FEELING IN LIMERICK.

THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

Statement by Sir James Craig.

Further Information Asked For. Sir James Craig made an important statement in regard to the new proposals on the adjournment of the Northern House of Commons yesterday afternoon.

He said-I desire to say that I feel it only proper, now that the House and the country have been put in full possession of the fresh proposals which have reached us from his Majesty's Govern. ment, that I should explain that I think it inexpedient to-day to make any statement whatever with regard to the details of these proposals. First of all, there is ambiguity here and there in the document; secondly, there is a considerable amount of further information which we must be placed in possession of before we can come to a right conclusion; and, thirdly, I den't believe that a settlement and peace will be furthered in any way by rushing at it and tumbling over one another at the moment. A lasting peace requires sound foundations, and sound foundations can only be had by patience, by taking infinite pains in the initial stages. Therefore I say until we have certain matters further shouldated in our hands, I think it would be inadvisable for this House to begin a discussion. To morrow we will have, I hope, an opportunity under other conditions of placing our heads together in full and frank consultation, and after that, if it is the desire of my colleagues, I propose to cross over to London myself in order on the spot to bring to a more definite point some of those questions which we think require explanation. On my return it may be necessary to have a further consultation, or it may be possible to report to this House the result of my endeavours, but, sir, I think we should hold cur hand in the meantime, and show that moderation which should always obaracterice us when any crises is to be faced.







IRELAND'S POPULATION.

According to the estimate of the Registrar-General, Ireland's population has within the last ten years increased by 94,781, and in the middle of last year is returned at 4,487,000. The estimate cann t in the nature of things be regarded as wholly reliable, no census having, owing to the conditions in the country, been taken this year. The Irish census in 1891 returned 4.704,750, and that of 1901 4,472,103. During 1920 both the marriage and birth rates increased. The death rate was the lowest ever recorded in Ireland. The deaths totalled but 66,538, equal to an annual rate of 14.8 per thousand of the popufation. The deaths from violence during the year numbered 1,857. During the year 15,531 persons emigrated, of whom 6,044 were males, and 9,487 females. Emigration was highest in Ulster (5,300) and lowest in Leinster (1,705). The numbers who left Munster and Connaught were, Fapectively, 4,724 and 3,801.

> THE GREATNESS OF AMERICA. The United States Geological Survey publishes interesting facts with reference to the size of the country, presumably not generally known. The gross area of the country is 3,026,789 square miles, of which 2,973,774 square miles comprise land area. The water area, exclusive of the Great Lakes, the Atlantie, the Pacific, and the Gulf of Mexico, within the three-mile limit, is 53,015 square miles. From the easternmost point, due west to the Pacific Oyean, the distance is 2,807 miles. The shortest distance from the Atlantic to the Pacific is 2.152 miles. The boundary which divides the States from their great neighbour on the north is 3,898 miles long. The Mexican boundary is 1,744 miles long. The Atlantic coast line is 5,560 miles long; the Pacific, 2,730; the Gulf of Mexico coast

A WOMAN'S OCCUPATION. In these twentieth-century days, when women are successfully entering all the professions and making good headway in the world of commerce, it savours considerably of the dark ages that the only "occupation' they can lay claim to when signing logal documents is the time-honoured one of "spinster," "married woman," or "aldew." 'If "Jane Jones" happens to be a distinguished surgeon, dentist, or lawyer, she must still be "Jane Jones," occupation - "spinster," and nothing t else. Another little matter that would bear . alteration is the legal right of the sex to the use of the family crest. At the present time many professional and business women earn excellent incomes and possess fine motor-cars, but they are forbidden the use of family crests on the doors.

PORPOISE-JAW OIL FOR WATCHES. Practically all the porpoise oil used in the United States, even if not in the world, for lubricating watches and other delicate instruments, is made, says Popular Mechanics, near New Bedford, Massachusetts, which many years ago was important as a whaling port. The product is taken from the jaw, and certain other parts, of the animal, which is caught especially for this purpose. The history of the New Bedford industry reaches back to the early part of the nineteenth centory, to a watch tinker who regulated and cleaned the timepieces and chronemeters of the skippers of the whalers which made that, their home port. At that time it was the custom for a watch repairer, on finishing his work upon an instrument, to place a piece of paper bearing his name and address within the case. It followed that the name of this jeweller was carried by whalers to various seaports over the world, falling into the hands of other watch tinkers. It became ndticeable to many of these artisans that the watches last regulated at New Bedford were invariably in good condition and their bearings free from gum. This showed that a lubricant other than sperm oil was used. The subsequent demand for porpoise-oil became so great that the watch tinker abandoned his trade in order to fill the demands for porpoise-jaw oil which came to him: This industry is still carried on.

FAIRIES-GOOD AND BAD. Deep down in their hearts, if the truth were told, the majority of grown-ups; have a strong regard for fairy stories, and there are few of us with so little imagination that we have not a liking for these light, fantastic tales. . Just as there are all sorts and conditions of men, so are fairies diverse as a class. The

banshee is an Irish fairy, and Scotland calls it a brownie. An elf is a fairy of diminutive size, supposed to be fond of practical jokes. Genii are Eastern spirits, sometimes good but occasionally bad; A gnome is a guardian of a coal mine or quarry, and a goblin a phantom spirit. Imp is the Welsh spirit of mischief, and jack-alantern a bog or march fairy, who loves to
