## Property sales will fund new dog track

THE chief executive of the Irish Greyhound Board said he is confident that the board will able to fund an €18m new greyhound stadium in Limerick, pending the sale of two of their properties.

Adrian Neilan, Irish Greyhound Board, said the development will be funded by the sale of the old stadium at the Market's Field, and its offices on Henry Street.

Estate agent O'Connor Murphy Gubbins has reported a high level of interest from four parties in the IGB's headquarter building on Henry Street, while the FAI is said to be interested in returning soccer to the Markets Field. Mr Neilan said the group is therefore "very confident" it will have a successful transaction in 2009.


