determined, in default of agreement, by the arbitration of one or more independent persons, being citizens of the British Empire.

6.—Until an arrangement has been made between the British and Irish Governments with regard to the Irish Free State's own coastal defence, the defence by sea of Great Britain and Ireland shall be undertaken by H.M. Imperial forces, but this shall not prevent the construction or maintenance by the Government of the Irish Free State of such defences as may be necessary for the protection of the revenue or the fisheries. The foregoing provision of this article shall be reviewed at a conference of representatives of the British and Irish Governments, to be held at the expiration of five years from the date hereof, with a view to the undertaking by Ireland of a share in her own coastal defence.

7.—The Government of the Irish Free State shall afford to His Majesty's Imperial Forces as shall exist in time of peace such harbour and other facilities as are indicated in the annex hereto, or such other facilities as may from time to time be agreed between the British Government and the Government of the Irish Free State; and

(b) In time of war or strained relations with a foreign Power, such harbour and other facilities as the British Government may require for the purposes of such defence as aforesaid.

8.—With a view to securing the observance of the principle of international limitation of armaments, the Government of the Irish Free State shall establish and maintain a military establishment the establishment thereof shall not exceed in any such proportion of the military establishments maintained in Great Britain as that which the population of Ireland bears to the population of Great Britain.

9.—The ports of Great Britain and the Irish Free State shall be freely open to the ships of every other country on payment of the customary port and other dues.

10.—The Government of the Irish Free State agrees to pay full compensation on terms not less favourable than those accorded by the Act of 1920 to judges, officers, and members of police forces and other public servants who are discharged by or who retire in consequence of the change of Government, effected in pursuance hereof, provided that this agreement shall not apply to members of the Auxiliary Police or to persons recruited during the war.

11.—Until the expiration of one month from the passing of the Act of Parliament for the ratification of this instrument, the powers of the Parliament and the Government of the Irish Free State shall not be exercisable as respects Northern Ireland, and the provisions of the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, shall so far as they relate to Northern Ireland, remain of full force and effect, and no election shall be held for the return of members to serve in the Parliament of the Irish Free State for constituencies in Northern Ireland, unless a resolution is passed by both Houses of the Parliament of Northern Ireland in favour of the holding of such elections before the end of the said month.

12.—Before the expiration of the said month an address shall be presented to His Majesty by both Houses of the Parliament of Northern Ireland to that effect, the powers of the Parliament and the Government of the Irish Free State shall no longer extend to Northern Ireland, and the provisions of the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, shall so far as they relate to Northern Ireland, continue to be of full force and effect, and this instrument shall have effect subject to the necessary modifications.—Provided that if such an address is so presented, a Commission composed of three persons, one to be appointed by the Government of the Irish Free State, one to be appointed by the Government of Northern Ireland, and one who shall be chairman, to be appointed by the British Government, shall determine in accordance with the wishes of the inhabitants so far as is compatible with economic and geographic conditions, the boundary between Northern Ireland and the rest of Ireland, and for the purposes of the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, and of this instrument the boundary of Northern Ireland shall be such as may be determined by such Commission.

13.—For the purpose of the last foregoing article, the powers of the Parliament of Southern Ireland under the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, to elect members of the Council of Ireland shall, after the Parliament of the Irish Free State is constituted, be exercised by that Parliament.

14.—No such address as is mentioned in article 12 hereof, is presented, the Parliament and Government of Northern Ireland shall continue to exercise as respects Northern Ireland, the powers conferred on them, by the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, but the Parliament and Government of the Irish Free State shall, in Northern Ireland, in relation to matters in respect of which the Parliament of Northern Ireland has not power to make laws under that Act (including matters which, under the said Act, are within the jurisdiction of the Council of Ireland), exercise the powers as if the rest of Ireland, subject to such other provisions as may be agreed in manner hereinafter appearing.

15.—At any time after the date hereof the Government of Northern Ireland and the Provisional Government of Southern Ireland hereinafter constituted, may meet for the purpose of discussing the provisions, subject to which the last foregoing article is to operate in the event of such address as is therein mentioned being presented, and those provisions may include—(a) safeguards with regard to the revenue in Northern Ireland; (b) safeguards with regard to the trade and industry of Northern Ireland; (c) safeguards for the minorities in Northern

Ireland; (d) the settlement of the financial relations between Northern Ireland and the Irish Free State; (e) the establishment and powers of a local authority in Northern Ireland, and the relation of the defence forces of the Irish Free State and of Northern Ireland respectively; and if at any such meeting provisions are agreed to, the same shall have effect as if they were included in the provisions, subject to which the powers of the Parliament and Government of the Irish Free State are to be exercisable in Northern Ireland under Article 14 hereof.

16.—Neither the Parliament of the Irish Free State nor the Parliament of Northern Ireland shall make any law so as either directly or indirectly to endow any religion, or give any preference or impose any disability on account of religious belief or religious status or affect prejudicially the right of any child to attend a school receiving public money, without attending the religious instruction at (the school) or make any discrimination on the ground of religious status or religious denomination, or divert from any religious denomination or any educational institution, any of its property except for public utility purposes and payment of compensation.

17.—By way of provisional arrangement for the administration of Southern Ireland during the interval which must elapse between the date hereof and the constitution of a Parliament and Government of the Irish Free State in accordance therewith, steps shall be taken forthwith for summoning a meeting of members of Parliament elected for constituencies in Southern Ireland and the passing of the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, and for constituting a Provisional Government, and the British Government shall take the steps necessary to the transfer to such Provisional Government the powers and machinery requisite for the discharge of its duties, provided that every member of such Provisional Government shall have signified, in writing, his or her acceptance of this instrument, but the arrangement shall not continue in force beyond the expiration of twelve months from the date hereof.

18.—This instrument shall be submitted forthwith by His Majesty's Government for the approval of Parliament, and by the Irish equivalents to a meeting summoned for the purpose, of the members elected to sit in the House of Commons of Southern Ireland, and if approved shall be ratified by the necessary legislation.
