Bus lane decision is city manager's

DEPUTY Mayor Jim Long has warned that the ultimate decision on whether a bus lane is run through Ballinacurra Road and O'Connell Avenue is out of the hands of councillors writes Mike Dwane.

Other councillors have stated that under Part VIII of the planning process, they could veto any plans to develop a bus lane there, plans that have unleashed a fierce local opposition despite the fact Limerick has the least-developed green routes of any city in the country.

But Cllr Long said that while he is behind Ballinacurra/ O'Connell Avenue residents in their fight against a possible green route, the reality is the Garda Commissioner and city manager are empowered under the Road Traffic Act to put a bus lane "anywhere they see fit." And he added that this is precisely what happened in Dublin, where bus and cycle lanes were passed by management in the teeth of opposition from locals and their councillors.

Third time lucky for greyhound stadium in city

BORD na gCon was hoping for a case of "third time lucky" as it announced plans to build a €20m stadium on the site of the old Greenpark Racecourse on the Dock Road.

The planning applica-tion process will begin immediately for the new stadium which it is hoped will be completed by 2010.

This is the Greyhound Board's second attempt at constructing a new track in Greenpark. In 2002, plans for a £10 million stadium were scuppered because of fears that infrastructure in the area wouldn't support such a development.

In 2006, a development was announced on the Ennis Road but once again, there were problems with the location and access to the proposed site.

Speaking at announcement. the Chairman of the Irish Greyhound Board, Dick O'Sullivan, acknowledged the previous "false dawns": "I realise this is the third time we've had this press conference," he said, "but they say "third time lucky" and I'm confident it will go through this time."

He added that the new track will be the "fivestar facility that Limerick Limerick people deserve" and would rival Shelbourne Greyhound Stadium in Dublin as the premium national venue for greyhound racing.

The stadium will boast a two-storey high television screen, a restaurant, bars both on the ground floor and in the gallery and parking for "at least" 450 vehicles.

Mr O'Sullivan also thanked Mark McMahon, Chairman of Limerick Race Company who he admitted had been shy to commit to the project initially, following the last failed attempt at constructing a stadium on the site of the old

Greenpark Racecourse. Mayor of Limerick Ger Fahy said that the announcement was a "great sporting occasion for Limerick." assured the members of Bord na gCon that the new stadium would do booming business once it was opened: "We in Limerick pride ourselves on being the sporting capital of the country so you can be sure of receiving our support once you're up and running."

Minister for Defence Willie O'Dea also emphasised that a sporting county such as Limerick should have a proud stadium in which to host greyhound racing: "This is what the sporting fraternity in Limerick deserve." he said.
