Toilet talk in chambers

THE SUBJECT of toilets was back on the agenda at a council meeting in City Hall this week, where it was agreed to move a portable toilet from Arthur's Quay Park to Shelbourne Park.

Fine Gael councillor Kevin Kiely had originally suggested moving a toilet from Bedford Row to Shelbourne Park, where he suggested it might be better utilised.

Cllr Kiely said a lot of finance had been invested in Shelbourne Park between Hassett's Cross and Union Cross, yet it lacked this basic facility.

The park, primarily used for soccer matches, was reopened last year after two pitches were re-levelled and the construction of a 20 bay car park and children's area.

However, director of service Caroline Curley said there had been problems in the past with toilets in parks being vandalised, and it costs the council €45,000 per year in maintenance to have an automated toilet.

At the time, councillors expressed disbelief that it costs nearly €900 per week to operate one public toilet.
