Greyhound stadium opens for business

THOUSANDS of people poured through the gates of Limerick's new €20m greyhound stadium as it opened its doors for the first time last Friday night.

Now, the Greenpark stadium on the Dock Road is looking forward to over 1.750 races a year and

to over 1,750 races a year and bringing in thousands of punters each weekend.

The latest addition to Limerick's sports infrastructure can accommodate 2,900 spectators, and last weekend the stadium was believed to have operated at full capacity such was the public's enthusiasm to see the new venue.

Dick O'Sullivan, chairman of the Irish Greyhound Board, said that "the long awaited day has

finally arrived."

The stadium provided 250 much-needed jobs during its construction phase, and will now provide 100 jobs on a permanent

The track has four bars on the ground and mezzanine level, with table service in the restaurant

and corporate entertainment areas, and there is also a stage and a dance floor

The general admission charge to the stadium is €10, with a 50 per cent reduction for OAP's and

Racing will take place every Friday and Saturday night from 7.45pm, and doors will open for the restaurant from 6.30pm.

There will also be three extra Thursday meetings in the run-in to Christmas - on December 2, December 9, December 16.

It is planned to run a bus service from the Market's Field to the new stadium on race nights, and there is secured car parking facil-ities for 450 vehicles at Greenpark free of charge
