LIMERICK is set to have yet another top class sports venue after Bord na gCon announced plans to build a "five-star" €20m stadium on the site of the old Greenpark Racecourse Dock Road.

The planning application process will begin immediately for the new stadium, which, it is hoped, will be completed by 2010.

This is the boad's second attempt at constructing a new track in Greennark.

In 2002, plan for a £10m stadium were scuppered because if fears that infrastructure in the area wouldn't support

such a development.

Bord na gCor feel no such problems will be experienced this time round after developments in the rea over the last five years included. the last five yeas, including a new sewrage system in Bunlicky and the Limerick Tunel which is due to be coupleted in

In 2006, a new develop-ment was annunced on Ennis Road, but once again, there were problems with the location and access to the proposed site.

disappointer by the announcement.


